This year, the institution has further strengthened its faculty base by including seven faculty members to the Commerce Department and two Counsellors to the Counselling Department.

The college believes that learning is a continuous, evolutionary process. In order to enable and facilitate our faculty to enrich and enhance their knowledge and skills, the College is committed to organizing Staff Enrichment Programs. In the academic year 2014-15, our staff have participated in seven enrichment programs and three national seminars organised by the institution and have recorded 70 representations in Seminars, workshops, conferences and symposiums organised across the country. Research at St. Joseph's College of Commerce has become a Constant, rather than merely an Initiative. At present there are seven ongoing minor research projects taken up by our faculty members:

- Prof Dr. Rajaram (HOD Department of English) published a highly appreciated and well received **handbook for English learning titled *Smart English***, in 2014. It has sold a thousand copies in six months and has gone into the second print.
- Prof. L. Augustin Amaladas, & Anitha Mary S **authored a text book** titled 'Cost Management'.

In the academic year 2014-15 alone our staff have ardently researched on several pertinent Economic and social issues and have 36 research papers published in reputed national and international journals.

Some of our staff members have been invited to take up privileged professional assignments such as being a part of the **NAAC Peer team** for assessment and accreditation of Colleges, being on the governing/ academic boards of other institutions and appointed as external examiners in PhD evaluation.

The institution also takes pride in announcing that, every year, several reputed institutions visit our campus to study the working of the institution particularly its innovations and best practices. These visits undoubtedly remain mutually beneficial. St. Joseph's College of Commerce is blessed with an impressive diversity of students and it has been our joy and duty to cater to their diverse needs. The strength of the student body for the year 2014-15 stands at 1875 students. The B.Com department expanded its capacity and included a new section this year.

The Institution is committed to producing students whose academic competence, complements a sense of responsibility and commitment to the society. Examinations and grades play a pivotal role in achieving our objective of Academic Excellence.



We are pleased to announce that the performance of our students in the academic year 2014-15 has been excellent and reflective of our efforts to deliver academic excellence. Detailed results have been presented in the annual report.

The institution strongly believes in complimenting classroom discussions with industry perspectives and during the last year alone, the institution has organised 61 input sessions in the form of guest lectures or seminars for student enrichment and our students have 28 research papers to their credit during the year.

The extension and outreach activities of the Institution, though varied in nature and substance, strive to achieve the objectives of Jesuit education, especially creating men and women for the society. The College has awarded various scholarships to students amounting to Rs.26 Lakhs and nearly 120 students have benefitted from the mid-day meal scheme. I am grateful to all our benefactors.

In continuing the vibrant traditions of the past, the associations through their ceaseless activities create a large variety of avenues for self-expression. Participation in the various extension activities organized by the Institution is mandatory for students at St. Joseph's College Of Commerce.

Several workshops on socially relevant issues such as Human Trafficking, Ill effects of addiction, Women safety and the need for self defence strategies for women, hair donation in solidarity with cancer patients and RTI were organised all through the year.

It is a norm at St. Josephs that each class undertakes a social visit and dedicates itself to a particular cause. Numerous social visits were organised by the class mentors.

The Centre for Social Action organized a Rural

Exposure Camp - in association with Loyola Vikas Kendra, Mundgod.

It is with joy that I mention that for the last five years the institution has collaborated with the Government Urdu Higher Primary School, Ashoknagar. The students of our institution work closely with this school.

In the season of advent, the student's council, organised Fiesta 2014 for the lesser privileged children. Around a hundred HIV +ve children from 'Sneha Care Home' participated in Fiesta at our premises.

who co-incidentally is one of the basic formulator of the MIB course. With a specialisation in international business, he was able to give students a crystal clear picture of international business from a global perspective and explained the organisational structure of various countries.

The international industrial trip was an enriching experience for the students of the post graduate department as it enabled them to gain immense knowledge of the functioning of various industries.

Research Department Report

The Research Department of St. Joseph's College of Commerce, Bangalore, obtained its research centre status from Bangalore University in the year 2010-11. The prime motto of the centre is to vitalize research culture through identifying, assembling and disseminating research information to the staff and the students of the institution. They have continuously been involved in major and minor research project work and publications. At present there are seven on-going minor and major research projects taken up by our faculty members which are sponsored by the University Grants Commission.

The Bangalore Jesuit Educational Society and St. Joseph's College of Commerce Research Department collaborated in a major research work titled "Status of Child Health and Education among the Urban Poor, a Study of Bangalore Slums".

The findings of this research have been published in an international journal.

The Research Centre of the Institution publishes two bi-annual research journals in an academic year. **The Institution Management Research Review** (ISSN 2249-4359), is a peer reviewed journal which is committed to publishing scholarly, impactful and theoretical research articles. Eight issues have been successfully released.

PROFESSIONAL COURSES AND INDUSTRY BASED SYLLABUS

As an autonomous college, St. Joseph's College of Commerce takes pride in the fact that it incorporates industry based requirements into its curriculum and offers students the opportunity to pursue professional courses along with a B.Com or BBM degree. For this purpose, the college has signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the following associations and institutions:

Chartered Institute of Management Accountants (CIMA)

On 31st July, 2014, a MOU was signed between St. Joseph's College of Commerce and Mr. Debasish Biswas, country head, CIMA. The purpose of this was to give students an opportunity to pursue a CIMA professional course along with B.Com or BBM. At the end of three years, students will graduate with a B.Com or BBM degree as well as a CIMA professional degree. Interested students were oriented about the programme through seminars on 13th and 14th August, 2014. Classes for this programme were conducted by the International Skill Development Centre (ISDC).



Ernst & Young (EY)

EY extended its support to conduct a 'Tax Campus Outreach Programme' in the college from 18th to 22nd August 2014. In this regard, a MOU was signed between Mr. Chandy, Partner EY LLP, and Mr. Neil, Associate Director, Tax and Regulatory services, EY and Rev. Dr. Daniel Fernandes SJ, Principal, St. Joseph's College of Commerce. The purpose of this was to train students in different fields which would become prominent in the near future. This tax training programme was a step in that direction. At the end of the training programme, students were awarded a certificate of participation, and top performers received a certificate of excellence. With a certificate of excellence, these students enjoyed the benefit of being able to attend the EY campus placement interview without having to go through preliminary rounds.

Association of Chartered Certified Accountants (ACCA)

On 4th August, 2014, a roundtable was organised by ACCA, a professional body from UK (London) – "From education to employment- Designing a system that works", between employers and universities at Grand Hyatt, MG Road. Employers expressed their concerns on skills to be possessed by students and universities and expressed their difficulties in promulgating the same. It was an enriching experience for one and all present as they were able to understand the current trend in the job market in order to groom students as per industry needs.

In this regard, the college signed a MOU with Ms. Lucia Real Martin, Director, Emerging Market, ACCA, on 6th August 2014. The purpose of this was to start an ACCA course, in addition to the regular B.Com course offered by the college.

LSE SUMMER SCHOOL

International exposure is something that St. Joseph's College of Commerce strives to provide for its students. In a time where practical knowledge trumps textbook theory, various courses offered by London School of Economics for second year BBM students of our college prove to be hugely beneficial. This year, thirteen students took up the LSE summer school option in the month of July, where they got the opportunity to travel to London and spend a month there. Courses were offered in Management and Accounting, with majority of the students opting for Strategic Management.

The course structure was spread over a period of three weeks, and was split into two parts: classes and lectures. Classes were held five days a week, and students attended a total of twelve classes and twelve lecture sessions over a period of three weeks. During the lecture, various concepts of management were discussed in ways which could be easily understood, and real life cases were discussed during the classes. Assessment was done at the end of the third week, wherein students were required to prepare a presentation which constituted 20% of the final grade, as well as take up a formal written exam which formed the other 80% of the grade. At the end of the program, each student was given a final grade and a certificate.

LSE wasn't all work and no play. Many mixers and sessions were planned to get the international students to interact with one another.

Being in a room with five hundred odd students representing different cultures of the world helped broaden our students' thinking and they were able to learn beyond the pages of a textbook.

Apart from LSE, the students were able to explore the city of London. Being a cosmopolitan city, London had a lot to offer to the students, in terms of cultural diversity, aptly called a marriage of culture and modernity. The students visited the following well known sights:

- London Eye
- West Minster Abbey
- British Museum
- Beatles' Story
- Hyde Park

After a month in London, the students returned to India on 30th July, 2014. Overall, the programme proved to be an enriching experience which gave the students a sense of liberty and taught them to think outside the box.



PARENT TEACHER MEETING

- Local tour of Bangalore city. The students were made aware of the famous places in the city, both old and new, including places known for shopping and other interesting activities.

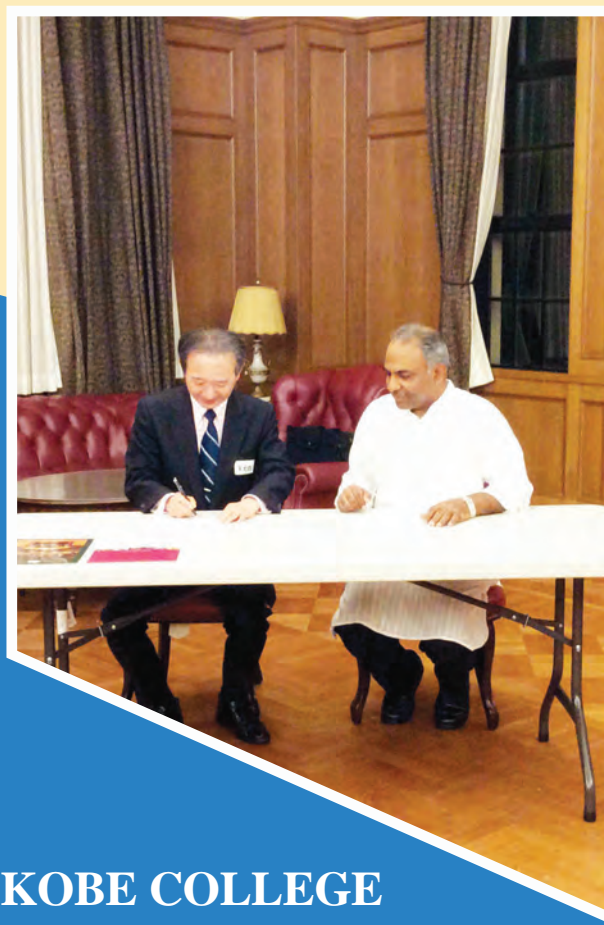

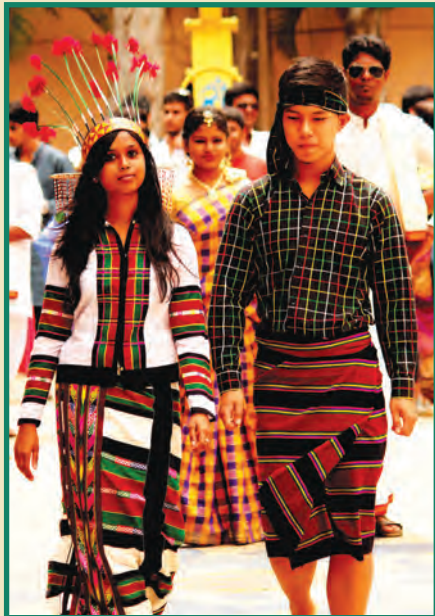
INDEPENDENCE DAY

AICUF

President: Seevanth Raj

AICUF is a union of students from different backgrounds, who share a common objective to serve the world, believing in the motto 'Do unto others as they you would want them to do unto you.'

The members of the association emphasize on creating an unbiased society where people from all walks of life can live as one community.

The first event of the association was 'Go Green' on 5th June 2015, in celebration of World Environment Day. To raise awareness about environmental issues, the AICUF unit sold fifty saplings, more than a hundred stickers and sixty handmade bags to students and teachers, which proved to be an innovative way to promote the green culture and remind them of their part in preserving our environment.

On 19th July 2014, forty students of this association participated in a two day program organized by the Children Movement for Civic Awareness (CMCA) and the Bangalore Traffic Police titled 'Positive Strokes.' It was a proactive, positive and youth driven program that addressed the problem of irresponsible road behaviour and rewards those who demonstrate good road behaviour.

The Annual AICUF State Council Meet was conducted on 26th and 27th July 2014 at St. Joseph's College, Bangalore. AICUF unit leaders from all over Karnataka were present at this event. The State Council Election was conducted, and Seevanth Raj and Manoj M from

3 B.Com B were elected as the State Council President and State Council Treasurer respectively.

Apart from college activities, AICUF has been instrumental in participating in outside rallies and protests. To spread awareness about eye donation and its impact, sixty students of the association participated in a blind walk organized by 'Project Vision', held in Jayanagar. A rally for justice was held to protest against the Vibgyor High school rape case. More than a hundred and fifty students participated in this rally to speak for the injustice done to the female citizens and children of this nation and to question the government about their safety in public.

AICUF initiated its own 'One Day Meal Program' on 29th August 2014, thirty students went to Shivajinagar and distributed food among the poor, their actions echoing the message – 'We can't feed everyone but we can feed at least one'. Students also participated in a protest rally on September 14th, 2014 to express support for the persecuted Christians in Iraq, Syria and other African countries. The students of AICUF





participated in a regional youth convention organised by St. Philomena College, Mysore from 24th to 26th October 2014, and a national level retreat and camp called 'Magis' in the same month.

The AICUF cultural team has proved itself yet again this year by winning major gospel fests in Bangalore including Exodus (St. Joseph's College), El-Shadai (JyothiNivas College) and runners-up in Mount Carmel College. On 28th November 2014, AICUF organised an inter-collegiate gospel fest 'Revelations 2014'. A total of ninety-seven participants from six colleges took part in various events like western and vernacular music, quiz, sketching, treasure hunt etc. The theme of the fest was URIEL: Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path. All the events were based on the theme and were meant to send the message of God's saving grace and the importance of his word.

To promote the true spirit of Christmas that is the Spirit of giving, the AICUF unit played Secret Santa with the 'Jagrudhi' an orphanage and invited the entire college to take part. This program saw an overwhelming response from the students as well as the staff. AICUF also conducted 'Youth Conclave' to help students gain knowledge on various issues like problems faced by Dalits, the struggle of Transgenders in the society and

how it is important for every citizen to know and take an initiative towards it.

AICUF has had an eventful year, believing in 'Everything seems to be impossible, unless we try'.





NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME (NSS)

The NSS unit of St. Joseph's College of Commerce registered 200 students as volunteers for the year 2014-2015. After the registrations an orientation workshop was held for the students on 6th August, 2014. Students were informed of the objectives of NSS, its ethos and work pattern.

Blood Donation Camp:

The Blood Donation Camp was conducted on 26th of August, 2014 with 'Kidwai Memorial Institute of Oncology' and 'St. John's Medical College Hospital'. Lion's Club of Bangalore coordinated the event and provided refreshments to the donors. 199 units of blood was collected from the college students.

Workshop:

The senior volunteers and ex-NSS members organized a half-day workshop in understanding social issues on 16th August, 2014. The objectives were:

- To identify issues in society that need immediate attention
 - To be able to look at problems from different perspectives
 - Evolving strategies to tackle the problems within one's own limits
- Students were divided into groups and were made to discuss and present it in the form of a small skit. A

discussion was organized based on the inputs of the students.

Rural Exposure Camp:

The National Service Scheme of St. Joseph's College of Commerce conducted its annual Rural Exposure Camp from 20th to 26th of November, 2014. This year the camp was organized at **Channaveeranahalli, Doddaballapura Taluk, Bengaluru Rural District**.

As the students prepared for the camp there was excitement but also anxiety surrounded them for they had to stay away from the familiarity of the home and away from the proximity of their parents. For a lot of students this was to become their first experience of staying in a village. The theme for the camp was 'Sustainable Development and Ecology'.

The objective was to take up a project which will help the village to maintain its ecological balance and also to educate them about hygiene and cleanliness. To accomplish this objective the camp had three main work targets:

- Clearing of bushes on the lake bund
- Planting of 50 saplings on the bund area
- Tidying the village meeting hall, roads and the drain
- Organizing a Medical and Dental Camp for the villagers

Students were able to clear the bund area in three days and planted the saplings on the other two days. By involving the villagers into the work we were able to make them also responsible towards maintenance of the saplings. The students have also decided to track the growth of the saplings.



Apart from the physical labour students organized cultural activities for the villagers. The most awaited time of the day was the evenings as the whole village would gather around the stage to witness performances. These performances not only brought a festive atmosphere to the whole village but also helped them to understand various issues related to farming, hygiene, pollution and garbage disposal. As a result the Deepavali festival was a complete cracker-free-festival as our students managed to persuade each and every person not to burst crackers.

On the last day both Medical and Dental camps were organized for the villagers.

Close to 200 persons from the neighbouring villagers got the benefit of the camp. They were instructed on hygiene and were taught basic exercises to prevent bone related problems. The Lions Club of Bangalore helped us in organizing the camp. Writers and Speakers belonging to various organizations came and addressed the students on all the days.

On the whole the following were the learning outcomes:

- Students by staying in the villages and by sharing their lifestyle were able to get a transformative experience
- Students were able to understand the problems faced by villagers on a daily basis like electricity and water and were able to identify the reasons behind them

- Through the performances and other cultural activities students were able to relate with the villagers and understand the cultural life of a village
- By clearing the lake bund and planting saplings students understood the ecological value of trees
- Students by staying away from their homes also learnt to develop good interpersonal relationship by working with other students

Apart from the camp, NSS volunteers also taught at government schools as part of a BalaJanagraha Project. The NGO 'Justice and Care' conducted a session on Human Trafficking on 18th August, 2014 for NSS students. NSS volunteers participated in a marathon organized by 'Citizens for Namma Safe Bengaluru' protesting violence against women on 24th August, 2014. Two volunteers participated in a seminar organized by Indian Social Institute on 'Role of Media in Development and Governance' the 11th and 12th of November, 2014. A visit to a home for the disabled at Ejipura was organized on 3rd December, 2014.





CENTRE FOR SOCIAL ACTION (CSA)

With a vision of 'Care, Connect and Change', CSA (Centre for social action) started off this year by gathering members for the association. This year, around two hundred and fifty students were a part of this association. Several meetings were held to put down a good event list and devise ways to get all the members to participate throughout the year. A formal orientation was conducted on 7th July 2014, wherein the students were made aware of the yearly plan and coordinators for each class were appointed.



The first event for the year was organizing a Sports Day for the children at Urdu Government School on 19th July 2014, wherein thirty students volunteered to plan a fun filled day for the children.

On the 9th of August, the association had its next program which was a social visit to Kidwai Hospital and Christ College. At Kidwai, the volunteers interacted with the patients and distributed contributions collected earlier, following which the volunteers headed to Christ University for an orientation about their Biomethanation plant. It was a very productive day as they covered two places and gained knowledge on social concern and the importance of recycling waste.

Soon after, the association began planning an Independence Day celebration to be held in the Urdu Government School. The activities planned included singing, dance and a skit. All the participants and the students enjoyed every bit of the program.

In collaboration with CRY (Child Rights and You), CSA conducted a small exhibition in the college to promote CRY's new child labour campaign, and spread awareness about it. A good response was received from CRY in this regard, which paved the way for a tie up with them for future events.

CSA had its first rural exposure camp to Mundgod Taluk from 3rd November to 8th November 2014.

Twenty seven students accompanied by two faculty members were part of this camp. The objective of the camp was simple – be a part of the village family and be involved in their activities, i.e. “live with them, amongst them and along with them”.



On association day, CSA was instrumental in organizing a fund raiser in the form of a pet show as an inter-collegiate event. A total of fourteen owners brought their pets along. This event was a success as the association raised Rs. 14,000.

With a motto of 'Little things, Big difference', this association has already made a difference in the lives of many.

The final event for the year took place on 4th December 2014, wherein about fifty students of the association took part in a rally organised by the Urdu Government School for protection of children.

HASHMI THEATRE FORUM

Hashmi Theatre Forum is one of the active associations of St. Joseph's College of Commerce, with a limited membership of people who are both dedicated and enthusiastic. It is a platform for those students who are interested in theatre, which enables them to improve their acting skills through the various workshops conducted by its coordinator Mr. T.H Lavakumar, who has had many years of experience in the field of theatre. This year has been an eventful one for the members of this club. With new additions every year, the team continues to grow stronger. This forum has worked on two productions for the year: one in English titled 'Our Town' and one in Kannada titled 'Gunamukha'.

The forum took part in various fests, placing third in the miming competition at 'Autumn Fuse', the cultural fest of St. John's Medical College, and winning the skit competition at Cul-Ah 2015, the cultural fest of Mount Carmel College. The forum was fortunate enough

to qualify for the finals of the Microsoft Channel V fest that was held in Goa from 6th to 16th February 2015.

The biggest achievement for the forum was being awarded the second best play at 'Baptizer', the national level theatre festival hosted by Christ University, along with awards for Best Direction and Screenplay.

ENACT

Enact, one of the most famous annual theatre festival in Bangalore, is conducted by Hashmi Theatre Forum. This year's Enact attracted about 15 colleges from all over Bangalore and was held from 23rd to 25th of February, 2015. The Judges for the competition were Mr.Kallappa, a renowned theatre person and Mr.Purushottam and Ms.Vineetha, theatre actors and alumni of our college. The fest included proscenium plays, street plays, mime and act and react competitions.

Hashmi Theatre Forum of St. Joseph's College of Commerce performed two plays as a non-competitor in the fest. The first play it performed was "Our Town" written by Thornton Wilder. The play is set in a small town in which people are completely submerged in their day-to-day lives. The play is not just about the characters and their emotions but also about the town itself. It tells the story not of the individuals but of the community. The performance was able to capture the everyday life of a small town so well that the auditorium seemed to take on the life of the town itself. This play also won the second best play award at 'Baptizer', the theatre festival of Christ University.





The second play was a Kannada play titled 'Gunamukha' (Resuscitate) by P. Lankesh. An arrogant rural by name of Nadir Shah who at present has defeated the Mughals and in ruling 'Hindustan' is suffering from a disease whose origins are not known. All attempts to heal him have failed. The only person who can rejuvenate him is the banished doctor Alawi Khan. But Alawi Khan asks something which no ruler would ever do – beg to be healed. The moral content of the play is very much the need-of-the-hour. The play was performed with high intensity and was able to plunge the audience into thinking about moral questions that disturb us deeply. Both the plays were directed by Mr. T. H. Lavakumar.

NMKRV College won the first place in the Kannada section and Christ University in the English section. Christ University also bagged the best Street Play award. Enact 2015 provided a great platform to all those who are passionate about theatre and acting.





MAGNATE

Magnate is the entrepreneurship cell of the college. Formerly known as E-Cell, the main objective of the organization is to focus and develop entrepreneurial skills of the students, with the motto 'Give India more Entrepreneurs.'

The inauguration of this cell was held on 16th August 2014, where the students were familiarized with the cell's objectives and its action plan for the year; which included building a framework for student entrepreneurs to nurture and grow their enterprises from within the college as well as outside.

On 26th September 2014, the members of Magnate attended a seminar on 'Inventive Entrepreneurship' led by two young and robust entrepreneurs, Ms. Shreya Siroya and Mr. Aditya Sisodiya, co-founders of Retale, a virtual window shopping mobile application. The pair took the gathering through their entrepreneurial journey and explained the processes involved in starting up and modelling an organisation, throwing

light on the need to form purposeful and productive relationships.

In November 2014, Varun Agarwal, a serial entrepreneur and writer used the help of the cell to create a parody comic video that personified the stigmas of society and how a generation would break free from it. On 15th December, 2014, Magnate conducted an Input Session on 'The Impact of Social Media on Entrepreneurship, Enterprises and Entrepreneurs'. The Resource Persons for this session were two very successful entrepreneurs: Mr. Varun Agarwal, the CEO of Alma Mater, and Mrs. Tarunjeet Rattan, the Managing Partner of Nucleus PR, who spoke about why being an entrepreneur and following your dreams is something which a person should try to achieve rather than doing a mechanical and robotic job, and how social media is a very powerful tool for Global Branding and gaining publicity. They were able to instill among the students a sense of courage and a hunger to search for the passion that lingers within and work on that passion.

The festival of folk songs in association with Bhoomthayi Balaga was conducted on 16th December 2014 in the college Auditorium. The program was aimed at provoking students for social change through the melody of popular folk songs. The program was interactive and inspiring as the audience also gave their responses to the message of the compositions.

A literary-cultural camp dedicated towards focusing on Kannada literature and the works of Kuvempu, a noted progressive writer, was held from 29th October 2014 to 1st November 2014, in Kuppali of Shivamogga District. Forty three students attended this camp, where they critically analysed the poems, plays and novels authored by the greatest poet of the soil. The camp was the first of its kind. In the month of January, a program to educate students about superstitious acts and the evils of blind faith was conducted. The core content of this program was to portray the futility of believing in unscientific prejudices and superstitions.

The Inter collegiate Cultural fest 'Kalarava' was held with pomp and zeal on 25th February 2015. The fest was the biggest of its kind in the city as it witnessed a turn up of around five hundred and fifty participants from over thirty two colleges. Various Kannada events like antakshari, essay writing, folk singing and folk dance were conducted, along with new events such as 'Kalaravasaviruch', cooking without fire, and 'Neena?Naana?– A face to face debate'. The day was marked with the cultural, literary and artistic significance of Karnataka.

Karnataka Odu (Reading Karnataka)

Karnataka Odu is a new initiative by Kannada Sangha of St. Joseph's College of Commerce. It is aimed to



expose students of SJCC and other interested ones to the literary and socio-cultural issues of the world through the lenses of Kannada.

As part this initiative a four day intensive literary and cultural camp- 'Kuvempu Odu' (Reading Kuvempu) was organised to read and analyse the important writings of Kuvempu, a prominent literary figure in Indian and World Literature. His writings led to many radical movements in the history of Kannada literature. Both his life and literature dominates the imagination of every writer writing in Kannada.

It is important for the younger generation to read Kuvempu closely and imaginatively for it contains a great humanist perspective of the world. And it is for this reason the camp was entirely dedicated to the writings of Kuvempu. The camp was conducted at Kuppali, the home town of Kuvempu, in Shivamogga District from 30th of October to 2nd of November, 2014. Totally 60 students from different colleges around Bangalore and Bangalore University participated in the camp. It was a fine blend of rural, urban, Kannadigas and non-Kannadigas. All of them were given the compendium of selected works of Kuvempu one month before the camp and were expected to come prepared for the discussions.

The camp started on 30th Oct with an informal inauguration. Students were put into groups and were assigned specific texts of Kuvempu. After a prolonged discussion about the text in the group they were asked to share their views openly on all social issues that

Kuvempu thought about decades ago. This process continued for 2 days in which students came across several writings of Kuvempu.

The third day was specially celebrated as it was the day of unification of Karnataka (Kannada Rajyotsava). Even before the dawn students were taken to 'Navilukallibetta' which Kuvempu often visited to draw inspiration for his poetic expressions and witnessed the sunrise. Students were delighted with the symbolic celebration of Rajyotsava. Later they were screened a dramatised video of the novel "Malegalalli Madumagalu" in the mini theatre. They also saw a documentary on K.P.Poorna ChandraTejaswi, Kuvempu's son, a noted writer and environmentalist and was followed by the discussion. Meanwhile students also visited the 'Kavimane', Kuvempu's residence which is now a museum; 'Kavishaila' the poet's favourite inspirational place and also saw the cemeteries of the great poet and his son Tejasvi.

The camp was first of its kind and created an overwhelming cultural desire in the minds of students. Mr. T.H. Lavakumar, the co-ordinator of Kannada Sangha was the Director of the camp and has been successful in framing an innovative and inspiring program for the students. Dr.Chalapathi, Mr.Devaraju and Mr.Prakash Kadidalu moderated the discussions and gave insights about the essence of these writers. As this was great opportunity for student community, all the members of Kannada Sangha are grateful to the Principal Dr.Daniel Fernandes.S.J. and the Co-ordinator for providing this opportunity.

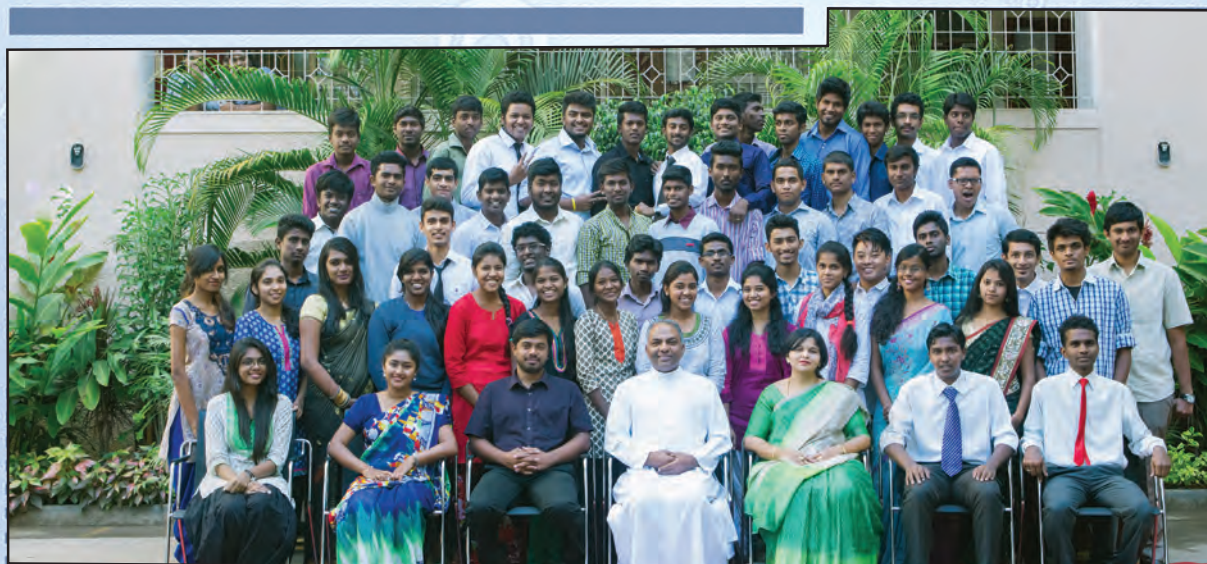

INTERNATIONAL TRIPS

At St. Joseph's College of Commerce, emphasis is placed on gaining practical knowledge as opposed to the theory of text books. In this regard, the management of the college organizes industrial visits for the students. The following international industrial trips were organized during this academic year:

1. Industrial International Visit (China) – Post Graduate Department

The students of the Post Graduate Department had an international industrial visit in October 2014. The trip was a six day visit to Hong Kong, Macau and Guangzhou. The students were accompanied by Dr. Raja Jebasingh and staff from the research department of St. Joseph's College of Commerce.

The first two days were spent in Hong Kong. Students visited a number of places which included the Victoria Peak, Repulse Bay, Golden Bauhinia Square, Ocean Park, the Jewellery factory and the Container Terminal.

The next two days were spent in Macau, and the itinerary included dinner at the Venetian, a tour of the city, The Galaxy Macau Diamond Show, and sight-seeing at A-Ma Temple, Macau Fisherman's Wharf, Museum of Macau, and Ruins of St. Pauls.

The last day of the trip was spent at Guangzhou. Students were fortunate to visit the International Trade Centre.

The international industrial trip was an enriching experience for the students of the Post Graduate Department as it enabled them to gain immense knowledge of the functioning of various industries. The trip also served to help understand the culture and traditions that prevail in China. Through sight-seeing, the students were able to admire and appreciate the scenic beauty of the country.

2. Industrial International Visit (Europe) – B.Com & B.Com Travel & Tourism Departments

The students of B.Com and B.Com Travel and Tourism visited Germany, Austria, Switzerland and Italy as a part of their Industrial visit to Europe. The trip was facilitated by Thomas Cook (India). Forty eight students were accompanied by two faculty members, Ms. Komal Dave and Dr. Lalima Chakraverty, on this trip.

The students arrived at Munich, where they were heartily welcomed by the tour manager, Mr. Binoy Lemos, and were taken to the BMW factory, which was an hour away from the Munich International airport. The BMW factory offered a direct insight into all areas of automobile production.

On the second day, the students were taken for a city tour of Munich, followed by a visit to the Nymphenburg Palace which was commissioned by King Ludwig I. After visiting the palace, they were taken to the famous stadium and home ground of FC Bayern Munich, the Allianz arena. Following this, the students departed to Salzburg.



On the third day, the students were taken to the site of the ever popular musical “The Sound Of Music”, followed by the visit to the Mirabell Gardens. Later they proceeded to “Hohensalzburg Fortress” and then left for Innsbruck.

On the fourth day the students proceeded for Zurich, where they had an overnight stay at Holiday Inn Express Affoltern Am Albis.

On the fifth day, the students were taken to Mount Titlis, which is 3020m above sea level. This was followed by a ride in a cable-car up to the top of Mount Titlis, followed by a walk on the Cliff Bridge.

On the sixth day, the students proceeded to the Lindt factory outlet and had a splendid time shopping at the outlet. Later, they visited the University of St Gallen - A school for Management, Economics, Law, Social Science and International Affairs.

On the seventh day, the students left for Swiss Miniature in Melide, where they saw the Swiss Alps, the famous Swiss Building, and models of trains, funicular, cableways etc. They then proceeded to Milan in Italy where they were taken on a tour of the city covering the historical city center of Milan.

The tour proceeded to the most important sights including the Arco Della Pace, the church of Santa Maria delle Grazie (home to Leonardo da Vinci’s Last Supper) , San Lorenzo, Corso Venezia Piazza SabnBanila and the country yard of Milan’s magnificent Sforzesco Castle.

Finally, the students returned to Bangalore taking back with them wonderful memories. The International trip was mainly undertaken to sensitize students about the work-culture of industries abroad and to make them

understand the functionality of these industries. The students were also able to learn about the educational system followed abroad, and enjoyed the beautiful European landscapes. Other important takeaways included learning about the compliance of rules and regulations by the country, the advancement of technology and the existence of different dialects of French, German etc.

3. International Student Exchange Programme (Japan) – Kobe College and St. Joseph’s College of Commerce

St. Joseph's College of Commerce is in a collaborative relationship with Kobe College for the purpose of promoting mutual understanding as well as exchange of academics, cultural and personnel on the basis of equality and mutual benefit. This year three students from different departments, accompanied by Rev. Dr. Daniel Fernandes SJ, visited the cities of Kobe, Osaka, Kyoto and Tokyo in October 2014.

During the visit, the students witnessed the traditional as well the cooperative and conservative society of Japan. They visited Manga museum, Kobe port, China town and the Odaiba Island. In order to see the traditional side of Japan, they visited various Shinto shrines and Buddhist temples such as Nakayama Dera and Kiyomizu Dera, which is an independent Buddhist temple in eastern Kyoto and part of the UNESCO World Heritage sites.

The students enjoyed various other experiences such as participating in the tea ceremony, going for **Pirikura**, taking a ride on the Osaka Wheel, trying out the different Japanese Cuisines, dressing in traditional Japanese attire **kimono** and learning how to make traditional Japanese sweets.

This year they went a step ahead, and visited Sophia University in Tokyo in order to anchor future prospective collaborations. The students were able to learn about the culture of Japan. The one thing that created a major impact on their experience in Japan was the people: their ever willingness to help, their hospitality and caring nature.

4. International Industrial Visit (Europe) – BBM Department

An international trip to Europe was organised for the students of the BBM Department in the month of October, 2014. A number of students from first, second and third year classes went on this trip. The students visited the following places:

Rotterdam: Rotterdam is the second largest city in Netherlands, and it houses the largest port in the world. It is situated near the River Rhine and becomes the Gateway to Europe. The students were fortunate to visit Erasmus University, at the Rotterdam School of Management, which is one of the best universities all over Europe. This was followed by a visit to Madurodam, a miniature park which is home to small scale replicas of all famous Dutch landmarks.

Volendam: Situated 20 km from Amsterdam, Volendam is one of the richest towns of the Netherlands. The students visited a traditional clog (wooden shoes) factory, where everything they saw was handmade. They also visited a cheese making factory.

Amsterdam: Originating as a small fishing village in the 13th century, Amsterdam has developed to become a major hub for business, commerce, tourism and culture. Amsterdam is famous for the canals that run through the city. The students were taken on a tour of the city, which included cruises on these canals. The Heineken brewery was established in 1864 in Amsterdam, and is currently one of the three largest beer producers in the world. The students were fortunate enough to visit the brewery and see how the world famous Heineken beer is made.

Brussels: Brussels is the capital city of Belgium, and is famous for its luxury chocolates. The students visited Concept Chocolate, a small factory which made handmade chocolates. They were even given the opportunity to make their own chocolates.

Luxembourg: Luxembourg is one of the smallest nations in the world. A visit to the Bastogne was scheduled, which is the place where the Mardsson Memorial was erected in memory of the fallen American Soldiers.

Heidelberg: Situated in south-west Germany, Heidelberg is a city situated on the banks of a valley



connected by a bridge. The students were fortunate to pass through this city as a part of the trip.

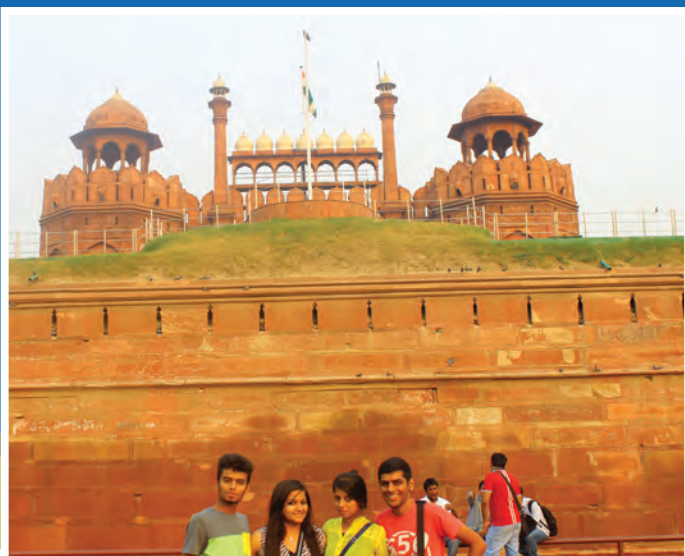
Stuttgart: It is the sixth largest city in Germany and one of the important commercial hubs. The students were lucky to get the opportunity to visit the BMW factory in Dingolfing. The plant at Dingolfing made parts and components not only for BMW, but also for Rolls Royce. The whole visit taught us how the whole production line is set up and the efficiency and accuracy that can be achieved.

Titisee: Titisee is a lake in the southern Black Forest in Baden-Württemberg, Germany. This was followed by the visit to the renowned cuckoo clock making company in Switzerland. Although the clocks were made in Germany, most of the components of the clocks come from Switzerland.

Schaffhausen: Situated in the northern part of Switzerland, a place where the Rhine falls finds it home. Students were fortunate enough to pass through the Rhine falls.

Zurich: It is the largest city in Switzerland and a place for shopaholics. However, the main attraction of the city was the Kapellbrücke (literally, Chapel Bridge), which is a covered wooden footbridge spanning diagonally across the Reuss River in the city of Lucerne in central Switzerland.

The last stop was Mt. Titlis, a mountain of the Uri Alps, which is 10,000 feet above sea level, is one of the most beautiful mountain ranges in the world. To get to the top all the tourists have to take the cable cars, where there were lots of different activities. The visit was to make the students experience the diversity of European culture, languages and industries. It showed the progress that the EU countries are making, and taught the students respect for each of those countries. The most significant thing about Europe was the standard of living the people had and the mutual respect people gave each other irrespective of their status in society.



DOMESTIC TRIPS

A few classes went on industrial trips within the country itself. These include:

1. Industrial Visit (North India) – BBM Department

On 17th October 2014, a group of thirty students from the BBM department went on an educational and vocational trip to cities in North India, which included Chandigarh, Shimla and Manali. The students were accompanied by Ms. Poornima and Ms. Asang as faculty members from the institution and Mr.Sridhar and Mr.Lawrence as the travel heads. The trip was for 6 nights and 7 days. They visited the following places:

Shimla: The students reached Chandigarh, from where they boarded a bus to Shimla. While in Shimla, we visited several places of significance including the Mall, Ridge Road and Kufri. During their stay there, the students experienced the old world charm of Shimla as the city is relatively untouched by commercialization and globalization. Horse riding on Kufri hill was a memorable experience for many of them.

Manali: After spending two days in Shimla, the next place visited was Manali, one of the most adventurous hill stations in India. Few of the places visited in Manali were the Rohtang pass, Mall road, Hadimba temple and the River Beas. Places visited in Manali symbolised the rich heritage and customs followed by the locales there. The students enjoyed an amazing trek up the snow covered mountain and enjoyed a forty-five minute raft down the River Beas.

Chandigarh: After fun & frolic at Shimla and Manali, the students visited M/s Filtrex Limited in Chandigarh. M/s Filtrex Limited is a manufacturing industry in business for over two decades supplying water filters to big players like Eureka Forbes and others. The students

were made familiar with the process of manufacturing filters and raw materials used in the process. On the last day, the students visited several culturally rich places in Chandigarh and enjoyed shopping at Sector 17 market.

Through the industrial visit, the students learnt the importance of purified water, and how an industry functions. The trip also served as a platform for the students to get to know each other better.

2. Industrial Visit (Goa) – B.Com Department

The students of 3 B.Com 'A' visited MS Mandovi Distilleries & Breweries Pvt. Ltd., Goa on 20th October, 2014. This industry mainly deals with production of various varieties of alcohol such as whisky, brandy, vodka, etc. The students were taken through the entire process of how alcohol is made and the various departments which were functioning under the industry.

They were first briefed about the industry, its history and its processes. The layout of the plant was divided into 10 Sections. The guide began the tour with the Filtration section which was mainly used to filter all the water which was further used in the preparation of spirits. They were then taken to the raw material go-down where empty bottles were stored. Followed by this they went into the fermentation and mixing unit where the filtered water was mixed with the desired content through various tubes, thus forming the desired alcohol. They were then taken to the glass testing and cleaning unit where they made sure that the empty bottles without defects were cleaned.

The liquor was then filled into the bottles using machines which were aided by manual laborers. The bottles were then sent to the packing and packaging department from where they were exported and distributed in the market. The students also visited the accounting department where a detailed record of the raw materials and finished goods was maintained. Followed by this they visited the



security and surveillance department where the quality of the liquor manufactured was checked by external people. At the end of tour, the students had a better understanding of the processes of a manufacturing concern. They gained practical exposure to what is taught in Cost and Management Accounts and learnt about the real challenges faced in a manufacturing concern of this magnitude.

Class Industrial Visits

As a part of the curriculum the Institution organizes Industrial visits for students to supplement their classroom lessons. The visits focus on integrating subject knowledge with real-life experiences and giving a practical dimension to theoretical concepts. The class mentors of the respective classes, with the help the student coordinators facilitate the visits to the industries

College life is filled with many indelible experiences that are forever treasured as priceless assets that are unrivalled in the sentiments and significance associated with them. Undoubtedly the excursion to North(19th oct 2015) and South India(17th oct 2015) qualifies as one of these unforgettable instances. Awe and amazement overcame students as they went through the ancient architectural wonders being the magnificent Buland Darwaza ,the tomb of Salim Chisti, the most talked about tomb in the world. ,the Taj Mahal . No person was impervious to the radiance that emanates from it . If ever a place is to be called a perfect blend of History, Culture, Modernity, technological and political hub, it has to be Delhi. Students visited the Qutub Minar The Parliament, India gate and Rashtrapati Bhavan and the Lotus Temple before arriving at Sarojini Nagar.After braving the summer heat in Agra and Delhi, the snowy surprise of Shimla and Manali and the fantasy land of art and landscape, Chandigarh,students returned home with broadened minds and fuller hearts.

In the month of October,students travelled 560 kms to reach Sea Bird Resort which marked the beginning of the South India trip comprising of a visit to the famous Gokarna temple and an uphill trek to OM beach, deriving its name from its shape resembling the Hindu OM symbol on day 1.Day 2 involved a visit to the warship museum on Karwar beach . On the third day students travelled to Shimoga to experience the marvel that is the Jog falls and also visited the residence of the famous writer of Karnataka,Kuvempu.This was followed by an industrial visit , ‘Coffee Yatra’and a trek to the top of Mullayanagiri,Karnataka’s highest peak and a glimpse of the Jhari falls in the adjacent forest.22nd October saw students return back to their families with the feeling that it was all over too soon after having visited Halebidu on their way back.

STAFF SOCIAL VIST TO BIJAPUR AND MUNDGOD

"An authentic faith always implies a deep desire to change the world." - Pope Francis

The above quote by Pope Francis, the first Jesuit Pope of the Catholic Church, very boldly captures the underlying philosophy of all works carried out by the Jesuits all around the world. Though primarily identified as a religious order providing excellent education the work of Jesuits extends far beyond providing good education. Along with providing education reaching out to the dispossessed, marginalized and victimized in all ways possible is an integral part of a larger mission of changing the world. Hence, even the education provided by the Jesuits always carries a deep and strong message to change the world.

In Karnataka, along with running premiere educational institutions in Bangalore and Mangalore the Jesuits are spread all over working in small villages and remote places, helping people in their struggle to lead a good life and offering spiritual solace to the distressed. The Karnataka Jesuit Province has four major mission stations from where welfare and empowerment activities are carried out: Anekal, Bijapur, Mundgod and Pannur.

The staff of St. Joseph's College of Commerce visited Bijapur and Mundgod as part of the outreach programme from 22nd to 25th of March, 2015. The purpose of the visit was to understand and study the activities that Jesuits have been doing in the rural parts



of Karnataka. Eighteen staff members including our Principal Dr. Daniel Fernandes S J left Bangalore on 21st night.

The team first visited the Bijapur mission station and was welcomed by Fr. Dan. Though Bijapur is a historic city, it is one of the most under-developed districts in Karnataka. The Jesuits arrived here in the year 1997 and have been working tirelessly to uplift the marginalized sections in the district. A brief overview of the work done by the Jesuits was given to the team through a presentation by Fr. Dan. The team visited Loyal Yomiuri School, Loyala ITI, St. Joseph's Community Care and Navasanidya - HIV/AIDS care center for Girls, all run by the Jesuits. The team also met members of the Self Help Groups started by the Jesuits for the benefit of the slum dwellers and also visited ShikarKhana (Golla Tribe). A massive rally for the empowerment of women was organized by the Jesuits, in collaboration with women's organizations and NGO's, on account of International Women's Day. About 2000 women had gathered in the streets of Bijapur demanding equal rights and opportunities for

women. The Jesuits were thanked and their support to the cause of women empowerment was appreciated by the organizers of the rally.

The team departed from Bijapur on 23rd and reached Mundgod the same day. Fr. Arun welcomed the team at Loyola Vikas Kendra, a residential school for the village kids, and made arrangements for the stay. Mundgod mission station is also one of the oldest mission stations committed to help the marginalized communities. The team visited the schools and hostels run by the Jesuits in order to understand and appreciate the work done by the Jesuits. A Siddi village in which the Jesuits have done a lot of work for their benefit was also visited.

This visit to Bijapur and Mundgod proved to be a big eye-opener for the staff of St. Joseph College of Commerce as we saw the Jesuit philosophy of education put into action. It helped us to understand the concern the Jesuits have for the poor and the marginalized.

ANNUAL SPORTS REPORT

St. Joseph's College of Commerce always provides ample opportunities for students to participate in sports and games that are physically wholesome, mentally stimulating and socially sound.

Sports and games are essential for many reasons. They not only help us to maintain good health but also foster friendship and good behavior. Many people think that the aim of sports and games is to win gold medals, which is not the culture here. What is important though is that every boy and every girl in our country be interested in sports and games. Being interested in games does not mean merely watching other people play games, but also to devote at least an hour a day to sports and games.

The sports activities for the year 2014-15 began as early during March and April where the foundations were laid for the future sports activities for the year by identifying the vacant positions in each team due to passing out of final year students. Forty six students who were in various sports teams and were in final year left the college. Selection trials of BBM and B.Com students on sports merit for the academic year were held. Eminent and resourceful sports personalities were inducted into the selection panels to select such candidates and 32 students were provided admission on sports merit.

The beginning of June saw the consolidation of the recruitment efforts by conducting internal selections for ten teams and also for individual sports events, thus giving opportunities for those students who had been admitted on other merits to participate in college sports activities. INTERVIEW WITH FR. BRIAN PEREIRA SJ

Ignitors' is a youth group, based in Bangalore. As the name suggests, the group helps ignite "visions, passions and missions", visions for creative and critical thinking, passions for committed and constructive actions and missions to dream of a better world. Fr Brian Pereira, a Jesuit priest, who has done his Masters in Pastoral Care and Counseling from Loyola College, Maryland, USA, is the animator of this group and the force behind its success. The group was started by him in the year 2010. Since its formation, it has caught the imagination of young minds. Every year, the group reaches out to over 10,000 college students in Karnataka.

Interviewer: Father, how long have you been a part of the Ignitors programme?

Fr. Brian: I have been a part of the programme since its inception. I started it in 2010, four years ago. So far, we have addressed fifty thousand students from different colleges. This year, we have addressed around seven to eight thousand students, and will be addressing another fifteen thousand students. By the end of this year, we would have addressed about fifty thousand students in four years.

Interviewer: How many colleges are reached out to as part of this programme?

Fr. Brian: This is the fourth year of the programme, and every year we reach out to about twenty colleges in Karnataka, which include Jesuit institutions as well as non-Jesuit institutions.

Interviewer: What is the main aim of this programme for students?

Fr. Brian: In simple words, the programme aims

to promote integral formation of students. It is said that education has three H's; head, heart and hand. The present education system focuses mostly on the 'head' aspect, and at the end of college education, students become monsters with swollen heads but people with shrunken hearts; intellectual geniuses with no feeling. Therefore, Ignitors aims at providing integral formation of head, heart and hand. Hence we have various programmes; activity-based programmes where people reach out to others, cleanliness drives which include spreading awareness of the environment at traffic signals, and various other programmes pertaining to relevant issues.

Interviewer: How have students responded to the programme?

Fr. Brian: The overall response in various colleges has been very positive and encouraging. Almost 99% of the students from various colleges have recommended this programme for the future generations. In St. Josephs College of Commerce, the response here has been positive as well. There are a few students who probably don't enjoy these programmes as much as the others, but I can confidently say that 95% of the students are happy with the programme, based on the feedback that I have received. The students have given an average rating of 9 for content, presentation, and the concept itself, which is very encouraging for us.

Interviewer: The 'Ignitors' group is comprised of volunteers from all spheres of life, talking about different issues. How hard was it to get them together initially?

Fr. Brian: Initially, it was quite difficult as they are all free-lance life skills trainers. Getting them together was a major challenge for us. Apart from this, the programme had to be conceptualized and then planned accordingly, to include three different modules. The first is leadership skills and maturity, the second is

social awareness and analysis, and the third is life skill training. It was challenging to get experts from these three areas, and we are happy that they responded well, and are doing a wonderful job with so much passion.

Interviewer: On a concluding note, Father, any message for the students of our college?

Fr. Brian: I think youth is power, we need to realize that. 58.8% of our country's population is below twenty-five years of age. Unfortunately, this massive power has not realized its potential. In other countries, youth has brought about a revolution, whereas in India, the youth has remained mediocre. The biggest problem in our country is not the lack of potential, but the fact that the youth have accepted mediocrity. We need to plan big and nurture youth.

There is a saying: if you plan for a year, sow paddy, as it grows within a year. If you plan for a decade, plant trees.

But if you want to plan for a future, nurture youth, as youth are the future of the country. If the students of St. Joseph's College of Commerce realize their potential, they can work miracles and we will have a better India.

INTERVIEW WITH RAHUL GOMES

Rahul Gomes graduated from St. Joseph's College of Commerce in 2014. At St. Joseph's College of Commerce, he was the President of the Student Council and was also the Best Outgoing Student from B.Com from his batch. Prior to his final year, he completed an internship at Goldman Sachs in the operations division. He is currently working as a school teacher at SavitribaiPhule English Medium School as part of the Teach For India Fellowship programme. When asked about the change in line from the corporate world to social work, here is what he had to say:

Interviewer: What challenges have you faced switching jobs from an MNC to the social sector? How did you handle them?

Rahul Gomes: I never really worked at an MNC, I interned with one. And from the minute I joined Goldman Sachs, while it was loads of fun, I knew I couldn't do that job for any considerable amount of time. When the opportunity arrived in the form of Teach For India, I grabbed it with both my hands. There wasn't much of a challenge in deciding to join the social sector because that was what I wanted to do

at the outset. However, joining Teach For India is a hard process. It is detail oriented and quite exhaustive. Overall, it was an enriching experience. I must add, nothing you do can prepare you for the sheer amount of work and the commitment required to carry out the job. Teaching is hard. Teaching little kids with no background of English is harder still. I think just knowing the impact you make on these kids is the drive that pushes you to work every day. Furthermore, this is not like any 9 to 5 job you will do. You are constantly thinking about the classroom. Teaching in the morning is just a tip of the iceberg. Post that, the real grind work starts. Preparing lessons for the next day, getting material and resources printed, organising pieces so that the kids are exposed to numerous things they normally wouldn't have access to; all those combined keep you constantly on your toes and make every day like a mini project in itself.

Interviewer: Who has served as your role model throughout your graduate experience?

Rahul Gomes: I don't really think I had a definite role model during my graduate experience. I never wanted to follow in anybody's footsteps. I wanted to speak to everyone around, build a network of smart, articulate people who could share their experiences with me and then make a wise choice about what I wanted to do. I must say that it gave me great pleasure to meet new people and learn new things. So no, no real role models. Just a collection of experiences that cumulatively added to what I already knew and what I needed to learn.

Interviewer: How do you determine or evaluate success?

Rahul Gomes: This is a hard question. I have learnt that success isn't a destination. It is a process combined with a purpose. It is a journey where the end product doesn't matter. Success can be something as simple as well planned lesson and when that gets torn to shambles in the classroom, then success can be a lesson not thoroughly planned but intricately executed with good result. Success can be something as simple as a child writing a single sentence with appropriate sentence structure and success can be when I have the entire weekend off occasionally. Don't be rigid with your perspective on success. Set a goal, break in into milestones and (I can't stress on this enough) celebrate when you reach these milestones. Don't make success a destination. Let every day contribute to your goal. Even if or when you fail, you know what broke down where and correcting that particular process puts you back on track. A piece of advice, never forget why you're doing your job. Let the PURPOSE drive you and the process get you there.



Interviewer: What specific goals other than those related to your occupation, have you established for yourself?

Rahul Gomes: Luckily I work for an organization that places high interest in the growth of the individual and that helps me chart my personal growth both as a professional with skills and as a human being. In my professional life I would, at the end of my fellowship, like to be an able leader, facilitator and motivator of people. I would like to be able to build connections intrinsically and leverage resources which seem hard to acquire. I would like to be able to be more strongly placed, skill-wise, to solve the educational crises which plague our country at the moment.

Personally, I want to learn patience (which, thanks to my classroom exploits has begun to take shape in me), love and compassion. These are values I am not completely familiar with and I realize that these are the values I would like to have as an individual at every stage of my life. I also want to be able to know and understand my areas of strengths and development by the end of the fellowship. This will ensure that I am always tackling some area of my personal life that needs sharpening and leveraging those areas that I have already built.

Interviewer: If you had to offer a piece of advice to a junior with the question, “There are lots of things I’d like to do, but how do I know which one is right?” what would it be?

Rahul Gomes: Do what you WANT to do. I can’t stress on this enough.

I have found that if you want to do something, you will put every inch of your life and soul into it until you are good at it.

And that should be your aim. If you go into something because it’s okay, because it pays the bills and leaves more time for shenanigans on the weekend then I assure you, your motivation will dip quite alarmingly. So to sum up, find something you love, DO IT PASSIONATELY, and that will be the right thing to do.

Interviewer: What has been your greatest driver through the entire journey from being a 1st year student at st. joseph’s college of commerce to a teacher?

Rahul Gomes: “The pursuit of Happiness” No, not the movie, or the song. It is the thought, the concept, the idea, the purpose and the process.

- Auditorium and Class room bookings made



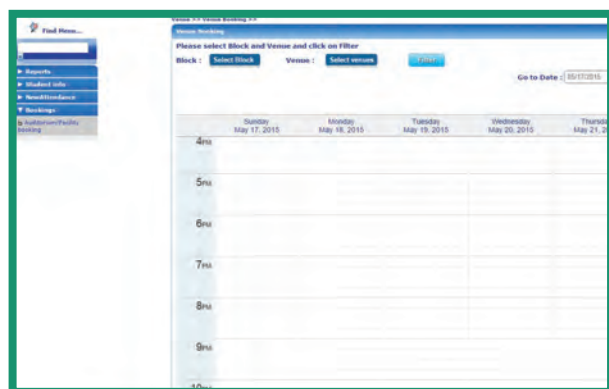
online enabling the user to get the availability and confirmation online, and several more features, a detailed list of which can be found on the college website.

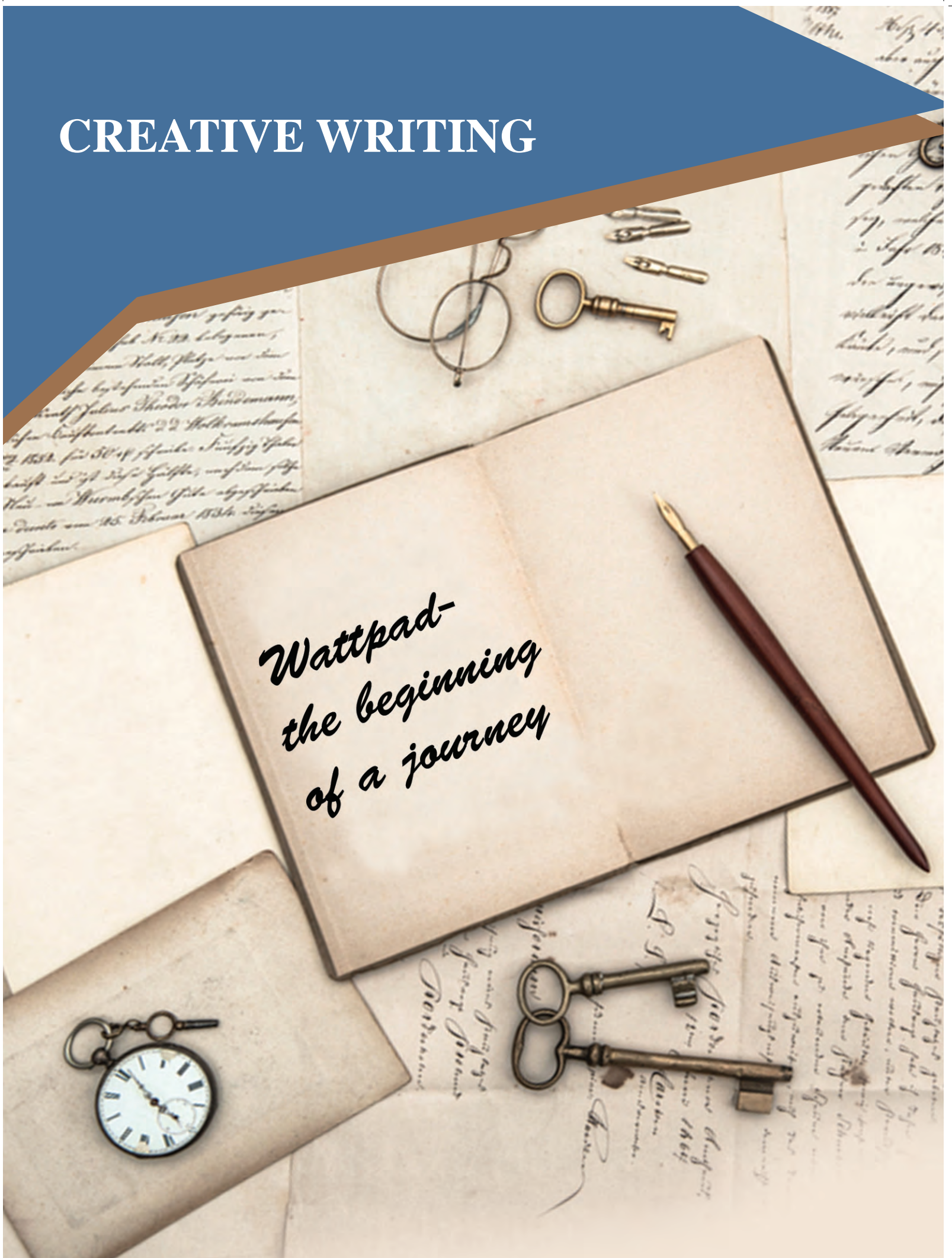

As my computer whizzed to life, I was struggling to keep the events of the day from invading my mind, but clearly doing a miserable job at it. I needed to find an escape. The pressure to perform was mounting and the 15 year old me was struggling to cope. “You need to be at the top of your game” “Your responsibilities as a school leader has to come before your personal interests!” In a bid to distract myself, I began looking for suitable book to review; I stumbled upon a link that said, “Discover a world of unlimited stories.” It was then that this chanced intervention happened. 4 years hence, I am still trying to get rid of my addiction!

My fingers still subconsciously find themselves typing out the letters on the search engine; still open the same application on my phone, unknowingly.

With over 25 million unique visitors per month, over 10 million free books to choose from, over 1000 stories being uploaded per day and 85% of its traffic from mobile devices alone, it is of little surprise that 8 years since it was founded, it remains at the top 5 book applications. One word- WATTPAD.

In the day and age where e-books threaten to overthrow their paper counterparts, Wattpad, is a frontrunner promoting the change. Originating in Canada, its readership is primarily concentrated in the USA, UK, Australia, Canada and Philippines. The site also has a featured story list which promotes reviewed content approved by staff and the editorial review board, written by self-published and professional writers. 317+ books from genres varying from Science-fiction to historical-fiction, to romance and mystery, to poetry and short stories, I’ve tried them all. Yet I am far from contented. The library on my phone has about 20 books waiting to be updated. 4 years, around 350 books, 2 board examinations, numerous under performances at tests (courtesy: Wattpad), I can proudly say that there is nothing like it. The most appealing prospect about it is probably the fact that most authors are teenagers across the world whose ideas are given a platform to be reviewed and enjoyed. Few opportunities better that.

The site has two lists – What’s Hot and What’s New. The most popular books (based on the number of votes received) contend for a spot and at the end of the year comes the big event – The Watty Award and The Atty’s: The Watty’s are divided into 3 categories – Popular; On the Rise; Undiscovered, across all

genres, the winners of which receive monetary benefits and extensive opportunities of getting their work published. The Atty’s on the other hand is a work of collaboration between Wattpad and Margaret Atwood, a renowned Canadian author and poet under whose guidance the winners of the two categories – Enthusiast and Competitor are awarded.

It also allows you to connect with some famous authors.

A popular site such as Wattpad attracts a lot of people who indulge in plagiarism and the like. The work of the authors on this site is protected by the Digital Millennium Copyright Act (DMCA), apart from following their own terms and conditions to protect the work. The minimum age requirement to have one’s own account is 13 years.

What is vital to note is that, at the end of the day the content is not always of the best standards. After all, unpublished work is seldom reviewed or has perfect grammar/spellings. But, if one can look past those, there is so much to learn from the stories. The most bold topics are dealt with and the most sensitive issues, irrespective of religious beliefs, laws of the land are handled in such an unbiased manner that one is forced to revisit and revise. The redeeming quality of Wattpad, that probably makes it so popular is the vast amount of content that is available for free.

All you need is your smartphone to double up as a library.

If you do see me staring at my phone intently, it is probably because I am reading off of it. Has it gained importance and is it the harbinger of change for the world of e-reading? Probably, but it will never be able to replace the humble book. The smell of the yellowing pages, the sturdy feeling of the cover when we clutch on to it in anticipation of what’s to come next, the feeling of security the envelops a reader, or the magic that transforms the plebeian book into wonderland to every reader will never be replaced. Art As You Know It!

Fine art dates back to the 17th century, when such art forms were developed for aesthetic and intellectual purposes and judged for its beauty and meaningfulness, specifically, painting, sculpture, drawing, watercolor, graphics and architecture thus distinguishing them from applied arts that had to serve some practical functionality. The word "fine" does not so much denote the quality of the artwork in question, but the purity of the discipline.

Historically, the five main fine arts were painting, sculpture, architecture, music and poetry, with minor arts including theater and dance. However, today the fine arts include other forms such as film, photography, conceptual art, and printmaking. In some institutes of learning or in museums, fine art or frequently the term fine arts are associated exclusively with visual art forms.

As originally conceived, and as understood for much of the modern era, the perception of aesthetic qualities required a refined judgment usually referred to as having good taste, which differentiated fine art from popular art and entertainment. However, in the postmodern era, the value of good taste is disappearing, to the point that having bad taste has become synonymous with being avant-garde!

The separation of arts and crafts that exists in Europe and the United States is not shared by other cultures.

In Japanese aesthetics of everyday life are worthy of being done with both skill and creativity; integrating not only art with craft but man-made with nature. Chinese fine art also includes many things that would be seen as crafts in the West, including ceramics, engraving, weaving, and embroidery. Latin American art was dominated by European colonialism until the 20th Century, but indigenous art began to reassert itself inspired by the Constructivist Movement arts with crafts based upon socialist principles.

Fine art on a deeper level integrates experience and tries to make sense of what it really means and the debate for conversation is ongoing between the different demands of one's life. The Life Room is really a very strange anomalous thing that logically gives people a chance to lose themselves: a place where people draw the figure by exploring their consciousness.

If we were to go down in history, the Life Room not only helps one to compose the figure in their mind but that is where the model takes shape or enactment, whether it is for religious or for a narrative image. It is like a gymnasium, drawing, copying the figure and matching the relationship to the figure.

Another interesting part is when text is used in the drawing; the drawing then becomes expressive not just in a conceptual way but marks itself as a part of the drawing.

These drawings kind of operate in a slightly theatrical way. It is not about the subject but they are also about exploring one's consciousness.

Sometimes when one draws from observation, one's consciousness slips, sometimes there is focus, sometimes one tends to drift off, or sometimes one goes into an associated thought so the drawings in that way irrespective of what they mean in terms of social, political or psychological aspect, they are also on a rather simple level, a kind of record of the way the mind works in terms of perception and our perception take on after our imagination.

ಕಡಿಮೆಯಿಂದ ಹೇಳಬೇಕು. ಅದರಲ್ಲೂ 'ಪ್ರತಿಭಟನೆಯ ಮಾಧ್ಯಮ' ಎಂದೇ ಕರೆಯಲ್ಪಡುವ ಬೀದಿನಾಟಕ ತಂಡಗಳು ಹೆಚ್ಚುಕಡಿಮೆ ಕಣ್ಮರೆಯಾಗಿವೆ. ಬೀದಿ ರಂಗಭೂಮಿ ಎಂದಾಕ್ಷಣ 'ಗುತ್ತಿಗೆ ಹಿಡಿದವರಂತೆ' ಮುಂದೆ ಬರುವ ಬಹುತೇಕ ಜನ ಈಗ ಅದನ್ನು ಬರೀ ಒಂದು 'ಪ್ರಚಾರ ಮಾಧ್ಯಮ'ವಾಗಿಯೇ ಬಳಸುತ್ತಿದ್ದಾರೆ.

Higher Education - Statistical Glance

Higher education plays a pivotal role in the overall development of the country. The Indian Higher education today placed second largest higher education system in the world with over 692 Universities, 46,430 colleges and 25.9 million students. The country has witnessed a very high growth rate with student enrolment increasing at a Compound annual growth rate (CAGR) of 10.8% and institutions at a CAGR of 9% in the last decade. Higher Education in India suffers from various quality deficits are improving the quality of teaching-learning in a majority of non-elite Universities and colleges, improving equity and access, enhancing the focus on research & innovation and ensuring employability of students. Acute Faculty shortage continues to impact the quality of Higher Education. Currently, about 25% of Faculty positions in Universities remain vacant while 24% of faculty in universities and 57% in colleges are without PhD degrees. According to the UGC statistics (2014), 1,176 professors, 2,044 associate professors and 2,487 assistant professors posts are lying vacant in the central universities. Over 37% of faculty posts in the existing 16 IITs are vacant.

What is UGC NET Exam?

UGC NET Exam is one of the important parameter to determine eligibility for lectureship both in Indian universities and colleges and for award of Junior Research Fellowship (JRF) for Indian nationals in order to ensure minimum standards for the entrants in the teaching profession and research.

Objectives of UGC NET / JRF Exam

- To standardize the higher education system.
- To ensure minimum standards for the entrants in the teaching profession and research at College and University Level.
- To award of Junior Research Fellowship (JRF) for Indian nationals (for doing PhD In Universities / Colleges / Research Institutes)

Eligibility Conditions

- Aspirants who secured at least 55 percent marks (without rounding off or grace) in Master's degree or equivalent examination. (50 percent marks in case of SC/ST/PC/PH candidates).
- Candidates who have appeared or who are appearing or whose results are awaited are also eligible to apply. However such candidates will be admitted provisionally and shall be considered eligible for award of lectureship only after they have passed masters degree examination with minimum aggregate of 55 percent marks (50 percent marks in case of SC / ST/PC/PH candidates).
- Such candidates must obtain their PG degree mark sheet within 02 years from the date of SET result with required percentage. If they fail to do so they will be disqualified.
- Candidates have to appear for exam in the subject of their post graduation only.

NET Exam calendar:

UGC conducts NET twice a year, i.e., in the months of June and December. The notifications announcing the June and December examinations are published in the months of March and September.

Job Opportunities & Career Prospects

- Eligibility to teach at University / College Level: Clearing of NET confers eligibility for lectureship upon Indian nationals, i.e. the NET qualified candidates are eligible to apply for the post of Assistant Professor in all Indian universities/Institutes/colleges. The candidates clearing SET were eligible for appointment to the post of Assistant Professor at Universities / Colleges anywhere in India. There will be very good openings in the universities, Colleges.

- Research Associates / Research Officer: Several research institutes and government organizations employ research Associates / officers in various research oriented programmes.

- Industry: Experience and the expertise in research knowledge and handling data can serve as valuable assets for jobs in industry.

Junior Research Fellowship (JRF)

- Objective: The objective of the JRF scheme is to provide opportunities to NET-qualified candidates to undertake advanced studies and research leading to M.Phil /Ph.D. Degrees in Humanities and Social Sciences including Languages and Sciences.

- Structure: UGC has allocated a number of fellowships to the universities for the candidates who qualify the test for JRF. The candidates who qualify for the award of Junior Research Fellowship are eligible to pursue research in the subject of their post-graduation or in a related subject. They can peruse their research work in universities, institutions, IITs, NITs and other national Important Institutions. **However, the candidates qualifying exclusively for Assistant Professor will not be considered for award.**

- Eligibility: Candidates who have qualified in NET JRF test. However, the selection for the JRF is made by the respective universities/institutions/colleges.

- Age: Junior Research Fellowship: Not more than 28 years. A relaxation up to 5 years is provided to the candidates belonging to OBC SC/ST/PWD categories and to women applicants.

- Validity: The tenure of fellowship is initially for two years under the JRF scheme. Upon expiry of this period, the work of the Fellow will be evaluated by experts. If the research work is found satisfactory, his/her tenure will be extended for a further period of three years under the enhanced emoluments of the Senior Research Fellowship (SRF). The Junior Research Fellowship (JRF) is available maximum for five years subject to fulfillment of certain conditions. There will be no further provision for extension of fellowship.

- How to apply: The qualified candidates have to apply against the advertisements given by the universities/institutions/colleges recognized under Sec. 2 (f) and 12 (B) of the UGC Act. The selection is made as per the procedure of respective institutions.

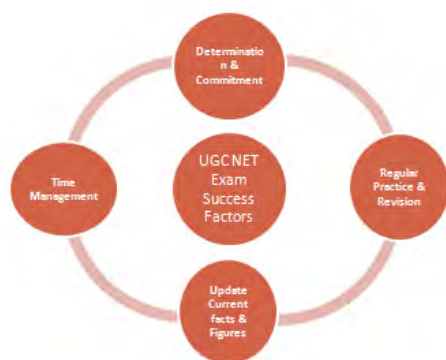

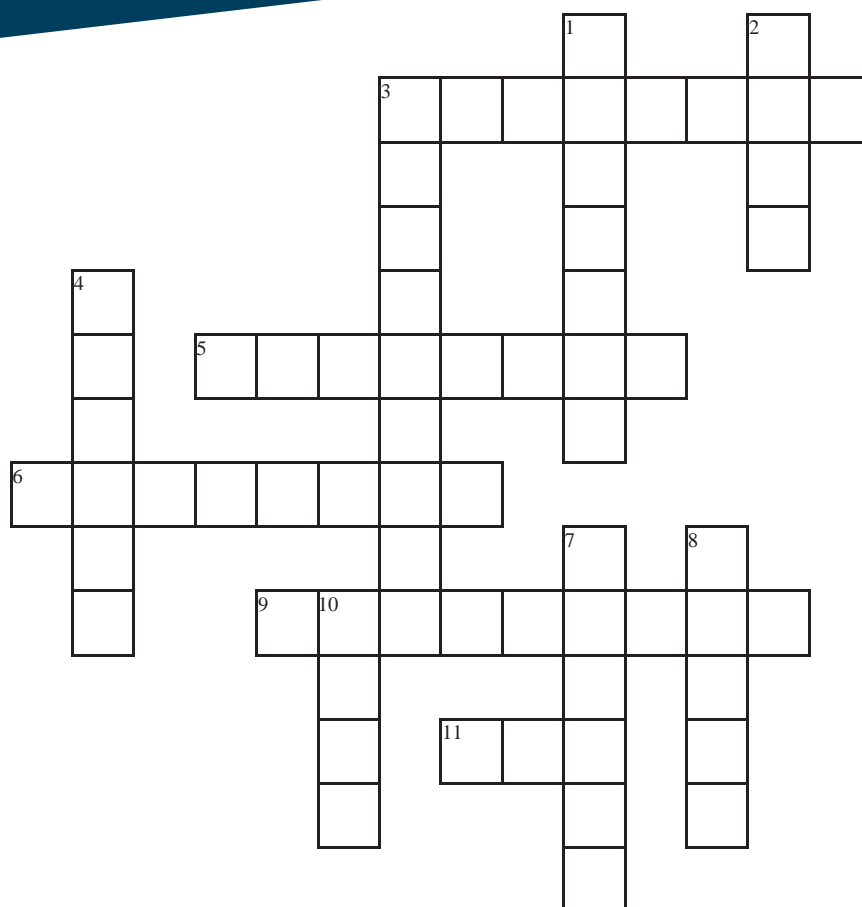
