Blue chip companies are known to weather downturns and operate profitably in the face of adverse economic conditions, which help to contribute to their long record of stable and reliable growth.


Blue chip stocks are seen as a less volatile investment and have an institutional status in the economy.





#### Admission

Admission for this academic year for B.Com, B.B.M and P.G concluded on the last week of May 2013. The total number of students admitted to various courses in May 2013 is B.Com – 318, BBM – 146, B.Com – Travel & Tourism – 80, M.Com – 35 & MIB – 50.The College strength is 1784, students.

#### **S**cholarship

The Management sponsors midday meals for 108 students. The total amount spent in this academic year is Rs.6,54,000/-. 179 students were given Management Scholarship/Fee Concessions of Rs.18,04,870/-.KPMG gave 31 scholarships amounting to Rs.6,00,000/ for need cum merit students. The College disbursed Rs.2,74,049/- received from the Government for SC/ST and Minority students. A

total of 100 students received the scholarship.

#### **IQAC**

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell of St. Joseph's College of Commerce strives to bring quality measures into pedagogic processes and other academic activities of the institution. It is in charge of the overall quality control, of all dimensions of the academic activities of the College. Following the third cycle of Re accreditation and in line with the suggestions of NAAC a twenty member IQAC was newly formed comprising Management representatives, Industry experts and Alumni representatives

## Rashtriya Ucchatar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA)

RUSA is a holistic scheme of development for higher education in India initiated in 2013 by the MHRD, GOI. The scheme aims at providing strategic funding to higher educational institutions throughout the country. A total of 316 state and public universities and 13,024 colleges will be covered under it

Under this scheme the College has applied for University Status and also the Cluster University status under RUSA in December 2013. The College waits to hear from State Government in this regard.

#### **Research Centre**

The Research Centre of SJCC has been successful in indoctrinating the culture of research into the veneers of the Institution. It has conciously initiated various research activities for the staff, undergraduate and post graduate students. Input sessions on the importance of research and the methodology of research are conducted every year. Students are not only motivated but also guided in presenting research papers and writing research articles.

The Research Centre publishes two Bi-annual research journals in an academic year. SJCC Management Research Review with ISSN number is a peer reviewed journal. The fifth and sixth issues of the 'SJCC Management Research Review' was brought out in June 2013 and February 2014 respectively.

Two issues of the Student Research Journal were published in the month of April and October 2013. Ten issues of the student's journal and six issues of

the peer review journal have been published so far.

#### **Certificate and Value Added Courses**

The Institution takes pride in the number of certificate and value added courses that it offers to its students. At the undergraduate level, the students can choose from a plethora of offerings from varied subjects like - Spanish, Animation, Photography , Industry Integrated Training and Management, Web Designing , Master Your Voice, Human Resource Management. This year 380 students opted for various certificate courses offered by the College. At the Post- graduate level, the following courses need special mention: Value added classes on SPSS have been arranged for MIB & M.Com final year students. This is done to help the students with statistical tools during their dissertation. Lectures on Quantitative Techniques and Logical Reasoning were arranged for MIB and M.Com 1st year students. This course enables students to understand quantitative aptitude and reasoning which would help them during placements.

#### **Placement Report**

Continuing the upward trend of final placement of students at St. Joseph's College of Commerce, the batch of 2013-14 has proven to be a promising one. This year's placement season was gratifying, both in terms of the response from the dynamic industry as well as the performance of the candidates.

With 15 companies vying to pick the best brains, finest leaders and superlative team workers of the college, 130 job offers were made to the batch in which 155 students applied.

The students landed into the corporate world and joined the recruitment process in 2014 with the following companies DE Shaw, ANZ, Zomato, Samsung, Amba Research and IBM. Among the other participating companies were Deloitte, Goldman Sachs, KPMG, Verity- UBS, Ernst and Young, Grant Thornton and Target.

Summer internship, opportunities, was offered to 23 students by Goldman Sachs. The average CTC this year was 2.68 lakhs pa as against 2.37 lakhs pa in the previous academic year. Of the total recruits, 93 students were from B.Com, and 36 were from BBM streams.

## Counselling and Student Development Programs

The counselling department helps students in coping with challenges, facilitating their overall growth and holistic personal development. The counselling department is always accessible and responsive to students' needs as and when they surface. The counsellors monitor the students' attendance and academic performance. They also extend their support to their families in times of need. As part of the Student Development Program, the counsellors conduct weekly Life Skills Classes to provide students with added exposure and to ensure their holistic growth.

#### **Students' Council Activities**

The year has experienced an overwhelming outburst of academia and an assortment of talent in various extracurricular activities. The enthusiastic intellects of St. Joseph's College of Commerce have exceeded all expectations and have ensured exemplary success for this academic year. The students and council of the College have actively hosted, participated and won many accolades during this time period. One note worthy mention however is the 'Rostrum' Speakers' Series initiated this year. His Excellency, Sri. Hans Raj Bhardwaj, the Governor of Karnataka, added an air of gravitas to the proceedings as he delivered the inaugural address of this Speakers' Series during the closing ceremony of Chanakya.

It is a pleasure to place on record that our College has won six championship trophies of the Bangalore University this year. Our College has won highest number of trophies from Bangalore University and is also been awarded a special trophy for achieving this distinction.

In the 49th Bangalore University Athletic championships out of 160 Colleges who participated, Meghana Shetty of class I B.Com B was awarded the best women Athlete of the Bangalore University meet. Meghana Shetty also represented India in athletics and won a gold medal in SAF games.

SJCC has expanded its infrastructure by constructing a new floor with state of the art facilities. The floor

consists of four classrooms with airy ergo cross ventilation. The rooms are equipped with audio visual facility including brand new LCD's. Furthermore, the new auditorium is SJCC's most treasured place which can accommodate over 500 people conveniently and makes it an ideal location for conducting seminars, group discussions and cultural events.

#### **Technical Up gradation**

It is a fact that technology is developing exponentially and hence our College, to be at par with the present trends in technology added many features relating to internet; website; ERP etc.

## INSTITUTION



#### RESEARCH

In the second session, choice of research topics on various issues in Marketing, Finance, Banking, Logistics were discussed. The aim of this workshop was to familiarize the students to write better.

Two students of M.Com Ist year also presented a paper at the 2 – day International Conference on "Revisiting the MBA in the Asia Pacific Context" organized by Xavier Institute of Management & Entrepreneurship (XIME) on January 30 and 31, 2014 at its Bangalore campus. Three students of M.Com Ist Year presented papers on the 2-day Seminar on "Empowering Employability in Higher Education" organized by Mount Carmel, Autonomous, Department of Commerce

in association with National Institute of Personnel Management, on February 6 & 7, 2014.

#### **INDUSTRIAL VISIT**

The PG students had their industrial visit to industries. #### **OUTREACH PROGRAMME**

Mahatma Gandhi once said "Be the change you want to see in the world" Going by this profound quote, our Post Graduate students took it upon themselves to reach out to the many destitute and abandoned children found on the streets of Bangalore, by collaborating with BOSCO.

BOSCO is an NGO working for the Young at Risk (i.e., children living on the streets, child labourers, abandoned / orphaned children, victims of drug abuse, victims of child abuse, children who beg, rag pickers etc ).

The entire 1st year PG batch was split into small groups with a student volunteer leader for each group. These groups visited slums, railway stations and bus stations and did a signature campaign to support child rights and their education. There were groups which worked for resource mobilization as well. These groups under the able mentoring of the Students Counselor, Ms. Radha collected a staggering figure of Rs, 1,50,000/.

The resource mobilization team in order to collect more money to BOSCO organized a food fest in college where in the whole college participated with great enthusiasm. All the U.G. and P.G. classes had to put up stalls compulsorily. The food fest got a good response and an amount of Rs. 43,600/- was collected. All the participants were given certificates and prizes based on best dish, most enthusiastic class and the class which collected maximum amount.
























'Virtuoso' is the annual inter-collegiate, national level management fest organised by the students of BBM under the supervision of Ms. Rency Alex, HOD of BBM. The theme this year was 'Broadway'. Under the co-ordination of various committees, 'Virtuoso-The Great White Way' was held on August 23 and 24, 2013.

Over forty colleges were invited, with nine colleges participating on the final days. Seven events were organized as part of Virtuoso this year.

In Finance -'The Producers', participants were judged on their ability to manage investments and maintain returns in an industry whose success is solely determined by the reaction of the public. Public relations - 'Chicago' saw participants being tested to their limits in handling problems while being scrutinized by the public. Closely linked to this was Marketing - 'Rock of Ages', which made participants focus on the importance of smart and opportunistic marketing strategies in a field where there is a constant battle to be in the limelight. Human Resources – 'Wizard of Oz' tested the quality of the participants in putting up a performance that satisfies one and all. Best manager - 'The Beast of Palace Theatre' was an event of cut-throat competition where every participant strives to be number one. Journalism-'The Front Page' saw participants being judged on their ability to scientifically report vital information which is new and current. Business Quiz-'Mary Poppins', tested the participants' knowledge in business trivia relating to a personality, a Brand/ Product, an Advertisement, Biz Event, and Corporate history.

The events were conducted in rounds spread over two days, with the dress code of corporate wear simulating an actual corporate event. Jain CMS were declared the overall winners of Virtuoso 2013.

# CIPHER- THINKING OUTSIDE THE BOX

Cipher, the intra-college business fest took place on June 26 and had 8 events: Best manager, Chief of Staff, Human Relations, Public Relations,



Business Quiz, Mock Stock, Finance and Marketing. The Business Quiz was designed to question the students on various business and commerce related topics of the day.

While the preliminary round was a written round, the final was a usual quiz round. The HR event had several grueling rounds, including presentation, 'culture shock', problems of HR employees, stress interviews and overnight reports. Mock Stock is a hypothetical stock exchange in which teams were given a time limit and a fixed budget to decide on a portfolio consisting of both securities and commodities. After the initial frenzy and rush to buy stocks from the brokers, the participants were given a certain range within which they could quote prices for their stock. The team with the highest profit was adjudged the winner.

Best Manager proved to be the most stressful event of the fest, as participants were asked to do anything to prove themselves better than the rest, such as reports, speeches, Facebook links and the selling of commodities among other tasks. Chief of Staff acted as a background event for this and participants were judged on their ability to handle the variety of tasks that they were challenged with.

Public Relations had participants battling it out to prove that they were the best at handling problems and maintaining relations with the public in times of crisis. Finance tested the finance gurus from various classes on their ability to handle investments and maintain returns. Marketing judged contestants on their ability to market their company as well as themselves.



The camp was instrumental in inspiring the students through talks, debates, discussions and many team building activities.

Many of the AICUF members attended the Gospel Fests of Mount Carmel College, Goodwill College, United Mission College, Bishop Cotton Christian College and "EXODUS" of St. Joseph's Arts and Science College. AICUF organized Fr. Ceyrac Memorial National Level essay competition in which many colleges participated. They also participated in a Flash mob on garbage disposal in collaboration with BBMP at Freedom Park. Students of SJCC participated in MAGGIS 2013 which witnessed 500 students participating from all over the country.

The members vociferously protested against the atrocities on women. They courageously spoke about Anti Human Trafficking. They visited a rehabilitation home where they wholeheartedly served the destitute and the orphans. AICUF organized





competitions during Christmas, followed by AICUF state congress election 2013-14 which was held on the college campus. The students also organized a food fest, the proceeds of which were given as charity to BOSCO.

# **CSA & FIESTA**

The Centre for Social Action is a student initiative of our college providing a platform for the students to give to the society and create a more sustainable future. The association is under the guidance of the staff coordinator Ms. Vinitha Philip. This year, the CSA conducted many events starting with a food fest during 'Kalotsav' to raise funds. This was followed by a pet show on the final day of the of the food fest. The association also conducted a Sports Day for our adopted Urdu Medium School which was a day of enthusiasm and passion for the schools kids who won several prizes.





The CSA with 'CRY- Child Rights & You' organized a workshop on how to support education in the country. The final and the main event of the association was an external seminar conducted on February 14, 2014 in collaboration with 'CARE- Centre for Amenities, Rehabilitation and Education' on the topic 'The Right to Education – a tool to bridge social exclusion'. The Chief Guest for the event was Mr. Umesh Aradhya (The chairperson of Karnataka State Commission for Protection of Child Rights) and this seminar was attended by 200 students from various colleges in and around Bangalore.

### **NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME**

The activities of National Service Scheme were inaugurated by Mr. Pravin Shivashankar from CRY (Chid Rights and You), an NGO working for child rights, on July 12, 2013. The students took an oath to serve the nation, to promote peace and harmony and to follow the NSS motto "Not me, but you". Mr. Pravin spoke on being responsible towards the society and motivated the students to serve the community. A Blood Donation camp was organized by NSS in collaboration with St. John's Medical College on July 20, 2013 in the College premises. A total of 131 units of blood were collected during the camp.





A special rural exposure camp was organized for the NSS volunteers from October 28 to November 3 in Kugonahalli, a village in Doddaballabur taluk. The camp was an unforgettable experience for the students who had never visited a village. Volunteers had to stay in the village for 8 days. They had to stay in the houses of the villagers, sharing their food, way of life and space. Students have to follow a schedule starting from meditation in the morning, manual work in the afternoon and cultural activities in the evening. The major highlight of the camp was a theatre serial performed by our students called 'Dharmadevathe'. The serial was directed by Mr. T H Lavakumar and Mr. Ravikiran R who had come as resource persons. The play managed to capture the attention of the entire village and close to 300 villagers assembled on the last day of the theatre serial. A strong bond developed between the villagers and the students. The NSS also donated crutchers and walking sticks for the physically challenged people in the village.

On January 9, 2014 the NSS along with Hashmi Theatre Forum organized an interactive session with Dr.V S Sreedhara on the 'Anti-superstitious practices bill of Karnataka'. The students were motivated to think about the society and act. The activities of the NSS was coordinated by Mr. Vinay Kambipura, Lecturer from the Department of English.





# **ROTARACT CLUB**

The Rotaract Club began its activities with the Installation Ceremony on August 29, 2013. The Chief Guests were District Rotaract Representative (DRR)-Rtr Mr. Arihant Kumar, Rev. Dr. Vinay K Samuel, and President Elect Rtn. Jasbir Singh Dhody. On August 31, the Rotaract Club conducted an interactive session with the students of Swansea University. The session was organized by the International Service Director and Co-Director, Rtr. Helen Sebastian and Rtr. Rathi Gowda. The main aim of the program was to make the students aware of their culture and understand other cultural set-ups. A District Leadership Training Workshop (DLTW) organised in September and threw light on the responsibilities of each board member and taught the essence of team work. In this regard the following programmes were organized to develop a sense of inquiry; abilities of analysis, criticism and interpretation.

**WORKSHOP ON DATA ANALYSIS** 

St. Joseph's College of Commerce conducted a UGC sponsored National workshop on August 29,

30 and 31, 2013, in the college auditorium on "Data Analysis using SPSS (DASS)". Organized by Rev. Fr. Sunith Prabhu SJ (Director, SJCC), Dr. Lily N. David (Former Principal, SJCC) and Ms. Ravi Darshini (IQAC coordinator), the target audience for this seminar included academicians, research scholars and corporate delegates.

Ms. Ravi Darshini, Ms. Ruqsana Anjum, Ms. Suganthi Pais and Ms. Gayathri S.Tampi represented the SJCC faculty at this seminar. Different resource persons were invited for each day to address the gathering on various topics. The seminar was spread over 3 days.

Each day ended with a Q&A session where doubts of the audience were cleared by the experienced guest





speakers. The seminar had a good response from those who attended it, and everyone was made aware of the important uses of statistics and its relevance in present day situations. The last day ended with a valedictory session.

# SYMPOSIUM ON 'ANTI-SUPERSTITIOUS PRACTICES BILL OF KARNATAKA'

The English Department conducted a one day symposium on the topic 'Rationality, Superstition and Democracy-Negotiating the Anti-Superstitious Practices Bill of Karnataka' on February 28, 2014. Prof. Makarand Paranjape of JNU delivered the keynote address which provided a context for further discussions on the topic. His talk offered a critique of Western understandings of rationality and reason. Dr.V S Sreedhara, Associate Director of CSSEIP at NLSUI, member of the draft committee of the bill spoke about the controversy surrounding the bill. Being totally committed to the discussion of



the issue he interacted with students, participants and other speakers. Mr. Siddhartha spoke about the work done by his NGO Firelies in and around Kanakapura, Bangalore south. He demonstrated how myths, legends and stories can be used in productive ways without having to abandon them in favour of westerns ideas of rationality and reason. His was a refreshing talk as he offered a totally different perspective. Mr. Chandrashekar Aijoor spoke about the socio-legal dimensions of the issue, and Dr. Anilkumar Belvadi presented the American experience of dealing with superstition. He offered case studies, statistics and made interesting points about different ways of dealing with problems of superstition. Prof. G K Govind Rao, former Professor of English at SICC, delivered the valedictory address by giving the whole issue a philosophical dimension. In October 2013, three students of St. Joseph's College of Commerce, Natasha George, Maya Krishnamurty, and Lolita Pinto along with Asst. Professor Ms. Tasmiya Hussni went to Kobe College, Japan on a Cultural Exchange Programme. They were warmly received at the Osaka Airport by the students of Kobe College.

on the first day, the students of Kobe College welcomed the group from SJCC with a mellifluous musical presentation. In turn, the students of SJCC presented Classical Odissi, Contemporary Dance and Bollywood Dance performance during this programme which was appreciated by the students and faculty of Kobe College. During their seven-day visit, the students of SJCC made presentations to the students of Kobe College on 'India's Economic Development since the 1990s', 'Women's Issues in India' and the 'Festivals of India'. They were exposed





to various facets of Japanese life and culture.

On the first day, they attended a Japanese Language Class and were treated to a traditional Japanese Lunch Box, the 'Bento', primarily consisting of sea food. The highlight of the trip was the visit to the historical capital of Japan, Kyoto. The day began with a visit to the ancient town of Gojo, where all students and staff were allowed to choose the colour of Kimono they wished to wear for the day. A Kimono is a multi-layered traditional Japanese attire that is characterised by traditional Japanese prints and is worn on ceremonious occasions or while visiting ancient temples. They visited the Buddhist Temple at Kinkaku-ji, the famous monument where a relic of Buddha has been preserved. They also visited the temples of Kiyomizu-Dera and Jishu.

The group from SJCC also participated in traditional craft making of Japanese paper (Washi) at Najio and was part of the famous Japanese Tea Ceremony (Chano-yu), an experience to be treasured. Being guests at the Cha-no-yu, they witnessed the preparation and ceremonial presentation of 'matcha' or green tea. They were led to the tea room where they bowed to their hosts, accepted a small sweet 'wagashi', received the bowl of tea, took a sip and complimented their host before passing it on to the other guests.

They also visited Japanese stationery manufacturing company 'Kokuyo' for a brief presentation on how Japanese business operates and their work ethic. The company with the concept of 'Universal Design' focused on manufacturing unique multipurpose stationery. The visit was an extremely enriching experience for students of both colleges and allowed them to understand and share different aspects of each other's culture and business.

# INTERNATIONAL INDUSTRIAL VISIT TO SPAIN AND PORTUGAL

In today's world, it is extremely essential to have practical knowledge in addition to the mundane academic courses provided in institutions which is restricted to the four walls of a class room. St. Joseph's College of Commerce understands this aspect of education the best and hence gives its students an opportunity to be a part of an International Industrial

visit. This year, the countries chosen for the visit were Spain and Portugal. A group of close to fifty students were part of this tour with two staff members- Mrs. Vinitha Philip and Mrs. Anita Rosemary. They visited places like Barcelona, Madrid, Sevielle, Lisbon and Toledo.

The group departed on the 23rd of October to Barcelona via Doha. Barcelona is known as the Port City and is one of the world's most popular tourist destinations, attracting millions of visitors each year. The following day, they visited:

- Camp Nou A famous football stadium
- Montjuic castel An old military fortress, currently serving as a Barcelona municipal facility
- EAE Business School EAE stands for Escuela de Administración de Empresas.
- Sagrada Familia The largest Roman Catholic Church in Barcelona, and one of Spain's most visited tourist attractions.
- La Rambla The city's most famous street and is a bustling hive of activity.

After Barcelona, their next destination was Madrid. The next morning they started out with a city tour that comprised of the Bull fighting Arena and Palacio Real which is the Royal Palace in Madrid. It is the official residence of the King of Spain although only used for state ceremonies.

They were also taken to the oldest part of Madrid which was bustling with activity. After completing the tour, they headed for The Warner Bros' Theme Park. They spent most part of the day at the theme park and left to the city center, Gran Via for dinner in an Indian Restaurant. It is the most commercial avenue in Madrid. They returned to the hotel after a long day of adventure and sightseeing and stayed overnight at Madrid.

The agenda for the day was to move to Sevielle which is en route to Portugal. It was a long drive from Madrid and arrived at Sevielle at 4p.m. A small group departed as soon as they reached the city and headed for sky diving which is an adventure sport. Post lunch a walking tour in the city was organized. This included Giralda- which is a former minaret that

was converted to a bell tower for the Cathedral of Seville in Seville. The students also visited the Sevielle Cathedral which is the Cathedral of Saint Mary of the See. One of the last Gothic cathedrals to be built in Spain, the Seville cathedral is an impressive building slightly influenced by the Renaissance. A Flamenco show was organized for post dinner.

The next day, they moved to Lisbon in Portugal. The Ponte 25 de Abril (25th of April Bridge) is the oldest bridge across the Tagus River in Lisbon. It is a two km long suspension bridge opened in 1966 after almost four years of construction.

They used this bridge to get to Lisbon and it was a wonderful sight of the port. They later visited José Maria da Fonseca winery which is the oldest table wine company in Portugal. It was founded in 1834,

and is now in its 7th generation and sells its wines in all continents. They not only visited the winery but also got a chance to taste two types of wine-Periquita and Muscatel.

The seventh day of the tour was to be spent in Toledo, Spain. They departed from Lisbon and drove to Toledo for about 5-6 hours. Toledo is a municipality located in central Spain, 70 km south of Madrid.

They reached Toledo and lunch was arranged in a local restaurant. Post lunch, a walking tour was organized and they got to see the Toledo Cathedral. It is ranked among the greatest Gothic structures in Europe. After taking time off to click pictures against the beautiful Cathedral, the students moved to a swords outlet. Toledo is known for the swords made there, and this outlet had every kind of sword. After





the tour, they proceeded towards Madrid via Eurorail. Dinner was arranged post which they got to their Hotel and spent the night in Madrid after which they returned to India after a happy and satisfied stay in Spain and Portugal.

### **KERALA**

As part of the curriculum, 150 students, from the department of Travel & Tourism, went on a 3 day 2 night field visit, with 7 teachers and 3 student coordinators, to Kerala. They visited 3 places, namely, Alleppey, Kochi and Munnar.

Alappuzha, also known as Alleppey, is considered to be one of the oldest planned towns in the region. It is an excellent tourist attraction and also called the 'Venice of the East' due to the same. The students explored the following areas:

- Vembanad Lake Vembanad Lake is India's longest lake. It is also called Kerala's backwater. The students enjoyed a 3 hour houseboat ride in Vembanad Lake.
- Alappuzha beach- Once a major Kerala port, Alappuzha beach is now a mere tourist destination, with a lighthouse and the Alappuzha sea bridge, which now lies in ruins.

Cochin, also known as Kochi, is a major port city on the west coast of India by the Arabian Sea and is a part of the district of Erunakulam in the state of Kerala. It was a major hub of spice trade since the 14th century. Students visited the following places:

 St. Francis Church- St. Francis CSI Church, built in 1503, is the oldest European Church in India. The famous Portuguese explorer, Vasco Da Gama, died in Cochin in 1524. He was buried here but 14 years later his remains were transported to Lisbon.

 Lulu International Shopping Mall- the Lulu mall in Kochi is Asia's second largest mall. The 17 acre complex also contains a 20-storey 5 star hotel managed by J.W. Marriot. The mall is a major tourist attraction in Cochin.

Munnar is a town in Kerala falling in the Western Ghats. It is situated 1600m above sea level. It is famed as a quiet hill station for tourists and an ancient town containing tea estates over a century old. Students visited the following areas:

- Spice garden/Fish spa- En route to Munnar, from Cochin, come the spice gardens and fish spa. The garden's primary objective is to collect the naturally occurring rubber from the tree sap. A guide was appointed to show the students around. The fish spa is a relaxing treatment involving Doctor Fish cleaning one's feet of dead skin cells. Students enjoyed this treatment.
- Mattupetty dam/Eco point- The Mattupetty
  Dam in Munnar is located near the Idukki district.
  Opened in 1953, it is a vital source of power
  generation for the district. It attracts several
  tourists annually as it is a great spot for adventure
  tourism and trekking.
- Kanan Devan Tea Plantations-The tea plantations have existed in Munnar for almost 200 years, with its photogenic view covering the hillside. It covers several acres of land and has plants that yield white tea, green tea and black tea.



This trip helped provide the students with useful insight on the working of the tourism industry and its components and will surely help further in their careers.

# SWANSEA CULTURAL EXCHANGE PROGRAMME

St. Joseph's College of Commerce and Swansea University have a twinning programme in which students can opt for the international programme where out of the three years of college, the 1st year will be spent at St. Joseph's and the remaining years will be spent at Swansea University in UK. Hence, both the institutions share a very good relationship and students have been flying to UK, for quite some time now. Apart from this, in order to enable the students get a better idea of the university and the culture in Swansea, Cultural exchange programmes are organized every year.

The Cultural exchange programme involves not just the students from our college visiting Swansea University but also students coming down to Bangalore to get familiar with the Indian culture and the educational practices here. This year, the Cultural exchange was scheduled to happen during the summer vacation. The students were to depart in the last week of April and return in the first week of May. They were welcomed by one of the co-ordinators at Swansea and were provided with a welcome kit each.

It was a group of nine students along with Rev. Dr. Stany D'souza, SJ. A fellowship was arranged with the students from the university and the student co-ordinators. Each of the students had a buddy

and there was an informal session with everyone present there. Some of the buddies were scheduled to visit Bangalore soon and so questions about the weather in Bangalore and everything else were being asked by them. The group was taken to a lot of places, beginning with a walking tour of the University, followed by a walking tour of Swansea. Most of the important places were covered in the tour. A traditional British lunch was organized at one of the most renowned restaurants there. They were also taken to the tallest building in Swansea to get an aerial view of the place.

A visit to one of the oldest mines was a memorable experience as they had to go underground to get a glimpse of how mining works. This was followed by a talk on the mine, its history and everything else about it. Since Swansea University is known for Economics, a lecture was scheduled on one of the economics topics. It was an interesting one and very well explained. On the last day in Swansea, a cultural programme was organized and there they learnt the Welsh traditional dance and got an opportunity to taste the famous soup called Cawl. All in all, it was a wonderful experience and gave them a lot of memories to cherish.


# LSE - LONDON SCHOOL OF ECONOMICS





Dissertation- It the most crucial phase of every post graduate student. It just made us realise how beautiful and how extensively our minds can think on various subjects.



## INTERVIEW WITH LAWRENCE LIANG



Lawrence Liang is an alumnus of SJCC. He graduated from the National Law School of India University, Bangalore and pursued a Master's degree in Warwick, England

on a Chevening Scholarship. He is a legal researcher and lawyer based in the city of Bangalore, and is known for his legal campaigns on issues of public concern. He is a co-founder of the Alternative Law Forum, and by 2006 had emerged as a spokesperson against the politics of "intellectual property".

Liang's key areas of interest are law, popular culture and piracy. He has been working closely with Sarai, New Delhi on a joint research project 'Intellectual Property and the Knowledge/Culture Commons'. Liang is a "keen follower of the open source movement in software", and has been working on ways of translating the open source ideas into the cultural domain. We would like to thank Mr Liang for giving us time for an interview. Below are extracts from the interview.

**Blue Chip** -Why did you choose Law as a career after Commerce?

Lawrence Liang - I actually decided I wanted to be a lawyer pretty early but I didn't know why. The assumption for a number of people was that you like to engage in certain kinds of intellectual discussion or you're argumentative so you want to become a lawyer. NLS was just about to start when we were in Commerce College. It seemed that the place promised something new. It was a bit of a gamble because there hadn't been a single batch that had graduated yet from that Law School yet. Only two other people till then from Joseph's had done law. If this place could deliver even 20% of what it was promising, it would be a significant step upwards for our education. So that was primarily the reason.

**BC**-The areas you specialize in- why did you choose the fields related to piracy, copyrights etc?

**BC**- Coming to specifics, you are working on the case of Wendy Doniger's book and I wanted to know about your role in it.

**LL**-It is pretty straight forward. In Indian tradition there is a rich history of upholding free speech. There have been a number of controversies from the 20's on what can be uttered and what can be read in the public domain. Indian courts have consistently held in favour of authors and in favour of freedom of speech. This is a rare instance where without a court order or a judicial announcement on the issue, the publishers voluntarily went ahead and withdrew the book. We found that to be particularly offensive. So we sent a Legal Notice, as from an aggrieved community of readers. If you see the tone of the notice, it is half serious, half performative. Over the last 10 years this has been on the rise. With the release of any book or movie, there is a chance some one's sentiments will be hurt. What about the sentiments of the ordinary readers? What happens to sentiments of atheists? As a reader and a bibliophile, I am gravely offended when someone says you cannot read a book.

Part of the notice was also to articulate on a new jurisprudence of what we can read or write. Because, typically censorship involves a state and an author or the speaker, it does not involve the public. Although public always has the right to claim that their sentiments are hurt, but what does it mean for the public to claim participation in free speech?

So I suppose one of the reasons I continue to enjoy the legal profession is it stands for the ideal of a certain intellectual because of the use of creativity in the work done. You normally think that lawyers are dull drab boring people - 99% are and the rest 1% are Ally McBeals. Every once in a while the possibility of actually trying to figure out the problem and trying to figure out different ways of looking at the problem remains the motivation of being in the field.

**BC** - How do your campaigns use social media? What do you think is the impact of social media on your campaigns?

LL- I run away from social media for different reasons. As campaigns go, we obviously recognize the absolute efficacy of social media. You can look at it as a paradigm shift in communication. Communication traditionally has been a one-to-many approach, it's about single channel broadcasting to many parts of the world. In the Indian context, this is a typical Doordarshan model. The state determines what you can see. So the paradigm with social media is that we are moving from a one-to-many to many-tomany, peer-to peer unfiltered communication. In a way there is nothing new about it. There have always been forms of social media. Rumour was the first form of unfiltered peer-to-peer communication. Rumours were very important; if you look at the etymology of the idea of "rumours", rumours were sought to be regulated during the French Revolution because these were the ways in which the citizenry mobilized themselves. There have always been ways in which the noise of the public has been controlled by the state.

So if you look at the first model, it gives rise to the idea of paternal access to information. In paternal access, when you treat the citizenry as children, there is a paternal manner in which you allow forms of speech between citizens.

The paradigm shift of social media is where you move from paternal access to defined access. The debate around censorship is ridiculous. Copies of Doniger's book are available everywhere online. So you really can't stop anyone from getting it. What is this facade of maintaining the idea that it can be controlled? You are talking about a situation where people have moved away from being treated as children. From controlled regulation in terms

of a paternal access to a defined access, you have your information, you want it immediately, and you don't want people to determine what you can read. One of the things that you need to remember is that censorship, in terms of the debate around censorship, always happens for an imaginary other person. It's never for you and me. If I ask you, do you believe that I should control what you read or your parents should control what you read and your answer to me would be No. You are an adult and you can make up your own mind.

So who is censorship for?

The argument will be that censorship is for an X category. And the X-category is the illiterate person who is not us. They are more passionate. They cannot distinguish reality, illusion etc. Censorship has been around for more than a 100 years. The British introduced censorship in India precisely on these racial grounds that Indians were not mature enough to make up their minds. If we continue to recycle these oriental myths about ourselves, what kind of a democratic country are we?

The idea that social media brought about such a massive change, we were interested in it right from the beginning. Internet came into India in my final year of college, around 1995. Till then all the research was hard work, going through dusty shelves, huge books, etc.

Take the example of something as simple as conducting a romance with someone. Can you imagine romance without a mobile phone or without email? For your generation, in a way, that would be inconceivable. Your parents wrote letters. You sent a letter and you waited. You waited for the letter to reach which took 10 days; you waited for the letter to come back to you, which took 20 days. Now if you send an sms and you don't get a reply within 10 seconds, you get anxiety. You refresh on

your email. So in a way, technology has become a part of an intimate aspect of how we deal with life.

So when one talks to me about social media as though it is a radical new thing that has happened, I think every generation experiences its own sense of time and technology as unique to them, but it is important to draw continuity between different kinds of technological movements.

The introduction of print technology and the introduction of books radicalized the idea of knowledge; you look at the period before books, i.e. before it became a mass commodity when books were copied by hand. That meant an immense amount of labour and took an immense amount of time. The value of the book was very, very kind of high and only the rich could afford books. So you had books that were literally chained-they were that valuable. Then the print revolution came and changed the way people accessed books. That brought out an entire understanding of literacy in a new way.

The digital movement changes how you read and write, I know that the language my nieces speak is very different from my language, I don't understand a lot of what they say because most of it is SMS language. But you have to look at the fact that this is how it is. Campaigns and social movements have always used social media. There has never been a moment in history when a campaign hasn't used media. Even in campaigns like the Narmada Bachao Andolan, which was a movement against the building of a dam, they used pamphlets, they used the radio and they used trunk calls, phones and newspapers.

With social media, obviously the ability to reach out to people becomes much wider. So you think you can start a campaign on change.org and get 20,000 signatures. But it also brings up the question on what the campaign is, because if you have 20,000 people signing on to your campaign that's nice, but it's very easy to click on something and say that you are in solidarity and you support it. It might be a nice kind of well-meaning gesture, with no content and substance.

How do you translate the mobilizing technology of social media against what you see in the real world? That's a tough challenge. I don't think people have figured it out entirely. There's a rapid transition and we are learning as we go on. It was a kind of reporting that we saw, including TV media, it was primarily the kind of reporting and writing we saw, primarily in Times of India and electronic media, it was depressing. So we felt we needed a forum where we could discuss and respond on all kinds of political issues, which was not based or dependent on mainstream media. And you can do it now.

- **BC** So it is big media vs new media according to you?
- **LL** There is a very nice image that Arundhati Roy has mentioned when she talks about ants with microphones. Ants are what I think characterize social media.
- BC When you speak about everything becoming spontaneous and instantaneous, supposing you post something political (as happened with two girls in Maharashtra) and you have a like on it, how much can we regulate?
- LL Here's something we need to figure out. The State is always nervous about new technologies. From cinema to radio to print, every time there is in change in communication technology, it increases the potential for people to participate in public life and that means new kinds of political formations can happen like the AAP. So the law in responding to social media uses the only language it knows, which means repressing, controlling and shutting down. So what is the problem with, for example, say Facebook and people being criminalised for likes; it equates the individual blogger with the press. But the individual blogger does not have the same sovereign force as the authority. That is one problem.

Then again what social media has done is that it has collapsed the distinction between event and narrative. Earlier we had an event happening and there was a certain time before it was narrated. So when Indira Gandhi was assassinated there was time till it sank in with people, but that has collapsed

with social media. We also had the case of the N.E. people migrating from Bangalore, without even a single killing or injury, we had the Rapid Action Force holding flag marches. This was unheard of.

#### "the social media acts as the nerve and the law is something which regulates the body"

This is the kind of language or political idiom that social media introduces. As mentioned earlier, these are intimate technologies. The devices you carry are so much like an extension of the human bodies. If we look at in physiological terms, the social media acts as the nerve and the law is something which regulates the body. So when we have the body acting in a hyper nervous condition (as the nerves are sensitive), there is a heightening of the conflict; the media is dependent on sensation. We talk of sensational media. Sensational news is when the sensation is 24X7 and pleads your attention; think of a state when a person is constantly excited, a state of disorder or when somebody is breaking down. In the context of social media, what is the answer? We need to figure out how to practice withdrawal from the media. The law cannot do anything.

- BC Another aspect of social media is of course, how much you are giving out about yourself and the loss of privacy.
- LL Yes. We have reached a stage where you don't need to hire a private detective. The lines between public and private are disappearing. At one level we have the big brother snooping on us. On the other we have a massive invasion of rights. On Facebook, we have created a culture where we talk a lot about ourselves and make it available to strangers. This is why the media does what it does and gets away with it. There is a bomb blast and they shove the mike on someone's face and ask him how he is feeling. Someone is getting married and they jump onto trees and try to record them. So you create a culture in which there are no boundaries, there is ethical dilution. Everything is about public consumption.

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#### "Most people take it for granted that I am who I am on Facebook. But what does it mean for you to be who you are, as a performance?"

There are three distinct histories of the internet. Initially, it was the Multi-User Dungeons, it was just textual, imagine an internet with no images, there's only green text. People were creating artificial and virtual worlds there; they were creating a personaa voice that comes from behind a mask. In a way, the mask that we wear of who we are has always been mediated by technology. The second phase was that of a second life, where you created an avatar for yourself. And then you have Facebook. On Facebook, you're supposed to be who you are. And therein lies a big challenge. What does it mean to pretend to be who you are? I think it is a deeply interesting question. I think the performance itself raises deep philosophical problems in a way in which people who are doing it are not answering. Most people take it for granted that I am who I am on Facebook. But what does it mean for you to be who you are, as a performance? It is a performative space where you are creating various avatars of yourself.

It is interesting in what it allows us to think about. There are both pros and cons. I can't imagine living without the internet. The world was a little less interesting without the internet. But at the same time, it had more depth. Surface has become everything. Technology as a representation of the world and also as a mirror that provides you with a self-image, what you have is a proliferation of screens or mirrors constantly reflecting forms of yourself back. But when you have so many screens reflecting so many images, what you have is the equivalent of a shattered mirror, from which you are refracting into a million pieces. So there is a splintering of the self that is happening, which I think is the key challenge of thinking about the self on the internet.

**BC** - Is there a message that you have for college students regarding social media?

**LL** - I think it's for you to figure out for yourself. Be in it, do what you want to. But you need to learn to withdraw from it from time to time. It is an immersive world. Especially when the internet is available on your phone, there isn't a moment when you aren't connected. Then you have to ask yourself the question: what is the virtue of being connected all the time? If even in the deepest cave that you go to and the highest mountain that you climb you remain connected, how do you withdraw? I think it is crucial to withdraw.

## "But sometimes, it's good to skip the party."

Reading books is also an immersive experience. There's something called the F rule of reading. Look at the capital F.This was a world that required your absolute attention and creative imagination and I used to read non-stop for 6 hours without a break. But I don't remember the last time I read a book completely, it is almost impossible now. We all read many books at the same time and the demand on our attention is multitasking. There is too much information which we are constantly filtering and perceiving. The F Rule in reading is that you have moved away from reading culture to scanning culture. That is a loss of a certain kind of experience. The only thing that you can do is recognize that you are not a slave of technology. But at one level, you are a slave, in the sense that, if you're the only one from your class not on Facebook, you're likely to be the only one not in the joke or not in the party. But sometimes, it's good to skip the party.

"It has been said that democracy is the worst form of government except all the others that have been tried."

-Winston Churchill

It's odd for one of the most belligerent defenders of Democracy to utter such a harsh sentence against

the very institution of which he was the succor, but his sentiment is still echoed by us all. The formal roots of democracy lay in the forums of Athens, wherein every free born citizen could vote on all matters of security and state. Every major policy mooted by the *boule*, their executive body, would be tabled before the citizens to ensure that their voices would be part of the state's collective action. Over time, this form of direct democracy was diluted by demographic constraints and a general sense of ennui that encompassed most people.

Democracy, in essence, became of the people, for the people, by some of the people.

We've distanced ourselves from the very foundations of democracy by divorcing ourselves from the democratic processes. We used to lack the formal mechanisms to collate the collective views of our fellow citizens across all walks of life because besides taxes and death, there was nothing to unite all the people of any country. There have been several experiments in democracy conducted by political scientists in the laboratories of former communist countries as they join the brotherhood of nations. Of the many revolutions that rocked the world in recent times, the smallest, but perhaps the most potent one, was the pots and pans revolution in Iceland. They suffered near economic collapse during the 2008 recession and were crippled by natural disasters, but the eruption of Eyjafjallajökull was matched solely by the public foment that enveloped the country recently. The people, channeling the spirit of Howard Beale from the 1976 movie Network, 'were mad as hell and weren't going to take this anymore'. They took to the streets with their cutlery and raised a din against the government, quite literally.

The ramifications of this were quite startling. The government acceded to having the entire constitution of Iceland crowd sourced by the people of Iceland. They harnessed both Facebook and Twitter to collate the views of all the people on the future of Iceland as a country. This online referendum took a period of one year to table before the Icelandic Parliament, although the results weren't as exuberant as one would have expected. "I like wearing long sleeves", Lizzie (name changed) smiled. "It helps me cover my drawings". I did not quite understand what she meant. Until I rolled her sleeves up: parallel red lines contrasted on her pale skin. I knew her for a year and a half now, and I knew she came from a dysfunctional family, she needed help sometimes, but she got along just fine with the rest of us. Lately she's been keeping to herself, reserved and very remorse. Her depressing statuses and pictures with mostly shades of black in them with smudged eyes gave us the cue to have "the talk" with her. We worked out a schedule for her, where she would spend more time socialising and attending painting workshops just to keep her occupied and rarely connected to the internet.

I was curious at first, as good friends it was our responsibility to get her out of her melancholy, I looked it up online, typical as I am, and found Google suggesting me with a lot of websites that gave detailed descriptions of what self-harm was and why people resorted to it. I found that my friend wasn't the only victim but a lot of other teenagers resort to such disturbing practices to relieve themselves of emotional pain by inflicting physical injury. And some of them are only 13-17 years of

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age, much younger than Lizzie. I read in one of the articles that enumerated the causes of self-harm that online activity can speed up this process and turn them suicidal. Social media has been playing a brilliant job by trying to curb such practices by providing online forums, help groups etc., but other main stream websites such as Facebook, Twitter and Tumblr are radically speeding up the process. #self-harm, I searched Twitter. A retweet from a young girl; 'If I ever ran away from home, I'm sure my family wouldn't even notice.' I thought. 'Who could be posting this kind of thing?' And that is how the can of worms came to open. I found that the tweet came from an account prefixed 'Worthless' and from opening that account I found Twitter kindly offering me a plethora of related accounts that I 'may like,' and believe me when I say they are not in short supply. After around ten minutes or so of Twitter surfing I came across another account from a girl, who was 'so tempted to cut, but it'd be over the cuts from yesterday.' So she decided to 'just live with the pain.'

Another account disturbingly contained the line, 'loves seeing blood drip down her legs.' And what shocked me even more were the accompanying images. Bleeding and scarred arms, collections of razors and even instructions on self-harm. All this came as a complete surprise to me and I was left shaken, but it didn't take long for me to find out that this kind of thing is not uncommon at all. Selfharm and depression has almost come to the stage that it is now glamorised via social media. It has become 21st century poetry for the smart phone generation. Pictures of young girls and their torn arms with a lyric from their favourite melancholic songs scrawled across in italics are a norm on sites such as Tumblr. Unlike Facebook, which has a policy of removing self-harm related content and other triggers and providing the poster with help lines and such, sites like Twitter and Tumblr have some catching up to do. Though these posts are taken down only when they are reported or flagged, it's out there in the open, like a Dementor sucking up the happiness of anyone who comes its way.

This is a serious problem. To Twitter, Tumblr and the likes, I send this message: Take some responsibility for the actions and behaviours your sites are promoting. Do something about it now. This is

young people's mental and physical health we are talking about here. To you, the reader, if you see the likes of these posts, do something about it. Report it, if you know the person, talk to them, and send them in the right direction. There is plenty of help out there.

Social media is one of the most talked-about forms of communication at present, due to its enormous and constantly growing user base, ability to allow genuine two-way, real time mass communication on a scale that was inconceivable a decade ago, and "cool" and "high-tech" image. Its utility as a tool of political mass mobilization was demonstrated graphically in the Arab Spring revolts of 2011, when millions of protesters across Egypt, Tunisia, Bahrain, and the rest of the Arab world rose to fight for democracy, freedom of speech, and equality.


However, social media has a darker side to it. Political

parties use it routinely for their mass mobilization campaigns, using hundreds of online members to harass and bully political opponents and dissidents into submission. More worryingly, terrorist and extremist groups have been known to use social media to communicate across cells and gain new members. In 2011, mobs set fire to buildings and businesses across London, England, using social media to coordinate their orgy of destruction. Vague threats of violence against North-Eastern immigrants in Bangalore in early 2013 spread via social media and caused thousands of people to flee home in a panic. Governments have sought to regulate it - China has been extremely restrictive of freedom of speech in any form of social media, while the Supreme Court said in 2013 that social media could not remain exempt from regulation. Edward Snowden's revelation of Project PRISM showed that social media was being used as a valuable spying tool, with governments seeking to purchase information from companies or decrypt it directly. Even if freedom of speech is not threatened, users remain vulnerable to being spied upon, and no one knows if a harmless statement is likely to bring upon government intervention, or the intervention of violence by local political parties (as two girls in Mumbai fell victim to). Furthermore, every user of social media is continuously spying upon others, and being spied upon by others, with peer pressure itself being a form of censorship. In social media, freedom of speech is limited, and in danger of being restricted further.

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#### **Overview of Open Access Journals**

The World Wide Web (WWW) provides the means for research scholars to make their research results available to anyone, anywhere, at any time. This applies to journal articles regardless of whether or not their library has a subscription to the journal in which the articles were published as well as to other types of research output such as conference papers, theses or research reports. This is known as Open Access. This Open access (OA) practice provides unrestricted access via the Internet to peer-reviewed scholarly research. It is most commonly applied to scholarly journal articles, but it is also increasingly being provided to theses, scholarly monographs and book chapters.

The Open Access research literature is composed of free, online copies of peer-reviewed journal articles and conference papers as well as technical reports, theses and working papers. In most cases there are no licensing restrictions on their use by readers. They can therefore be used freely for research, teaching and other purposes.





एक कहावत है - गाँव ईश्वर ने बनाए है और शहर आदमी ने। भारत एक कृषि प्रधान देश है। भारत की अधिकांश जनसंख्या गाँवों में रहती है। ग्रामीण जीवन प्राकृति और स्वास्थ्यवर्धक है जबिक शहरी जीवन प्रदूषित और प्राकृतिक आबोहवा से रहित है। जहाँ गाँवों का वातावरण शुध्द और शांत होता है वही शहरों का वातावरण कोलाहलपूर्ण एवं अशुद्ध है।

शहरी जीवन चमक-दमक और आडम्बरपूर्ण होता है। गाँवों की अपेक्षा शहरों में व्यक्ति विज्ञान के ह र आविष्कार का आनंद उठा सकता है और बीमारी की अवस्था में हर प्रकार की चिकित्सा करवा सकता है। परंतु गाँवों में शहरों जैसी सुविधा उपलब्ध नहीं हैं।

गाँवों में लोग रोज़मर्रा की जरूरतों के लिए एक दूसरे पर निर्भर होते हैं। वे अपने सुख-दुःख आपस में बाँट लेते हैं। वे एक दूसरे के लिए सदैव तैयार रहते हैं। शाम के वक्त वे चौपाल पर बैठते है और एक-दूसरे के हाल-चाल पूछते है तथा कहानी-किस्से सुनाते हैं। सर्दियों में वे एक साथ बैठकर आग तापने का आनद

लेते हैं। ग्रामीण लोग किसी अजनबी की भी तन-मन-धन से सहायता करते हैं जबिक शहर में जीवन इसके विपरीत है। वहाँ किसी के पास समय नहीं है – न साथ बैठकर कहानी-किस्से सुनने का, न हाल-चाल पूछने का और न ही आग तपने का। चोर-लुटेरों के डर के कारण शहरी लोग किसी अजनबी की भी कोई मदद नहीं करते।

ग्रामीण लोग अशिक्षित होने के साथ-साथ धार्मिक भी होते हैं। वे अपने बच्चों को स्कूल भेजने के बजाय अपनी सहायता के लिए अपने साथ खेतों पर ले जाते हैं, जबकी शहरों में अधिकांश लोग शिक्षित होते हैं और लगभग सभी बच्चे स्कूल जाते हैं।

यह सच है कि गाँवों में ताजा शुद्ध हवा है, पौष्टिक भोजन और शांत वातावरण मनुष्य के शरीर और मनोमस्तिष्क को स्वस्थ बनाता है जबकि शहरों में इसका सर्वदा अभाव होता है और अधिकांश खाना मिलावटी मिलता है। इसके बावजूद गाँवों को शहर बनाने के प्रयास के लिए बहुत कोशिशें जारी है। खेतों को काँलोनियों में तब्दील किया जा रहा है। इसके बहुत से दूरगामी परिणाम होंगे।



### बाल मज़दूरी

बाल श्रम का मतलब ऐसे कार्य से है जिसमें किसी कार्य करनेवाला व्यक्ति कानून द्वारा निर्धारित आयु सीमा से छोटा होता है। इस प्रथा को कई देशों और अन्तर्राष्ट्रीय संघटनों ने शोषित संघटनों में शोषित करने वाली प्रथा माना है। अतीत में बाल श्रम का कई प्रकार से उपयोग किया जाता था। लेकिन सार्वभौमिक स्कूली शिक्षा, औद्योगीकरण, काम करने में परिवर्तन तथा काम गारों श्रम अधिकार और बच्चों अधिकार की अवधारणाओं के चलते इसमें जनविवाद प्रवेश कर गया। बाल श्रम अभी भी कुछ देशों में आम है।

यह अनुचित या शोषित माना जाता है यदि निश्चित उम्र से कम कोई बच्चा घर के काम या स्कूल के काम को छोड़कर कोई अन्य काम करता है। किसी भी नियोक्ता को एक निश्चित आयु से कम के बच्चे को किराया पर रखने की अनुमित नहीं है। न्यूनतम आयु देश पर निर्भर करता है। जैसे संयुक्त राज्य अमेरिका में बाल श्रम कानून ने किसी प्रतिष्ठान में बिना माता-पिता की सहमित के न्यूनतम उम्र 16 वर्ष निर्धारित किया है। आज कई उद्योग और निगम है जिनको कार्यकर्ताओं द्वारा बाल श्रम के कारण लक्षित किया जा रहा है।

बाल श्रम एक अपराध है और बंद कर दिया जाना चाहिए और छात्रों के रूप में हम बाल श्रम को दूर करने के बारे में जागरूकता का प्रचार प्रसार करना चाहिए।

Il faut toujours se souvenir de ces sculpteurs anciens qui faisaient leur travail merveilleux dans les églises, les temples, mais ne laissaient pas leurs noms en dessous : l'orgueil et l'avidité d'être reconnu étaient loin de leur coeur ; plutôt, l'amour pour leur métier et le dédicace de leurs meilleurs sentiments vers le Dieu règnaient en maître.

## Stealing or transmitting? Another angle to look at "piracy"

'Piracy' is often considered to be something unequivocally bad: opinions are often black and white, razor sharp. Of course, there is the question of the artist who has worked, or rather often of the studio that is promoting the artist while spending millions to profit by even more, but who, or which, does rake in much less money because of the piracy: however, here is where one should go more in depth. Why the word 'piracy'? If I download a film, I do not distribute it for money, have I done something what the sea pirates do? But then why don't we say the same, or worse, thing for that promoter who exploits the artist shamelessly? 
