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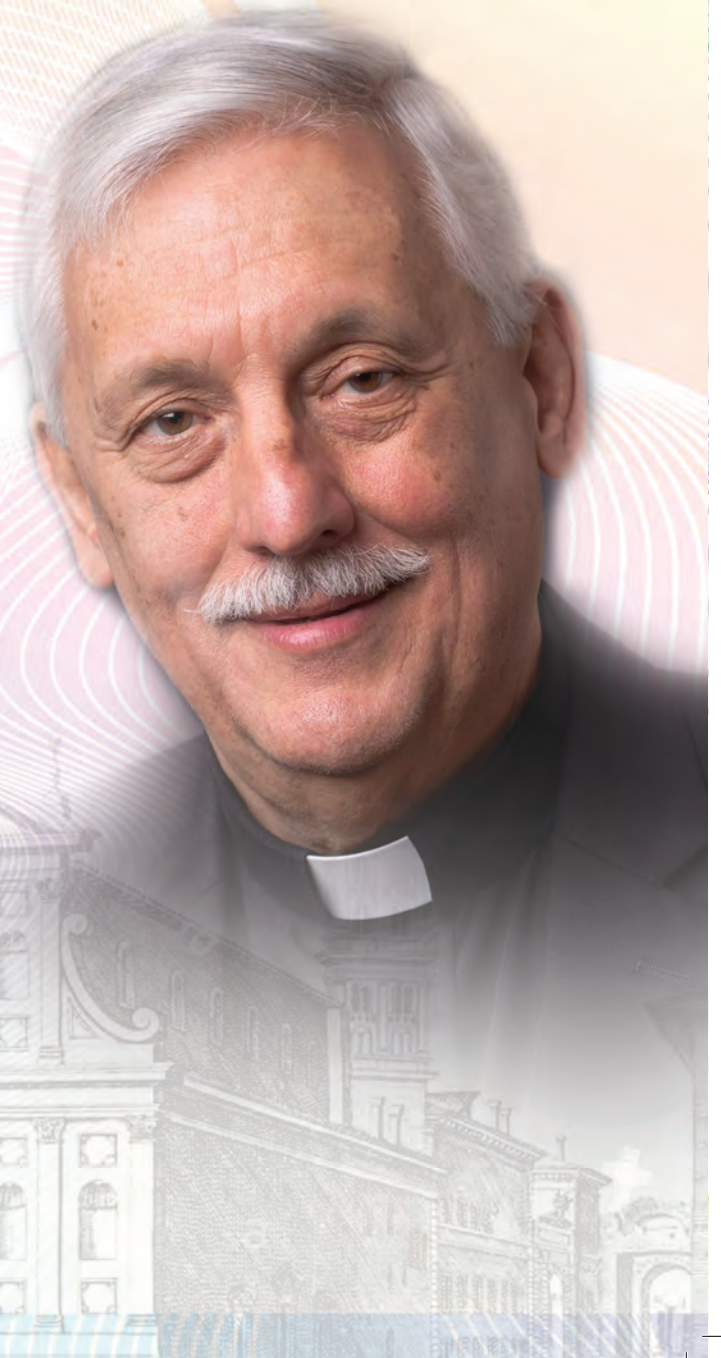

Annual Report 2016 - 2017



Distinguished Chief Guest of this evening Mr. Anand K. Joshi, Vice Chancellor, CMR University, Rev. Fr. Anthony Joseph, SJ, Vice President of BJES & Rector of St. Joseph's Institutions, Dear Principals, Rev. Fathers, Rev. Sisters, respected Members of the Staff, Parents, Alumni, Guests and my dear Students. Good evening and a warm welcome to the 45th College Day Celebrations of St. Joseph's College of Commerce.

In January this year, Oxfam released its annual report on world inequality, reporting that 8 individuals had a combined net worth equal to the bottom 50% world population, around 3.7 billion people. While the report's methodology and interpretations are being fiercely debated by economists, journalists and business persons, the substantive message is clear: Inequality is the *bête noire* of our times. There are 4 billion people earning less than \$5 a day, constituting the world's 'Base of the Pyramid'. Their lives are characterised by chronic poverty – the poverty of wealth, health, education, rights, safety, governance, access and opportunity. The imperative to serve these markets is an economic incentive as well as a moral responsibility.

The base of the pyramid is home to many emerging markets – India, China, Brazil, Mexico, Bangladesh, Kenya, Nigeria and so forth. These countries have large, underserved markets, high degree of informality, high transaction costs, and pose considerable risks to doing business. Yet, they will be drivers of world growth in the next century. However, this growth is going to be neither organic nor easy, for the economic potential

of these markets is tied to the social conditions of their inhabitants. In other words, business cannot create economic value at the base of the pyramids, without creating social values. Success stories like Grameen, SKS Microfinance, MPesa, Aravind Eye Hospitals, HUL, Acumen and Omidyar have shown us some paths. Nonetheless, how businesses are going to solve the social problems of the world while creating economic value for themselves is a world of challenges and opportunities waiting to be explored by our students.

The times we live in need an army of young men and women who have the humility to unlearn and relearn, the courage to chart difficult and new paths, who exhibit empathy, compassion and principles, and possess both the analytical rigour and creative bent of mind to design innovative, cost effective and scalable solutions to social problems. At St. Joseph's, we are proud to have nurtured this for many years – our interdisciplinary curriculum is steeped in both theory and practice, with immersive learning opportunities for our students to explore a wide variety of interests from research, writing, journalism, to entrepreneurship and private sector internships. During one of our editorial committee meetings when we were discussing the theme for this year's Blue Chip we had reached a kind of dead end as we had used all interesting themes for our previous editions. We were looking for themes that students could easily connect with and the more we thought the more difficult it became to come up with an original and interesting theme. This was also the time of the year during which all final year students were getting tensed and desperate about their placement offers and career prospects. The worried look on students who found it difficult to get a job or those who found a job with a pay that was much less than their expectations made us ask a fundamental question about our lives. We asked our students what 'success' meant to them. The collection of experiential narratives, articles and creative fiction that is presented below is a result of students making a sincere attempt to answer that question.

During the course of collecting and editing these narratives and articles we realized that students were challenging the accepted notions of 'success' as something related to money, status or power. Each student was trying to imagine his or her own idea of success and proposing it in a strong way. Be it Vishesh's narrative of personal quest to find the meaning of 'success', Praveen's narrative of facing the hardships to become what he is today, Saghar's dream of pursuing her education, Dhruv's passionate letter to his 15 year old self, the voice of Puneeth's future self or Saniha's and Uthara's challenge to accepted notions of 'success', these students have redefined the idea of success in a radical way. In fact these articles herald the collapse of the old model in which the meaning of 'success' was handed down to the younger generation by older generation through authority or implanted in the minds of people by corporate companies through coercion.

As we present to you these writings we hope that many more students make a bold attempt to redefine success for themselves. We also hope that these writings motivate others to write and express their opinions without fear or inhibitions.

"So What?" – The Story Behind Our Privilege

Lately I've been very fascinated by the concept of "success" and how people from different backgrounds, more specifically the urban class, go about defining and achieving their goals. Most importantly, the circumstances under which they achieve their goals and the

factors they attribute to their success once they've achieved it.

Before we go about redefining success, let's examine the existing definition. I found a somewhat comprehensive definition on the Internet:

"Success (the opposite of failure) is the status of having achieved and accomplished an aim or objective. Being successful means the achievement of desired visions and planned goals. Furthermore, success can be a certain social status that describes a prosperous person that could also have gained fame for its favorable outcome. The dictionary describes success as the following: "attaining wealth, prosperity and/or fame".



If I was to elaborate on this definition, I guess people would also associate success with a life full of happiness with family and friends and a good balance between work and family. Of course, you'll always have people on either end of the spectrum, someone who values fame or wealth and economic prosperity above all else and someone who doesn't care too much about money as long as they have a happy family and are content with their job; and then you have certain Jack The Rippers and Osama Bin Ladens. But let's count them out for the moment. I guess it's safe to say that I've pretty much covered most people on the spectrum.

I've had the chance to meet and talk to different types of people who've achieved varying degrees of success, from multimillionaire CEOs to some of my own friends who seem to be on the path to a very successful life. One of these people I would like to talk about is my friend. Let's call him Sid. Sid is a devout Hindu Brahmin who's studying hard to become a Chartered Accountant, just like his dad before him. Sid is very hardworking and gets decent grades and hence isn't very fond of the concept of reservations in educational institutions. He takes immense pride in his family's traditions and culture. So much so that if he was to be in a relationship, he doesn't see the point in pursuing someone who is not Brahmin as he can't envision a future with them, because his family would not approve. However, I believe him when he tells me that it's a personal choice, because it's a question of family values and having cultural differences.

Next, I'd like to talk about another friend, or rather his mother, let's call her Mel. Mel is a charismatic protestant Christian, goes to church every Sunday, and is very proud of having raised two strapping young boys who she believes will go out and conquer the world, but is rather disappointed that they don't believe in creationism and flood geology. However, she's relatively "liberal", as some would label her, as compared to her friends who have home schooled their children so as to not let science corrupt their minds. She believes in the literal interpretation of the bible and believes it's her biblical responsibility to support the nation of Israel, irrespective of human rights violations happening there and reserves a portion of her earnings that she donates to Israel and the Zionist movement.

My grandmother having been married off at the ripe age of 14 years, not having studied past 9th standard has been a housewife for her entire life, takes immense pride in having raised three kids who are doing very well for themselves. The other day, in conversation with a relative, she unapologetically proclaims how she would never give her house on rent to a Muslim in front of my maid who also happens to be yes, you guessed right-a Muslim; yes the same maid my very successful software engineer mum wasn't too comfortable accommodating in the servant quarters at the back of my house, because Muslims cook beef. I'm sure by now you would have noticed a number of digressions, but I'll get back to how those are relevant in a bit.

Statistically, these individuals represent the top 1% of India, if not lesser. But let's really get a feel of how "successful" one needs to be, to fit in that percentile. To be in the top 1%- a person needs to be making approximately 34,000 rupees p.m., which translates to 4,08,000 rupees p.a. To put that number into perspective, assuming a wage labourer in India who's being paid the minimum wage (160rs/day) works on all 365 days of the year, it would take him 7 years to earn the same amount; for an average labourer in Zimbabwe, it would take about 22 years. The 1% in India also happens to own about 58.4% of the wealth, with the bottom half owning about 2%.

So now you're probably thinking, "Yeah, we get it, we're extremely lucky to have not been born to a cotton farmer in Zimbabwe, boo hoo, now what?" That's a reasonable reaction, that's how I used to feel too, but let's dig a little deeper. Putting luck aside, let's dwell into the various socio-economic factors that determine our success. Here's my own example, I have the opportunity to explore a wider range of career options considering the fact that my father is a businessman, because his wealth and the backup option of working in his company practically acts as a safety net; hence when I become an accomplished penguinologist cum cat behavior consultant, it is not entirely by individual merit. Similarly, we as individuals are moulded by our social environment- our friends, family, neighbourhood, school, economic class, caste, etc. Taking my example again- my personality, preferences, likes and dislikes, worldview, lifestyle etc., have been influenced by my own family and friends, the private schools





my parents have sent me to, the places I've traveled and most importantly the various people I've met and their opinions and beliefs. So this would give me an undue advantage if I were to apply for a job in the industry my father has worked in or start my own company, as compared to someone who has had no exposure to entrepreneurship and business networks. However, if I wanted pursue a career in music or theatre, I'd have no clue where to start as compared to someone whose family has music run in their blood, as they say.

Yes, I agree, all the examples I've given till now are just anecdotes, so let's evaluate some empirical data relating to IAS officers who are the crème de la crème of our society and would easily classify as the "elite 1%", even income wise. According to a study done in 1985 (yes, that's a study done 30 years ago, but they are probably our parents age by now, who we often look up to as successful people, if that's any consolation), Brahmins constituted 37.6% of all recruits and were the majority in all states, despite the fact that they constituted about 5% of the population at the time. The 'Shudras' however, constituted 2% of all recruits, despite the fact that SC/ST community constituted around 23% of the population. However, since the mid-1990s, the number of positions reserved for SC/STs and OBCs have been increased from 22% to about 50%. Another study done in 1972 concluded that, "candidates with higher university qualifications, urban background, previous experience of some positions, whose parents have been employed in modern professions, have greater chances of success in the IAS." (Bhambri, 1972). Other studies have also shown how parents earnings is a very big determinant of the child's earnings. However, these studies do not necessarily prove a causality, but they are enough to show us that a positive co-relation exists between socio-economic background and chances of success. So, as we can see, success and failure is a complex function of socialization and accumulation of social capital among other factors.

I think it's time that I clarify that out of the two ways all this information can be interpreted- i) as an explanation behind the successes of the elite or ii) as an inquiry into the dynamics behind social and economic inequality, I would urge the reader to consider the latter as it is far more important and relevant, as my aim is not to discredit and induce guilt in those who are successful, but to explore the

dynamics of a system and public narrative that has disproportionately benefited a handful, at the cost of the vast majority.

Sid, Mel and my family are now probably thinking, "How is this our fault? You know what, we've worked hard all our lives, so what if we're a little conservative in our beliefs, we pay our taxes and we give generously to charity. These are our individual beliefs based in religious tradition and it's also a question of family values, we don't run the government to effect any change, so how does it matter what I believe in the confines of my home?" I think we fail to realize that the so called "individual" doesn't exist in a vacuum and that individuals change and influence society as much as they are products of it, as Marx eloquently put it, "Society does not consist of individuals; it expresses the sum of connections and relationships in which individuals find themselves." Hence I firmly believe we can only understand an individual in relation to the whole and vice versa. So in a deeply divided society where there is already a significant amount of cultural and intellectual inbreeding among the elite, our beliefs and ideologies are passively enabling the prevailing socio-economic order and stunting social mobility; this means people from underprivileged backgrounds lose out on being hired into high end jobs and thus have their skills and talents wasted. As I type this, I can hear my grandma tell my Muslim maid to not even switch the light on in the pooja room, because she did it with her left hand. I don't think even 70% of reservations in our institutions would facilitate change if there's no social mobility and cohesion in the family and immediate community level. While we point fingers at the politicians and evil corporate overlords, we conveniently forget that these politicians and corporate overlords are the products of our own families, communities, colleges and churches.

By having divisive beliefs, we are fracturing our social landscape and passively preventing people from attaining the social capital that we took advantage of by the virtue of being born into favourable circumstances. These divisions which politicians conveniently capitalise on by engaging in vote bank politics which further exacerbates the situation. The same uncles and aunties, who are social justice warriors on whatsapp, scoff when they hear about inter caste or inter faith marriages and are indifferent towards people being massacred over the meat they eat and act as though paying taxes is a





justification to yell at the BBMP workers in front of their house. I think we need to accept a little more responsibility than just numb ourselves by donating a few thousand bucks to charity, signing a few online petitions and forwarding messages.

I personally think “personal beliefs”, “traditions”, “family values” and descriptions of the sort are euphemisms for prejudice and bigotry and that all beliefs come with consequences in the real world. We have no choice but to interact and enter into relationships with other people irrespective of our preferences and beliefs, because an individual alone is not self-sufficient. Only if I happened to be living in a self-sufficient community with me and “my people” in the mountains would we be able to live without any consequences to anybody else. I’m not one to go to tell a grieving mother that her still born child is not going to heaven, but what am I to say to her if she also happens to be funding the ethnic cleansing in Gaza like Mel; or happens to be raising her children in isolation waiting for the end of the world, clearly discussing the implausibility of the revelations occurring entails telling her that her child is going to decay in the ground. There aren’t any easy answers to these questions, but I believe they need to be asked if we hope to promote any sort of religious and cultural plurality and secularism. Here’s a pretty comprehensive description of secularism:

“...that attitude of mind which refuses to accept the division of humanity into religious or races or historical classes as final. ...It is incompatible with any extreme anti-scientific, anti-intellectual and dogmatic stand points so far as they affect the solutions of human problems on this earth. It believes that man has a duty to prove his own condition and make the human situation the ultimate arbiter in matters exclusively human” (Khundmiri, 1968)

This however does not mean every 15 year old atheist with a xerox copy of the Communist Manifesto has found the answer to life; because we have seen how a mass, populist anti-establishment rhetoric has led to Brexit and also the rise of Donald Trump, through reactionary politics. It is quite similar to the rise of Hitler in Nazi Germany, which was a solution to the socio-economic malaise of the people in the aftermath of World War I. It’s as important to be nuanced in our ideas and beliefs as much as it is to pursue objective truths, so as to change the meta-narrative.

So you might now ask, “What does all this have to do with redefining success?” I personally think the traditional definition is inadequate as it doesn’t require us to question our belief system or change anything. As much as Sid will grow up to become a very successful CA and find the Brahmin girl of his dreams, his one vote for that politician who fervidly hates the reservation system as much as he does, in order to create a more, so called “meritocratic society” for his son, has the potential to permanently scar our social landscape. As part of the 1%, I believe it’s our responsibility to lead the ideological discourse, if we want to see any systemic change. It’s a startling realization that if the system was actually even close to being fair and equal, I probably wouldn’t be where I am today. Having benefited from a system that has been working in my favour at the cost of others, the least I can do is question the status quo and start a discussion, because by being ignorant towards it, I’m passively enabling this system while I continue to benefit from it and that doesn’t make me feel very good irrespective of how much money I earn and how happy my family is. As much as I wish I can achieve even a fraction of the success my family has, or any of the people I’ve mentioned above have, I personally don’t think I can lead a fulfilling life being conscious of these things and not trying to do or say something about it.

It is the master of our emotions and I'm sharing one such memorable or rather powerful one of mine that has never happened to me again.

School! Lovely days! I spent those days happily but unfortunately in a small world. I never tried to look out of this box nor did my school show me the way. What would a guy from a middle class family, joining a small school, think of the outside world? I never learnt the practical aspect of any concept, never was good at anything. Life was in a small dark world. I never had good friends during my school days. Everyone around me felt that I'm weird. I still don't know the reason for this. On the first day of every exam I used to stand near the school gate since I was not allowed to write exams without paying the school fee. My mother used to stand near the office room, trying to plead for extending the date for paying the fee. With the smile on my face and the dedication for my studies I was somehow allowed by the Principal to write the exam. My principal had got used to this and every time he used to permit me because I was studying very well. Teachers who guided me always encouraged me to study well so that I would be able to join a good reputed college but at the same time they scared me saying that I would be the first one to fly out of the cage to reach the destiny. Students from this school have hardly crossed PUC. Guys lose interest half way and girls are forced to lose theirs. But I had the dream of achieving something for my family and tried to overcome this restriction.

It was the day of my results. Colors changed, there was happiness around me. I made my school proud, teachers happy and my parents were speechless. What more can you ask in your life than their happiness. I promise nothing else can be equal to this. I sat on the cycle the next day, entered a new world. Like the clouds chasing the ocean, I started chasing my dreams. For the first time saw the posh roads with so many lights, vehicles and thousands of people moving around so fast. I felt very small that day. 'How will I even enter this world of competition? Am I capable of doing something?' 'No. Definitely

not' was the loudest voice in my mind. With dreams in my eyes I stepped forward. I was not scared, rather was excited and curious to learn new things. I stepped into Joseph's, the place where I was told it would not be that easy. But I always have been stubborn for certain things and I wanted to join Joseph's, my dream college.

I went back home and troubled the poor woman who had no support from any source to manage the family. Yes, my Mother. She had neither degree in hand nor any knowledge of the outside world so that she could give good education to both me and my sister. All that she had was the dream that we would be happy someday. How many husbands have left their wives to manage things all by themselves and ran away from everything? How many fathers have left their children without supporting them and without providing anything, for them to survive? Both these situation in my family made us worry about the money that I have to pay for joining Joseph's.

Mothers never leave their children helpless, for she will do something, at least by which they survive till the stage where they can take care of themselves someday. She started working at few houses as maid since I wasn't willing to compromise on my dream for Joseph's. Was I a bad son? Even today I ask that to myself, but somewhere I feel that I have my answer. I believe that only we are responsible for what we become. I do not want anyone to be blamed in future for not becoming what I wanted to. My mother never complained nor stopped me from my dreams. Instead she said, 'somehow we will manage it, not to worry' and that's the kind loving heart she had for me.

My relatives were neither rich nor kind hearted to help us. Even my grandparents sometimes asked us to stop coming to them asking for food. There were hungry sleepless nights with just a glass of water. After this I started to search for some work so that I could try to manage a meal for a day for my family. Who will give a job to an SSLC passed guy, not even 18 years of age, doesn't know to talk better English nor knew anything in computers? One of my friends helped me to get a job in a welding shop. Rs.100 per day is what I got including one time meal for lunch, which made me smile and work all day





from morning to night, carrying huge steel rods without any experience it could cut your fingers sometimes. Two weeks passed away. Days from a glass of water to one time meal was better. But my mother asked me to stop this as day-by-day, I started getting cuts in my hands and it hurt everywhere. I left that work and started to distribute newspapers in the morning, after which I also started with pamphlets for some time. Somehow I managed to earn around Rs.80 per day and this small amount of money helped us survive.

At the end of the day, we were not able to arrange money for college. Both my mother and I sat worried, thinking what to do and fortunately, with the help of my tuition teacher, who taught me free without charge, we were able to find few people in the locality who could help us with something. I would never forget that day, when my mother and I stepped many houses asking people to help us. We found some help and also pledged all the jewels of my sister's and my mother's to the pawn broker and paid my college fees. Though there was happiness in us, we were worried about the future. My mother started working in many houses and I tried looking for any kind of work that was possible till my college started. On the way where I used to put pamphlets, I found a computer center where it was written that they would conduct an entrance exam for students and whosoever gets good percentage would be given some discount to join for the computer course. It starts from the basics and ends with Tally which was considered big those days. Again a selfish heart which has never seen how a computer works went to write the entrance exam and ended up scoring the highest.

Despite the discount amount, the fee for the course came up to Rs. 3000 and I felt I will never be able to pay that. For a guy who is struggling for a day meal, this amount was never possible for him to pay. But the computer center wanted a guy to work for them, distributing pamphlets and cleaning the center at evening time once everyone leaves the place. They said they would pay me Rs. 50 apart from the course amount for working there from morning till night around 9. My mother was worried that with just Rs. 50 how we would manage every night for three people. But she never said anything, rather

happily asked me to join there and learn. With a slight hesitation I started working there, but as the time passed I realized that I never got a chance to learn anything. Every day they gave some reason and made me work but when I asked them to teach, they told me to wait for some more time. I used to wait hours together for my turn to sit on the seat and learn something but that never happened. Fifteen Days passed by and I knew only one thing and that was just to switch on the computer.

A day before my college started, I told them that I will not be able to work from now on because I have to attend college. They did not agree for letting me go just like that and started to shout at me that for fifteen days of teaching they charge around Rs. 1300 and I did not work for more than Rs. 600 till that day. I knew that I worked for more than that but was not capable to argue with them. These numbers can never be forgotten in my life, can they? Never till my heart stops beating.

They asked me to pay the rest of the money or otherwise work for the whole day for next one week. I had nothing to say. They spoke only in English and before I could tell something in my level of English, they used to tell something else. I had no option but to start begging them to let me go or tell me some other way by which they would allow me to go from there. Finally they came with something which was never expected. They had one huge sump and two tanks which were never cleaned for 4-5 years and they wanted me to clean all of that by that night. I had to agree with no excuses. I cleaned them and went back home late in the night.

That night taught me many things. It becomes very important to build yourself for people to respect you and also to know the world, how they are and how things actually work out there. Only the sky above us is common for everyone. This one small incident is just one experience of my life. Today I'm in St. Joseph's College of Commerce studying B.Com and also doing my Article-ship for my CA career. Always fight fiercely for the things that make you feel alive. What is life without memories? It's like the sky without stars. Willingness to learn, confidence and a kind heart will never let you down. Someday all the pieces will fall into place. Wait and wait, your turn will definitely come to prove yourself.





My Journey So Far

I am Saghar Ada, a 22 year old girl and a BBA-second-year student at St. Josephs College of Commerce, Bangalore. I have had many different experiences studying in India. First, it has made me mature. The context of Indian mixed society made it possible for me to meet and learn

from different people. The experience here changed my behaviour and thoughts. I was born as an Afghan refugee who spent difficult childhood in a male dominated country. I found India a place to find myself and to know my value as a human being. Here we have freedom of expression, we have freedom to share our thoughts and we can stand for our rights too. It has been a big experience in my life, I found myself here and I found my passion.

Though it's hard to live alone and far from family and as a girl, I am really happy that I got this opportunity to come here and explore a lot and make myself stronger. I can say that I faced culture shock here; studying in India can be challenging, especially for a girl. Before coming here I used to think, like many other girls in my place, that women are only for raising kids and to be a house-wife. Now I am not thinking that way. Here I learnt how important education is and that human beings are all equal regardless of gender, religion, cast, place or race.

College and Education

I have learnt in my college, especially from my principle Dr Daniel Fernandes SJ. I learnt humbleness and how to be nice to all people. Through his actions and a good heart he taught me to be strong and to serve people. I have learnt about research which has opened a huge road ahead of me to work on for my career. I did my research assignment on Economic Growth in Afghanistan. It was a good and challenging experience; it was accepted as one of

the good research papers and published in the college research journal.

I did a one year Human Rights Diploma which was a good and amazing experience. I learnt a lot about human rights and dignity, about transgender, gays and LGBT communities. I could meet a lot of amazing people through this course, one of whom was called Akkai, a trans-person. I learnt from her to be ourselves, not to feel regret for being what we are but to feel regret for our actions. I learnt that it is hard to be a good human in this unjust world. This course helped me to find my passion and interest for my Masters.

I had a social internship in Vimochana Forum for Women's Rights in which we organised a programme to learn about Palestinians and their country. I could see that my country and Palestine's condition is almost the same as both are war-torn countries. In Vimochana I learnt about critical thinking and I found that I'm passionate in writing my thoughts; girls like me have so many un-said stuffs inside our minds. We can express them through writing; I think I am going to even publish a book.

What I learnt in these few years?

I had always heard that we need to be honest, but unless we experience it first-hand we may not get its real meaning; I learnt to be honest first with myself and then with people. I learnt that to be happy, one doesn't necessarily has to have a lot of money, we can help people with small things which we have, even with our passion or talent.

As a women and a girl who has lived as a refugee in a patriarchal society, I can say that first I need to help myself and then the new generation and women, back in my county, with education and knowledge. Without knowledge we can't do anything. It's the only way through which we can develop and have progress in our society.

I also learnt that "common sense" is not related to the level of education at all. Common sense is when you can understand things consciously; when you are not selfish and when you can feel sympathy with people who are suffering but can't express their predicament.





I also learnt that though growing up in a difficult country is challenging, but it makes you mature, stronger and an experienced person. So I feel happy to have lived in that Afghan society. When sometimes I compare myself with girls from other countries and places who are of my age I feel that their concerns are very different from that of mine. I want to learn and get my education to help and to do my part for development of my society or any other place where I can be of any help, but I hear that for some other girls education is only for the sake of degree and for their own personal gain. I feel happy that I can realise these and set higher goals with better values in my life.

Another thing that I experienced here is being discriminated the same way as in Afghanistan for being from Hazara ethnic group as I look like Indian people who are from north-east. I hope that one day we see no discrimination based on caste or race in India.

I learnt that only our goodness will remain in this world and nothing else, so it's better to do good for this planet and for humans.

Why education is my passion?

I can say that education, not only for me but for each human being, is important. Education has positive and constructive impact on every aspect of our life. We can't miss even one day of our school – the importance is a lot – I'm imagining that if I had missed my school days for any reason, be it even for security reasons, I wouldn't have been here to do my bachelors. I'm wondering where I would have been if I was one of those women who has to go to work for livelihood and whose husband has been killed in suicide attacks. These ideas come to my mind as many of my friends in Afghanistan have already had such hard experiences and they are living hard lives. Without education I wouldn't be the person I'm now.

I can see here that most of the students who score higher marks have had a good and quality educational background. Most of them have studied in international schools. But students like me who do not have that kind of educational background may not score higher marks. Unfortunately, there is a tendency to focus on smart students and students like me can be ignored.

What is success for me?

So, the more I learn the more I realise the power of education which shapes every aspect of our lives. Education has helped me to think of values beyond gender and religion or race. As Horace says "Education ... is a great equalizer of conditions of men ... the balance wheel of the social machinery ... It does better than to disarm the poor of their hostility toward the rich ... it prevents being poor". For me education is a passion that enables me to help myself and my new generation in my nation, it helps us to bring equality in society.

For me, success is when at end of the day when I revalue my day I could be satisfied that I could do something meaningful on that day. For me, success is to be aware of my conscious and unconscious mind at any time. And for me success is hard work and I only think about my goal and my dream. To me success is to be happy and make people happy and be honest and nice and give people comfort when they are with you. For me success is to listen more and talk less. For me success is to read books and increase your knowledge. To me success is to help people. Sometimes we help people just to exercise our power but I think helping people from our heart is right.

I would love to get my PhD and would love to write a book and I think that will be my moment of success and it is also when I will be able to support other people as I am getting support now from Jesuit Refugee Service for my education. I hope if I could do this one day for another person it will be a successful day in my life.

My suggestion to other students, not only Afghan students, but as a whole, is that if we, the new generation, want to bring change in this world then I think we can only bring it through education. Especially for women in the third world, education can help us to raise our voice and tell our untold stories. Education helps us to know ourselves better and could control our ego and can fight with our ego-centric mind set.

Education teaches us to be humble, to be nice and to help other people. We are not getting education only for ourselves or for our individual need, we are getting it because of people and because we need each other.

And as appealing as that sounds to you, you also understand that it won't feed you or take care of your needs. I'm glad that you're thinking realistically. That still doesn't mean that you need to conform to anyone else's definitions of success, because while you may not realise it now, you are stuck in a box that's too small to contain your ambition, let alone allow others to project their "better ambitions" onto you too.

In a few days, that box will explode. The version of yourself that comes out of it will not just surprise you, but define who you will become in the years to come. This is a defining period in your life, but not in the ways that you think. You will either choose to start working towards building the legacy

you want to be remembered for, and work so hard at it that it has to support you, or choose the safer option. There is no shame in choosing either, and that's really what I'm here to tell you about. You can choose to define yourself in any way you'd like to and draw a line between where your life starts and everyone's business ends. 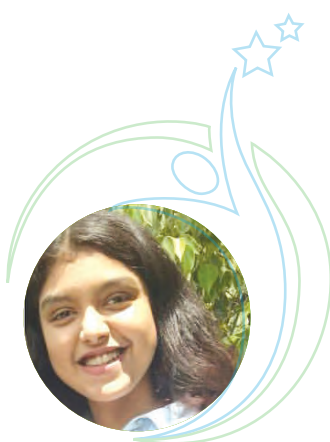

My passion still haunts me like the ghost of a girlfriend. “You abandoned me for a mere fancy job,” it yells at me. But I had no choice then, my family’s financial position was worse and this passion would take time to turn into gold, maybe diamonds.

- b) B.Com (Professional Studies)
- c) B.Com (BPM- Industry Integrated)
- d) B.Com (Travel and Tourism)
- e) B.Com (Professional - International Accounting & Finance)
- f) Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA)
- g) BBA International Twinning Programme
- h) BBA (Entrepreneurship)
- i) BBA (Professional- Finance and Accountancy)

II) Postgraduate Programmes (Two- Year)

- a) M.Com (Finance and Taxation/ Marketing & Analytics)
- b) M. Com (International Business)
- c) M. Com (Financial Analysis)

III) Post-graduate Diploma (PGD)

The highly qualified faculty, efficient and symbiotic administrative teams, excellent infrastructure that includes spacious classrooms, a well-stocked library, advanced computer lab, and an assortment of sports facilities amplify the efforts to create an environment that fosters academic excellence and growth.

Choice Based Credit System (CBCS)

Higher education in India has undergone a tremendous evolution over the years. The autonomous status held by the Institution has endowed it with a freedom that helps create an academic environment that is flexible and

innovative. The Institution has successfully implemented the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) from the academic year 2015-16.

The CBCS offers students a choice of courses tailored to their interests and career goals. It offers flexibility in terms of choosing papers and designing the curriculum and syllabus.

Implementation of CBCS (2016-17)

- a) The implementation of the CBCS changed the pedagogy into an interactive process where students evolved from being passive listeners to active contributors in knowledge acquisition.
- b) The move towards the CBCS system greatly helped the learners to choose electives from the wide range of courses. The students successfully adopted an interdisciplinary approach to learning that enabled them to choose additional courses to acquire more than the required credits.
- c) The course matrix included practical sessions, field studies and case studies that equipped students to acquire the much-required skill component.
- d) Under CBCS the 2nd year students were given the choice to choose two courses (Allied Optional) of 4 credits each which were interdisciplinary in nature.

Under CBCS, for the academic year 2017 - 18, the college proposes to offer specializations in a) Accountancy b) Finance c) Marketing d) Human Resource Management e) Economics f) International Business g) Banking. Each specialization consists of five courses of which one is a skill based course relevant to their specialization. Papers under the above-mentioned specializations have been drafted after deliberations with subject experts and industry experts from across the globe. The syllabi of top Educational Institutions have also been referred to.

The CBCS course matrix compliments the Institutions objective of holistic development. It enables them to acquire mandatory as well as optional credits from academics, co-curricular, sports and extension activities. The Institution, offers several professional certificate programs, falling within the CBCS framework for students to learn beyond their classrooms.

Collaborations & Exchange Programmes



Collaborating to Excel

The Institution has entered into various Exchange programmes, International Academic Partnerships, Partnerships with Professional Institutions, Industries and NGO's to foster a global culture of educational excellence and to create an environment of innovative learning. The below listed are the Institution's major collaborations to realize its commitment to Academic Excellence, Character Formation and to reach out to communities and individuals who are socially and economically deprived.

International Academic Partners

St. Joseph's College of Commerce has paved the way for International exchange programmes through its International twinning initiatives, Cultural Exchange and Summer Abroad Programmes. These programmes are an enriching and refining experience at many levels. They steer personal and professional development among students by kindling creative ideas, strengthening relationships and instilling cultural sensitivity. In recognition of the said objectives, the Institution has collaborated with Swansea University, UK, Kobe College Japan, ESDES France, Eastern Institute of Technology, New Zealand, University of St. Andrews and University of The West of Scotland.



Swansea University, UK

Swansea University is a research driven institute that thrives on exploration and discovery. It shares a profusion of values with St. Joseph's College of Commerce, such as its emphatic drive to provide top-notch education to its students. Over the past few years the college has established a strong relationship with Swansea in terms of academic twinning and cultural exchange programmes. This initiative seeks to explore the possibility of developing collaborative and mutually beneficial activities. Undergraduate students of St. Joseph's College of Commerce have been

participating in this 1 + 2 -year twinning programme since 2010. As of date, 20 students have partaken in this programme.

Under the Cultural Exchange partnership with the Swansea University, between 1st August 2016 and 21st August 2016, 11 students from Swansea University, Swansea, Wales, took part in the Study and Cultural Programme organized by the International Desk with support from BBA students. During their visit to India, the students attended classes and seminars, went sightseeing in local areas and interacted with the students from our college. They also undertook volunteering work with Non-Governmental Organizations in Solur and Mundgod which are longstanding missions of St. Joseph's College of Commerce. Yoga sessions, an interface with doctors of Narayana Institute of Neurosciences, an interaction with Hashmi theatre (theatre club) and art experience were some of the highlights of the Programme this year.



Kobe College, Japan

Kobe College is an Institution of higher learning for women in the field of liberal arts and sciences. As an initiative to establish the educational tie-up, Kobe College has signed up into a cultural exchange programme with St. Joseph's College of Commerce for five years now. Every year both the Institutions host a 10-day cultural exchange programme which includes lectures on the global economy, social conditions, communicative language classes, workshop on traditional crafts and, visit historical places and industries.

St. Joseph's college of Commerce hosted 24 Japanese students accompanied by three faculty members between 27th August 2016 and 4th September 2016. During their stay in India, the International desk arranged for social visits to BOSCO, a home for street children, Nirmala Shishu Bhavan, a charity home, Tibetan Youth hostel and Jyothi Seva and a NGO. The desk also offered assistance for an ongoing research on



Indian economy, microfinance and social environment both in Bangalore and in Anekal. The Japanese students lauded the hospitality and cultural exposure offered by the students of SJCC and the international desk.

Kobe College, Japan invited 5 selected students accompanied by a faculty member to Japan between 20th to 29th October, 2016 under the cultural exchange programme to experience and learn about Japanese culture and lifestyle.



ESDES, France

St. Joseph's College of Commerce through its French Exchange Programme with ESDES, France introduced a six month International Business Programme (IBP) and a one year Degree Programme. As part of the six-month International Business Programme (IBP), the International Desk propagated information about the Programme (which is a part of the alliance drawn with ESDES, France). An experience sharing session and a guidance workshop was conducted for the applicants to the Programme. Through a scrutiny of applications and a panel interview, six students of B.Com (Travel & Tourism) were selected to participate in the Programme for the current academic year of 2016-17.



French University of Tourism, France

St. Joseph's College of Commerce is exploring possibilities of academic partnership with the French University of Tourism, France. The international desk has disseminated information pertaining to upcoming summer school Programme which is offered to all final year under graduate students. SJCC offers academic support for their participation in the Programme from June to July, 2017.



Eastern Institute of Technology, New Zealand

The Eastern Institute of Technology (EIT) offers a wide array of over 130 qualifications from certificate and diploma to degree and postgraduate level. A Twinning Programme proposal with EIT and St. Joseph's College of Commerce has been initiated. Both the Institutions are currently working arduously to materialize this endeavour.

The initial purpose of the collaboration is to offer a Bachelor of Business Studies to the students of SJCC

in New Zealand. It is a 3 year full time Programme, with a one plus two year twinning (one year study in India and two years in New Zealand) available for St Joseph's College of Commerce students. More collaborated Programmes would be rolled out eventually. The desk has been in continuous contact with representatives of EIT, to ensure seamless inclusion of the Twinning option for 2017-18 admission.



University of St. Andrews, Scotland

The University of St. Andrews is a British public research university in St Andrews, Fife, Scotland. Founded in the 15th century, St Andrews is Scotland's first university and the third oldest in the English speaking world. It has a rich heritage of excelling in academic learning and a strong link with local communities. The university has a wide range of courses and has excelled in research diverse subjects. St. Joseph's College of Commerce has signed a MoU with University of St. Andrews for student exchange programmes and to collaborate on research work among the faculty of both the institutions. This collaboration will help the college in enhancing the quality of its research output and will also provide a global perspective towards research.



University of The West of Scotland - UWS

University of the West of Scotland is one of the country's largest modern universities, and aims to have a transformational influence on the economic, social and cultural development of the West of Scotland, and beyond. The university provides relevant, high quality, inclusive higher education and innovative and useful research. The Research Centre of St. Joseph's College of Commerce is in talks with the university to sign a MoU which will enable both institutions to collaborate on research work.

Partnerships with Professional Institutions

St. Joseph's College of Commerce takes pride in its curriculum which incorporates industry-based requirements and offers students an opportunity to pursue professional courses along with B.Com, BBA, and M.Com courses. The college has signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the following associations and Institutions to facilitate the same.





The Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI)

ICAI is a statutory accounting body of the country and plays a crucial role in forming and revising any new act. The Post-graduation department of St. Joseph's college of commerce together with Institute of chartered accounted India (ICAI) organized a one-day national level seminar on the Impact of IFRS on IND-AS on 31-August-2016 in the Xavier's hall. The proposed new programme BBA (Professional- Finance and Accountancy) is in collaboration with CIMA, and this programme not only offers a nine paper exemption from the regular CIMA papers but also gives an opportunity to students to gain qualifications like Certificate in Business Accounting, Diploma in Management Accounting and Advanced Diploma in Management Accounting as they pursue this programme.

There is a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) signed by the Institution with ACCA to enable students to pursue their ACCA certification course along with their undergraduate or postgraduate programmes. The course is administered by faculty who are highly accomplished and competent and who use innovative pedagogical tools and techniques. The course also offers the provision to obtain certificates from Cambridge ICFE (Financial English) and IFRS. In association with ACCA and ISDC an international conference on Integrated Reporting was organised by the Institution.



Institute of Cost Accountants of India (ICAI)

There is a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) signed by the Institution with ICAI. ICAI is a statutory accounting body of the country and plays a crucial role in forming and revising any new Act. SJCC and ICAI have collaborated to conduct classes to the students for Foundation Programme Examination, to mutually use the professional services of faculty members for giving lectures, organising workshops etc. Members of ICAI conducted two career orientation programme in campus for the students.

This financial reporting course offers a broad introduction to the Nature and Operations of the IASB, Presentation of Financial Statements, Accounting Policies and Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors. The course introduced to the students - Cross-border, M&A and capital raising activities frequently requiring the use of IFRS. IFRS training is also imparted to students registered with the Professional Certificate Programmes. In association with ISDC and ACCA an international conference on Integrated Reporting was organised by the Institution. ISDC also offers a certificate programme titled "Enterprise Operations Certificate" designed exclusively for the BBA students to bridge the skill gaps of business graduate professional worldwide, thereby meeting the employability needs of both business and people.

Partnerships with NGOs

Along with education, the Institution also strives to inculcate a sense of social responsibility among the students. To strengthen this objective further, the Institution has associated itself with different NGOs and social organizations.

The Institution is committed towards upliftment of the marginalized and weaker sections of the society. It is towards this commitment and faith that the Institution encourages its students to work along with NGOs and with no-profit organizations in India, who work in different fields for the cause of the underprivileged. Students take up social internships as it helps to portray their leadership skills and develop their ability to make a change in society. Some of the NGOs and organizations where our students have contributed to the cause are CARE, Akshaypatra, Justice & Care, Sakhi (Hospet), Teach for India, Bosco, Old age homes, primary schools etc. The college also has signed a MoU with Amnesty International to collaborate on human rights education programme. Associations like CSA, NSS and AICUF annually conducts many programmes in association with the above-mentioned NGOs.





Hashmi Theatre Forum in partnership with the NGO Sakhi (Hospet), which works with victims of sexual abuse and rescues women from trafficking and the devadasi system, had organized a tribal exposure camp for the students. Students visited a tribal belt in Paderu, Telangana where they were exposed to the tribal communities.

Strengthening the Institution's partnership with NGOs, this academic year as a significant achievement, the B.Com Travel and Tourism Department collaborated with a nationally acclaimed NGO called U&I. The programme is launched for the first-year students as a part of their social internship programme. The college encourages and supports participation and enrolment of its students in various short term Programmes conducted by foreign universities. In this connection, various informational and promotional drives were carried out for the students to participate in the short term programmes offered by London School of Economics, ESDES, France, French University of Tourism, France.

The desk has organized several counselling sessions for students wanting to go abroad for higher studies, in association with Chopra's (a leading education consultant), EIT and Swansea University.

Meeting with prospective collaborators

Throughout the academic year, the international desk has met representatives from various foreign universities and pitched the propositions to collaborate on several levels. Representatives from Warwick University (UK), St. Andrews University (UK), University of Scotland (UK), Seattle University Business School, and Pepperdine University (USA) visited our campus and interacted with our students.

Cultural and Study Programme

Like every year, the International desk organized cultural and study Programmes for the students of Swansea University, UK and Kobe College, Japan.

Foreign University Exposure

The International desk worked tirelessly to select the above students after careful scrutiny of credentials and referrals. Assistance was also offered for all travel arrangements. Basic Japanese lessons were organized over Skype between 4th and 11th August, 2016 to facilitate communication of the above participants while in Japan. As part of the international visits, faculty members of B.Com department visited Vlerick Business School in Brussels and members of BBA department visited University Higher School of Economics in Russia.

Internship Opportunity

As an outcome of one of the collaborative meetings, the international desk was able to procure an eight weeks unpaid internship for 2 students: Ms. Rachita D'Souza and Mr. Kirthi Kumar Jain at USCS, which is a part of the U.S. Consulate General in Chennai and an agency of the U.S. Department of Commerce's International Trade Administration, Washington, D.C.

Summer School at London School of Economics (LSE)

The Institution encourages students to participate in international academic opportunities with London School of Economics (Summer School). Through these summer school programmes, the students are motivated to enrol in various courses and attend different programmes offered by them. Four students from BBA took the Strategic Management course which ran from 20th June to 8th July, 2016 and another BBA student visited LSE for the second session.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), established in accordance with the NAAC guidelines, aims to work towards supporting and enhancing the academic and administrative performance of the Institution. It works towards developing a system for continuous performance enhancement of staff and students. The objectives of IQAC are enumerated as below:

- a) Promoting innovative practices that continually improves the effectiveness of the learning experiences of students and staff.
- b) Upholding the goals of quality enhancement and sustenance towards organizing various activities and programmes on the campus.
- c) Promoting a learner centric environment for students and staff that foster the mission and vision of the Institution.

Major Initiatives of IQAC for the Academic Year 2016 - 17

Faculty Empowerment Programme (FEP)

An FEP for the Commerce and Management faculty was jointly hosted by St Joseph's College of Commerce and Mount Carmel College from the 23rd to 28th of May 2016. The objective of this FEP was to give an overview of several recent trends in Commerce and Management.

The colleges that participated in the FEP were NMKRV, St Joseph's College, St Joseph's Evening College and St. Xavier's College, Ranchi, in addition to the faculty of St Joseph's College Of Commerce and Mount Carmel College. Spread over a period of six days, eminent speakers shared deep insights into several issues and disciplines with the participants.

Academic Audit of the College

The IQAC successfully organized an Academic Audit to evaluate the efficacy and robustness of our quality management procedures and to review our efforts towards continued enhancement of quality education. The Audit provided for a strategic overview of the entirety of teaching and learning activity.

An External Panel of academic professionals with knowledge of Higher Education and experience of External Audit and Review visited our campus for the same purpose on 25th July, 2016. A report of the review was produced by the team and the College responded to the report by preparing an action plan to address areas of recommendations and concerns that were identified.

UGC Visit for Extension of Autonomy

An expert committee of UGC, consisting of Prof. J.N. Mishra (Chairman), Dr. B.T. Seetha (Member), Dr. Sudha Vyas (Member), Prof. B.L. Shidramappa (Govt. Nominee), Prof. K.K. Seethama (University Nominee) visited the campus to review the autonomous status of the Institution on July 15th and 16th 2016. After which, the autonomous status of the Institution was renewed for a period of six years. (2016-17 to 2021-2022)

National Conference

A One Day National IQAC Conference on '**New Approaches to Learning Outcomes and Assessment under Choice Based Credit System**' was organized on 10th February 2017 with the objective to deliberate on innovative assessment and evaluation techniques that could be implemented to enhance quality in higher education. The Keynote Address session - "Traditional to Transformative Education - Are we Ready?" was delivered by Dr. Sheela Ramachandran former Vice Chancellor, Avinashilingam University, Coimbatore followed with 'Evaluation &



Accountability' by Dr. Dhandapani R., Controller of Examinations, Amrita University Coimbatore and 'Learning Outcomes-Corporate Perspective' by Mr. Tanvir Singh 'India Leader for Campus Recruitments and University Relations' - EY GDS, Bangalore. The highlight of the conference was the case study presentations via webinar by Ms Jane Towers-Clark Head of University Development, ACCA, London.

Exit Interview

Exit interviews, conducted for the outgoing students, are done in order to glean feedback from employees and use them to improve the quality of education. The exit interview process involves approximately 150 students taking up the interview in which a common questionnaire is answered by the students. The responses of students is later analyzed and incorporated into the Plan of Action. For the first time, this academic year, the exit interview was done online through Google forms.

Open House

Open House, conducted by the IQAC, is a platform for students to express their opinions, concerns and complaints regarding the day-to-day functioning of the college, academic and administrative aspects of the college. The main objective of the initiative is to strengthen the feedback mechanism to further accentuate the quality enhancement process.

As a part of this initiative, a general Open House was conducted on the 23rd of January 2017 which consisted of both of UG and PG students. Students from UG and PG expressed few recommendations. The college was highly commended for its campus life and the exposure it provided, by the students.

Women's Open House

To promote gender equality, the IQAC initiated a 'Women's Open House', a session for the girl students to express their opinions, concerns and suggestions about issues concerning them in the college. The ladies' representatives of all the classes, along with a few other girl students from the UG and PG department attended the session. Many issues were discussed and suggestions given for creating a gender equal space in college.

Gender Audit

To promote gender awareness, the IQAC initiated 'Gender Audit' for the first time in college premise in association with Women's Forum. The major objectives of the audit were to foster gender equality in all aspects of college life and throughout the college community; to examine the policies and regulations of the college towards the needs and interests of both the male and female students of the college; and to take active steps to establish good gender balance in decision-making processes in all areas of the college activities. It was an effective attempt seeing the current status of women across the nation.

Management sponsored Minor Research Project

A project titled Socio Economic Appraisal of the Devadasi System –A Study with Special Reference to Vijayapur and Bagalkot Districts of Karnataka, was conducted in collaboration with the Bijapur Educational Society by Dr. Sheela, Dr. Himachalapathy and Ms. Suganthi Pais. The following are the highlights of the research:

c) Extensive field survey was conducted in these districts in order to understand the livelihoods - be it their type of household where they live, their occupations, the family size income, savings pattern, education of children, their belief in the system, their awareness on health issues and also their opinion on the rehabilitation provided by the Govt. agencies, social groups and activist.

The outcome of the study indicates major interventions in diverse fields - be it socio economic, cultural beliefs, health awareness, education and rehabilitation needs to be initiated at a regular phase which is also consistent with bringing immense change in the lives of these deprived community.

It is institutions' constant endeavour to enhance and improve the teaching-learning process by adopting innovative pedagogical methods. Lecture method is the most commonly and predominantly used methodology for most all the courses in the institution. Further, every teacher is encouraged to use a fine blend between traditional and innovative methods of teaching and learning. Although the teacher's role is central in controlling and directing the activity involved in a pedagogical method, emphasis is laid on experience and experiment on the part of the learners too. Subject specific research for students, simulation

games, role plays, case study analyses, rural camps, rural exposure programmes, social visits, internship programmes, article ship programmes and industrial visits are among the many innovative pedagogical methods adopted.

Shared Teaching

The Institution adopts shared teaching for a few undergraduate course lectures. Shared teaching boasts many pedagogical and intellectual advantages: it creates a dynamic and interactive learning environment, provides faculty with a useful way of modelling thinking within or across disciplines and also inspires new research ideas. Two faculty members handle one course and both are responsible for planning and for execution of the lesson plan. Both the faculty are actively involved in class and engage in conversation with the class to encourage discussion by the students. Students also receive individual attention and help in this method of teaching.

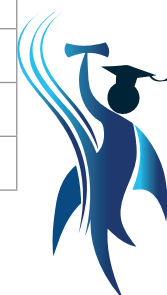

Apart from organizing guest lectures the departments also conducted day long student seminars on various topics by inviting resource persons who are experts in the field of Commerce and Business Administration. These students seminars proved to be an enriching experience for students.

Prudentia

Prudentia, with the tagline of "Enrichment of Knowledge and Career Guidance" was organized by the B.Com Department on 21st July, 2016, for the I and II year B.Com students. This seminar helped students to understand the emerging trends in the retail market, career planning and the applications of technology. Topics like 'Applications of Drone Technology in Academics', 'Emerging Trends and Technology in Marketing', 'Roadmap to Success through Career Planning' were discussed in the seminar.

Rrit

Rrit, meaning Enhancement of Knowledge in Greek, was the National Level Training Workshop conducted on 22nd July, 2016, by the B.Com Department with an aim to increase Industry interface and awareness. The programme was designed to provide an insight and exposure to the final year students about various career opportunities available to them and an insider view of the industry. Some of the topics discussed in the seminar were 'Emerging Trends in the Spectrum of E-commerce, M-commerce and U-Commerce' and 'Implications of Natural Disasters on Economy of the State'. The sessions also targeted on topics related to HR, Marketing and Finance sectors.

Envisage, the first seminar for the students of the B.Com Industry Integrated programme was held on 29th August, 2016. This was an attempt to provide an understanding into the current scenario, possibilities and opportunities in the industrial field. The seminar was divided into three sessions, which was then followed by a panel discussion. Mr. Chetan Venugopal, Co-founder, Pierian Service Private Limited, Mr. Jay Prakash Rai, Founder, Wealth Managers United and Mr. Raja Ram, Chairman and Managing Director, Raja Ram Co spoke on topics like 'Business Process Services', 'BPS and Financial Services' and 'BPS and e-Retailing'. The seminar ended with a panel discussion on 'Opportunities in ITes: Locally and Globally'.

Civil Services: A Lucrative Career Option

On 2nd February 2017 a city level student seminar was organized by the B.Com Department and the Placement Cell to shed light on the services that form the backbone of the administrative machinery of this country. It sought to provide an in-depth understanding of the various career paths available for a civil service aspirant and to offer guidance regarding the formalities and procedures for enrolment to various public service exams. Some of the sessions conducted were 'Insights for Civil Service Aspirants', 'Transition from campus to corporate' and 'Current Affairs'. Mr. Srirama Chakravarthy R is the academic head at Test Cracker, Mr. Yashaswi, Director at Knappily Media, alumnus of IIT and XLRI and Ms. Preethi Irudhayam, Programme manager- Global HR Applications, IBM were the resource persons for the seminar.

Moxie

On 31st January, 2017, a seminar was conducted for the third year BBA students focused on understanding the characteristics of a good leader, the tools for effective problem solving, decision making, leadership development and comprehending the importance of continuous learning. Dr. Geetha Hegde, Dean of Research and International Affairs Business School enlightened the crowd on the topic, 'Leading in a Dynamic Environment'. The seminar began with a speech from Rev. Dr. Thampi, who delivered the keynote speech for this seminar. Following the inauguration was the first technical session on the agenda lead by Ms Stella Veigas. The second technical session began with two alumni, Mr Zubair Pradhan and Mr Shashank, addressing the gathering. The final session of the day, a panel discussion on the topic, "Is success compatible with a firm commitment to success?" was conducted.

Nirmana

'Nirmana', a State Level Seminar on 'Research Methodology for Management' was conducted for the second year students of the BBA department on 28th February, 2017. The speaker, Dr. Samuel Johnson K, spoke about the necessity of research and the impact and importance of Research in business and academics. Workshop Series on Research

PG department conducted an Experiential Training Programme for II year PG students On Dissertation Writing from July 11th to 15th 2016 by Dr. Mohan Philip, Dr. Raja Jebasingh and Dr. Elangavann from Christ University. The topics discussed were: Identifying Problem Area, Identify and finalize the topic in consultation with guides, Review of Literature, including review for introduction, Survey of literature, Technical abbreviations related to literature review, Bibliography and References, Identification of

variables, Orientation towards sampling and designing questionnaire, Sampling, Data analysis tools and Preparing the synopsis for guides approval.

In order to facilitate students in their synopsis preparation a seminar titled "How to prepare dissertation synopsis?" was also held on 19th September, 2016, by Mr Nagaraj. A National level training workshop on "Use of Sample Design and Techniques in Social Science Research: Practical Applications" was conducted on 22nd & 23rd July, 2016. A National level experiential workshop on "Parametric and Non Parametric Tools for Data Analysis" was conducted on 26th & 27th September, 2016.

Placement Cell Workshop

In order to familiarize students with the Placement process, the college held a 3-week placement workshop in the odd semester. The workshop was conducted by Test Cracker on campus, and covered various topics related to the aptitude tests, group discussions and personal interviews that a candidate was likely to face during the placement process.

Session on Team Building

Br. Mani, a well-known mentor and counsellor, with his characteristic way of engaging students through art, conducted a workshop for BBA students. The workshop aimed at Team Building and Goal Setting. The workshop began with an "Ice Breaker", to facilitate interactions and help the students familiarize and get to know their peers and the social organism that is the class.

He then had the students participate in a competition which helped them learn the importance of team building and the effective application of strategy. The art of setting goals and keeping to them even though buffeted by the elements of Life was stressed by him.

Literary Workshops

Writing Workshop

The Editorial Committee organized a writing workshop for the students of editorial committee to enhance their skills of report writing. The workshop was organized keeping in mind the newsletters and the annual magazine the committee publishes. The resource person for the workshop was Dr. Arul Mani, Professor of English at St. Joseph's College. He led the participants through the history of college magazines and the nature of college magazines of Jesuit institutions. He also analysed certain articles and picked up skills essential to report writing.





Poetry Workshop

The Airplane Poetry Movement conducted a workshop along with a screening of spoken word poetry and an open mic in the college on the 25th of November, 2016. The activities started with the screening of few spoken word poetry. These were mostly based on the theme of 'Taboo'. The artists in the videos shown covered topics of racism, rape culture, homosexuality and that of virginity and reached out to the audience through their performance. This was followed by an activity, conducted by Ms Nandini, an exercise to allow students to be honest about the issues/feelings they face. After which Mr Bharat Divakar performed one of his pieces.

Continuous Engagement

A series of lectures, workshops and talks were conducted to give students a deep insight into complex topics and socially relevant issues. This is part of a continuous engagement with topics and issues that are carried out of the class rooms.

Lecture Series on Goods & Services Tax (GST)

Lecture 1: Mr Kalyan Kumar

On the 23rd of August 2016, the B.Com Department hosted a seminar on the 'Implications of the GST Bill'. Mr Kalyan Kumar, Associate Director of Indirect Tax at KPMG, was the guest lecturer for the seminar, and shared with the students the various ways in which this amendment would affect the economy and individuals. Mr Kumar spoke about the dual levy system that would be adopted in India, which is similar to that of Canada. He also spoke in detail about the elimination of the cascading effect of indirect taxes, and the decline in prices because of the implementation of GST. The seminar concluded with an interactive question-answer session.

Lecture 2: Mr S Venkataramani

On 11th November 2016, a Guest Lecture was organised on the topic "GST Implications- an Overview" in association with the Alumni Association. The guest speaker was Sri. S. Venkataramani, CA, a specialist in the field of commercial taxes. Presently, he is the chairman of State Taxation Committee, Bangalore Chamber of Industry and Commerce. He explained the present tax structure, its functioning process and the complexities involved in the process of levying taxes related to different goods and services which paved the way for the introduction of a single tax regime. He urged the students to be conscious of the changes and advantages once GST is implemented

from 1st April 2017. At the end of the session he answered various questions raised by the students.

Lecture 3: Interaction on GST

Ms. Ravi Darshini, HoD of PG Department, delivered a series of lectures and held interactive discussions on GST for all Undergraduate and Postgraduate classes.

Lecture Series on Social Issues

Lecture 1: Gender Sensitization

Ms. Brinda Adige, Global Concerns India, an organization that works with women and children's rights, addressed the students on Gender Sensitization and Gender Based Violence. Ms. Adige spoke about the difficulties that women have to face both inside and outside their homes. She spoke about how many of us are ignorant to these facts and are not even aware of the severity of the problem. She made the students aware of the laws that are surrounding the uplift of women in society and the shortcomings and loopholes of these laws. The students found the seminar enriching and relevant to their needs. The knowledge imparted applied to their understanding of the real world and found relevance in the fact that it increased their awareness.

Lecture 2: Human Trafficking

Ms. Brinda Adige, from Global Concerns India, an organization that works with women and children's rights, addressed the students on Human Trafficking. Ms. Adige spoke about the relevance, prominence and importance of understanding Human Trafficking. She gave the students very relevant cases from her work experience as a social worker, which made the seminar more wholesome and interesting. She educated the students on how people are trafficked and highlighted the depth at which women and children are affected by this issue.

The students were moved by her talk and had several important questions to ask.

Lecture 3: Sustainability Development

The Eco Club held a series of guest lectures for the students of the first and second year across all courses. The lectures were taken by representatives from Smarter Dharma, a social enterprise which aims to infuse environmental sustainability and the corporate world. The lectures were held on 16th, 17th and 18th of January and were received very well by the students. The topics of the lectures ranged from cycle economies to economic sustainability and the corporate world.





Thursday Talk'ies

This year saw a new initiative by the Center for Social Action (CSA) called "Thursday Talk'ies" which was conducted on every second Thursday of the month. There were talks on various issues such as "Students in Politics" on 20th September, 2016 by Swar, an independent theatre practitioner, "Gender and Caste" on 24th November, 2016 by Gee Semmalar, a social activist and "Access to Information is Your Right" on 11th August, 2016 by Venkatesh D, to name a few. There was a film screening of "PutatirugisiNodi", on 19th January, 2017, a film by Suneel Raghavendra.

Presentation on Union Budget

A team of six students from the B.Com Department analysed the Union Budget, 2017, and made a detailed presentation to all the classes informing the students of the major highlights of the budget. The presentation not only shed light on the Union Budget itself but also on other events in the country and around the world like Demonetization and Brexit. The presentation to all the classes were made in a span of two weeks right after the budget was presented in the parliament. Prior to the presentation there was a live screening of the Union Budget in the college.

New Initiatives: Discussion & Research Forum

The academic year 2016-17, witnessed open discussions on a range of issues pertaining to contemporary society. Departments and associations organized talks, workshops, debates, discussions and open fora to inculcate a practice of critical and reflective thinking. These initiatives helped students to go beyond classrooms and learn from a wide variety of sources and ways.

ComVerse

It is a new initiative taken by the B.Com department to provide students a platform to discuss and question the latest trends in the Commerce arena. It aims to enhance the learning experience of students beyond the four walls of the classroom. The latest innovations, changes and its impact are discussed on this forum. Students as well as teachers participate in the discussion. It aims to enlighten the students on the numerous events in the real world and encourages them to clear their doubts. The first edition of ComVerse was held on 1st September, 2016. The topic of discussion was Goods and Service Tax. The second edition discussed 'Demonetization'.

Spotlight

Spotlight Discussion Forum, curated by the Josephite Business Club, is a forum to discuss various issues related to business and public life. Spotlight Discussion on Demonetisation was held on 7th January in the basketball court. The discussion was recorded and uploaded to the college youtube channel.

3 D Room: Discuss, Debate & Deliberate

3D Room is a BBA Department initiative that involves a panel of students discussing topics that are currently in the news or socially relevant. It is the culmination of talented and determined minds coming together to create something that is the first of its kind.

MainFrame Research Forum

MainFrame research forum is an initiative by the B.Com Department to encourage a research culture among the undergraduate students. The purpose of the forum is to inculcate a habit of critical thinking among the participants. The forum will identify students who have an inclination to pursue research initiatives. It will train participants to prepare scientific papers on social and cultural issues which will add to the existing knowledge.

Networking Session

As business students, it is imperative that professional network is built, consisting of people from various backgrounds. Recognizing the importance of the same, the BBA department's Josephite Business Club organized a networking session which was open to students from the whole college. Various individuals from the industry were called and people from Deutsche Bank, Edvance Preschools, and Oyo rooms were present from corporates. Several entrepreneurs whose businesses varied from adventure sports related team trainings, to laundry and logistics, and to landscaping interacted with students.

The Pitch

The Pitch is a first of its kind event, which required the students to design a B-Plan and present it to Venture Capitalists. The process involved was extremely challenging and over fifty B-Plans were conceptualized by the students out of which twenty two were shortlisted by an evaluation committee to be presented to the Venture Capitalists, Mr. Dinesh K Talera, Mr. HM Mehta and Mr. Sahil Gupta.

Entrepreneurship Lab

The EDP Lab was an initiative by the BBA department students to present their classroom comprehension





of the subject in the form of various models. The lab catered to the needs of aspiring entrepreneurs as it harbours models which provide all relevant information about the subject as well as the procedures which are required to start an enterprise. The models revolved around fundamental concepts such as evolution of entrepreneurship, patents and intellectual property rights, finance and marketing aspects of an enterprise.

Holistic Development Programme Counselling and Student Development Programmes

St Joseph's College Of Commerce, stresses on the holistic and integrated development of the students, by providing them with appropriate guidance and assistance, to facilitate their fluent transition from school to college life. To achieve that objective, the Institution has a Counselling Department comprising four full time Counsellors. With an average of 4-5 counselling sessions and 8 HRD classes per week, the student's attendance is monitored and checked constantly through the semesters.

The students are moulded into socially aware and sensitive individuals, through personal development and self-awareness, aiming at an all-round development that empowers them to face challenges in the present and future. With the help of ice breakers, inspirational videos, PPTs, workshops and self-reflective questions on important issues such as grief, fear, self-esteem, relationship issues, anxiety, academics and anger were dealt with in a sagacious way. Through empathy, a non-judgmental attitude and confidentiality, the students are provided an open and acceptable environment to share their woes and concerns and seek help.

As the students come, they are made to fill a counselling form which is kept confidential with the respective counsellor. This form has basic information about the student, his family, and his background and contact details. Counselling provides guidance and assistance for students and gives them space to talk about their concerns and explore difficult feelings in an open environment that is free from intrusion and is very confidential. A supportive atmosphere is provided to the students for them to feel comfortable.

The Personal counselling is also provided for students to facilitate the transition from school to college and also to assist them with concerns regarding academics, career, work, relationships, life situations etc.

Campus Ministry

Students are given knowledge on the Bible, the Prophets, and on the life and various manifestations of Jesus.

Annual Programmes

Annual Retreats for catholic students are organized by the Ignitors headed by Fr. Brian Pereira. At the end of the academic year a two-day retreat for the final year students is organized. Topics of discussion include finding one's true self, acceptance and spirituality in the workplace. Dynamic and interactive workshops





on topics varying from child abuse to transgender sensitivity are conducted by the Ignitors for all the students of the college.

The Feast of our founder, St. Ignatius of Loyola, is celebrated in an impressive manner for an entire week. Various competitions like essay writing, quiz, poster making and collage are held in commemoration of the feast and banners are put up in the campus explaining the life and teachings of St. Ignatius.

Daily Recital of Rosary

The students and faculty gather in the morning for the recital of holy rosary to begin the day with blessings. This was an initiative of the Faith Formation Animators.

Thanksgiving

The Thanksgiving Service was held for the staff and outgoing students on March 17th. The solemn inter-religious service focuses on thanking the almighty for the blessings of the past year and was conducted by the Fr. Anthony Joseph SJ, Rector, and con-celebrated by other Jesuit priests. Every graduating student was anointed with holy oil as a sign of strength which will help them to face the world. The staff and students shared lunch bringing to close an afternoon of spiritual and reflective thoughts.

Mentorship Programme

The role of the Mentors is to contribute to the holistic development of the students under their care. Mentoring entails to be supportive towards the student and to help a student in any specific way in which he or she may require guidance. Each class has a mentor; the role of the mentors is to be supportive towards

the student and be a link between the student and the department, between the subject teachers and the students, between the parents and the students and between the students themselves. They contribute to the holistic development of the students under their care. This academic year in the Mentorship File, mentors maintained and updated online database of students' profile and the activities they engaged in annually. This helped to record the progress of the students and when the mentor's changes, the record will help the new mentor to know about the students' profile in its entirety.

Parent Teacher Association

The Parent's Teacher Association is a vital and dynamic body and seeks to initiate, nurture and enhance the development of the College and its students through its involvement and support. The Management and Staff seek the support and encouragement of all Parents/Members of the PTA to encourage and sustain this mutually beneficial effort. The Parents Teachers meeting gives the parents an opportunity to meet the Class Mentors and the Subject teachers to get a feedback on the progress of their Child /Ward.

During the meeting parents were requested to give a feedback on the various parameters adopted by the Institution to promote students welfare and progress. The parents gave a very positive response about all the academic, co-curricular and extension activities. The parents had appreciation for the faculty of the institution for offering the best possible learning environment for the students. This academic year the





parent teacher meeting was held throughout the week which helped the teachers and the parents to spend quality time to discuss the progress of the student.

Scholarships

The College believes in inclusive education and equal opportunities for all. In order to realize this objective the College Management has a number of scholarship schemes for students who require financial assistance. These scholarships are provided to students who excel in academics, co-curricular activities and sports. In addition to scholarships the college also provides mid-day meals to sports students and other deserving students. The amount disbursed for scholarships in the academic year 2016-17 is Rs. 29,43,208.00 The amount disbursed towards mid-day meals for the academic year 2016-17 is Rs. 5,70,727.00

Student Academic Support

Bridge Course

Bridge course is a fifteen day refresher course conducted for the newly admitted first year students who need to better their Mathematics and Accountancy skills. The idea of this course is to orient students who've opted out of Mathematics and also the students from other streams who've not done Accountancy earlier so as to be on par with their future classmates' understanding and knowledge of the subject.

Bridge course started from the 29th of June and ended on the 16th of July, 2016. A student team comprising of six III year B.Com and BBA students conducted the math course under the guidance of Ms. Komal Dave. A total of 160 (156 students for Mathematics and 04

students for Accountancy) students from the B.Com stream attended the Bridge Course.

Peer Teaching/Remedial Classes

Remedial classes are conducted in order to give assistance to the students who are active and consistent participants in sports, associations and other extensive activities, along with the students who lag behind in academics due to certain reasons. This is also supported by Peer Teaching where students themselves participate in teaching - learning processes enabling the slow learners to catch up with the current pace.

Staff Performance Evaluation

The Institution believes that the Staff feedback is an important measure to assess the degree of excellence of the work performed by the faculty members. Thus an evaluation process is conducted periodically of the staff members. The standard evaluation criterion is based on certain important parameters like planning and preparation for class; class room environment, and methodology of teaching among many others. The entire class participates in the assessment process. Staff Evaluations are subject to review by the Principal and the consolidated staff rating is discussed with the individual staff members. The staff evaluation is centralized and is recorded online. This academic year the feedback facility has been introduced into the student login of the ERP systems which makes it easier for students to give their feedback on the various parameters of the Staff Performance Evaluation system.



Training and Placement

St. Joseph's College of Commerce maintaining its exemplary reputation, has completed another successful year round of placement activities for its students which stands as a testimony to the continued faith reposed by the internal and external stakeholders of this prestigious institution.

This academic year the Training & Placement Cell of the college started with a detailed orientation given to the students with regard to the placement process followed at the institution which, is divided into three different phases for the smooth functioning of the placement activities. Phase one include briefing of the college placement policy/code of conduct for students, pre-placement workshop, series of guest talks and career mapping sessions. Phase two includes registration by students interested in campus placement and the final phase is when we have the companies visiting the institution to conduct on campus recruitment drive. The first activity was a two week employability training workshop to groom the skills of our academically oriented students in order to make them industry ready. Test cracker Education Pvt. Ltd conducted this pre-placement workshop from the 28th of June, 2016 to the 11th of July, 2016 for seventy nine final year students. Spread over a period of two weeks, this workshop included quantitative modules,

logical reasoning, resume building, mock interviews and developing soft skills. Also, the following guest talks were conducted across all sections of the final year and second year students.

Apart from the above mentioned sessions, the placement cell in its efforts to create awareness of various promising civil service job opportunities available to the youth of our country, organized a day long city level student seminar- 'Civil Service- A





Lucrative Career Option' for the outgoing batch. This seminar was conducted on the 2nd of February, 2017 and guest speakers focused on topics such as- insights into civil service preparation, cracking entrance exams for probationary officer's role in banks and job opportunities in the defence sector. The seminar also witnessed active participation from a few other prominent colleges of the city.

On-campus placement

The recruitment exercise commenced in college as early as the 1st of August, 2016. Several organizations, be it the industry leaders and start-ups, approached the institution in the lookout for efficient candidates to take up jobs offered by them. Being the 8th best Commerce institution in India, the firms offered diverse roles varying from finance, marketing, human resources, public relations, to name a few. Information about placements was made available to students through the college SMS system, college website, social media platforms and placement notice board. 190 Undergraduate and Postgraduate students registered for campus placements this academic year of which 166(87%) students have been offered jobs by various companies and many more are in the pipeline for recruitment and selection. The average CTC offered by the recruiters was between Rs.2, 75,000 to 3, 45,000 per annum and the highest package offered was Rs. 13, 90,000 approximately.

Other placement activities include

1. As an initiative to help the II year students identify their suitable career paths much earlier in life and also before they could choose their electives for the final semesters, the placement cell conducted a career mapping workshop on the 16th of February, 2017. 31 students participated in this workshop which was a combination of psychometric test, aptitude test and one to one consulting. The workshop was very well accepted among the student participants.
2. As last year, this year too we have had KPMG, EY, Deloitte, PWC and few mid size CA firms conducting their hiring processes for article interns. 14 students have been placed through college in this regard.
3. Two students of the Final year B.Com represented the college on the 186th of July, 2016 at the Anchor Programme organized by EY Global Operations Division.





4. The Maverick Graduate School programme, a distinctive industry-academia connect, is an extension of Deloitte's signature programme, Maverick for B-Schools, conducted in leading undergraduate colleges across India, the programme invites students to form diverse teams to design and propose solutions for current-day business challenges. A team of students from St. Joseph's College of Commerce emerged as the winners of the Bangalore Regional Round and made it to the Top 10 Teams from across the nation.
5. Goldman Sachs Services Private Ltd. visited the campus to offer internships in the various departments. Many selected candidates will be enrolled by Goldman Sachs for their Summer Internship Programme.
6. The placement cell successfully completed the KPMG campus ambassador programme for second year in a row. The ambassadorship is for an academic year and the ambassadors are responsible to conduct various competitions, programmes in the campus and also get the opportunity to take up a paid internship at KPMG for a month.
7. The placement cell is into its third year of the EY Scholarship Programme. An initiative wherein, EY awards a one lakh scholarship and 8 week internship opportunity to the winner based on the business idea showcased by him/her.
8. Well-known companies like Caterpillar, EY Global, Fico India, Khivraj Motors and much popular start-up are in the process of hiring interns in the due course of time.

To provide further assistance, the Placement Cell has maintained database of companies which is made available to the students who need help for finding internship in their fields of choice. Also, the details of students who are not placed through campus will be added to the recruitment database and made available to different companies as and when a requirement arises. The placement cell has initiated a mechanism to receive a formal feedback from the companies visiting the college through a questionnaire. This helps in training the students for placements in the future.

Internship

Internships are an important part of the SJCC curriculum. It is mandatory for all the second year B.Com and BBA students to undertake a six week

long internship in an organization of their choice and for I B.Com (TT) in the Hospitality Industry. This is to expose the students to the corporate world and the challenges that they will counter post the completion of the course. Each student was allotted a guide and the guide assists the student in the preparation of the report post the completion of the Internship. A viva-voce is also conducted to test the students about their learning in the organizations.

Internships have long been a part of the Institution's collegiate programmes but in the recent past, the college has incorporated international internships for students at graduate and post graduate levels. International internships provide valuable professional experience and further enhance students' networking opportunities, specialized skill building opportunities and leadership skills. This academic year a few students have done their international internships. The Institution consistently motivates and encourages the students to go for international internships. Some of the companies in which the students have done their internships are Bank of Oman, Kuwait Oil, and Bank of Kuwait and in many such reputed firms.

Social Sector Internship

The Institution is committed towards upliftment of the marginalised and weaker sections of the society. It is towards this commitment and faith that the Institution encourages its students to work along with NGOs and with non-profit organizations in India, who work in different fields for the cause of the under privileged. Students take up social internships as it helps to portray their leadership skills and develop their ability to make a change in society. Some of the NGOs and organizations where our students have contributed to the cause are CARE, Akshaypatra, Bosco, Old age homes, primary schools in slums etc.

The B.Com Travel and Tourism Department collaborated with two nationally acclaimed NGO's called "U&I" and for the first year students as a part of their social internship programme. The Institution signed the memorandum of understanding with both the organizations and students volunteered to work with them for a period of nine months. Both U&I and Bhumi focus on teaching and assisting underprivileged and orphan children across the city. The idea of social internship is to augment the Josephite motto of creating men and women for others. By undertaking such social programmes, students become aware of some of the pressing concerns of society and work towards serving the country at large.



Examination & Results

The Institution is committed to produce dynamic individuals whose academic excellence rivals their community involvement and leadership qualities. Examinations and grades are but a humble measure of the efforts in this endeavour. As an autonomous Institution, it has the freedom to improvise systems of assessments to make it more holistic and reflective of the interdisciplinary approach to education that is not solely reliant on books and classes.

The Examination Department under the leadership of the COE Ms. Sneha Rai has been constantly striving to reform the examination system. In this regard the following new practices were initiated in this academic year.

- a) Online Examination for foundation subjects Indian Constitution and Environmental Studies using Moodle platform.
- b) Facility of Examination fee payment was introduced.
- c) Continuous Internal Assessment component of Mid Term Test which is a centralized written test was exempted for General English and Languages. The subject teachers were given the freedom to evaluate the entire CIA component of 20 marks through innovative and contemporary methods.
- d) Old answer sheets were recycled and converted to books with the help of ITC factory. These books were distributed to poor children studying in the Government Schools through Outreach Programmes

Examination results play a vital role in a student's career prospects and thus the Institution strive to make the process of evaluation objective and transparent. The performance of our students both at UG and PG level has been outstanding and reflective of the Institution's efforts to deliver academic excellence.

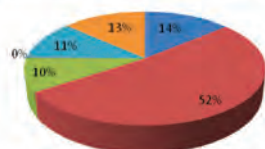

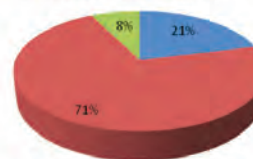

Industrial Visits

Industrial visits are an efficient way of exposing students to the nature of corporate and industrial practices. Industrial visits are organized for all classes in the academic year by their class mentors.

International Industrial Visits

B.Com

Students from B. Com Travel and Tourism and B.Com Regular embarked on a visit to Europe. The students explored various tourist attractions of Paris. In Brussels, they visited the world renowned Grand Palace - a UNESCO World Heritage Site. They also explored the cities of Rotterdam, Munich, Amsterdam and Frankfurt. During their stay, the students visited the Vlerick Business School in Brussels. The faculty members involved them in a dialogue which covered topics from current affairs, economics and share markets. A trip was made to the famous Mercedes Benz Museum in Stuttgart. The trip was as much a learning experience and an informative one.

BBA

The BBA Department organizes an International Industrial Tour every year during the autumn break. This academic year, 44 students toured Russia and Scandinavian countries – Finland, Estonia and Sweden. During their visit, the students got an opportunity to visit Kremlin - a UNESCO World Heritage site, the Crystal Vodka Museum, the Moscow State Circus, popularly referred to as the 'Russian Circus' and various well-known museums, cathedrals and churches. They also attended a lecture session at the University Higher School of Economics on Russia's financial system post the Soviet era, and brought the dynamics of the system and supporting statistics to the fore. The students arrived back with memories abound and key learning takeaways.

National visit

B.Com TT

The B.Com Travel and Tourism department put together an exciting, adventure-packed trip to cities of Delhi, Manali, Shimla and Chandigarh for the second-year students. Extension Activities



Engagement beyond Classrooms describes the Institution's educational mission: to augment the all-round development of students. The Institution has framed various extracurricular activities for students to advance their educational experiences and to enhance their social skills. The activities provide a platform for students to involve and interact with other students, thus leading to their personal development and learning. Various Associations, Business Clubs, Literary Clubs, Students' Council and sports activities provide a space for students to come together, share ideas, discuss issues and attain common goals. In the academic year 2016-17, under the CBCS system, all the association members earned credits for their participation in the extension and extracurricular activities.

Community Service

Jesuit education helps students to realize that talents are gifts to be developed, not for self-satisfaction or self-gain, but rather to be utilized for the good of the human community. Students are encouraged to use their gifts in the service of others, out of love for God. As a part of the rural exposure camps the students visit villages and experience the realities of village life, their predicaments and their everyday challenges

with minimum resources. They conduct outreach programmes in these villages and work towards their betterment.

Bembala Outreach Programme

The Bangalore Jesuit Education Society in association with its institutions created the 'Bembala Outreach Programme' in order to form 'men and women for others'. The objective of the programme is to extend knowledge and other institutional resources to the community and vice – versa. The focus of the programme is not only to create awareness and refine student's skills but to also create a greater impact in the community at large. The Youth Center of the programme is located in St. Joseph's College. Rev. Fr. Brian Pereira, SJ and Br. Phillip serve as the Director and the Assistant Director of this programme respectively with Dr. Isaac as the Chief Coordinator. The coordinators from our college include Dr. Hariharan Ravi and Mr. Elvis Dias.

The experience was truly eye opening into the community and its needs. The traffic duty showed how much help the students can be for the local police and the solur camp made students realize their role in society as a responsible citizen. As a result of their untiring efforts, this programme has received a number

of felicitations and awards as well as recognition from national newspapers. The Deccan Herald on the 29th of August, 2016 stated that 'About 80 students from St. Joseph's College of Commerce, along with 30 – 40 volunteers, removed more than 30 posters and bills in Shantalanagar ward.' The institution has also been exemplified by the Beautiful Bangalore Association. The Karnataka State Police has celebrated the social work being done through a Certificate of Appreciation.

Post-graduate Outreach Programme

The second year students of M.Com and M.Com (IB) were a part of the community extension programme from the 22nd to the 27th of August, 2016. They visited 12 government schools located around Bangalore and taught them English as a part of the programme.

The students of I M.Com visited Manvi and the students of I M.Com (IB) visited Pannur, situated in the Raichur district of Karnataka from 21st to 25th October, 2016 as part of their Rural Exposure Camp. The main objective of this 4 day program was to provide the students with exposure about the lives of people in rural areas, their way of living and the various difficulties faced by them. The activities of the programme included plantation of saplings and cotton plucking in the fields, interacting with the school children, helping in the kitchen and visiting other villages. A public event was organized by the students for the villagers where topics like the girl child issue, health and hygiene, and the Swaach Bharat scheme were discussed. 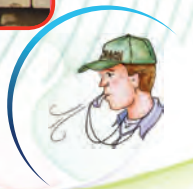
